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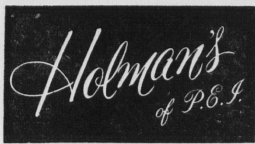

**FARM FEDERATION NEWSLETTER**

**Meeting Set To Probe Future Of Spud Industry**

The stage is now set for the meeting of potato producers today at the Vocational Institute on the Malpeque Road. There is considerable speculation as to how well the meeting will be attended. Guesses range all the way from very large to perhaps quite ordinary.

It is hoped that some really constructive thinking and planning can be carried out at this time. The meeting is not in any sense a grievance demonstration and is certainly not called for the purpose of whining. Those who attend, expecting the excitement of a fight will probably be disappointed. Before deciding to call this meeting the federation executive gave the matter serious consideration and in addition a committee has carefully considered the questions which will be discussed.

It is hoped that the gathering can approach whatever it may consider to be potato problems not so much in the light of present unsatisfactory prices but rather in the light of what can be accomplished by planning for the future. Potato growing is a very important part of our Island economy and while the industry can not insulate itself against the influence of changing demand and outside competition, yet it should be possible to make adjustments that will keep us in the business on a reasonable basis.

**SOIL SAMPLES**

This item is directed to those farmers who may have taken soil samples last fall and have kept them at home. Those who are in that position are advised that the soil testing lab is in a position at the present time to provide prompt service on samples sent in immediately. So rather than those samples that have been resting since last fall, and move them to where valuable information can be obtained on crop planning.

**ON FARM HOUSE**

Attention is directed to recent notices to the effect that the Junior Farmer's Federation is co-operating with the Agricultural Centennial Committee in seeking out the oldest existing farm house in the province and also one constructed in 1864. In the latter case our understanding is that the house is to be as nearly representative of the period and as unchanged as possible.

**FARM TRUCKS**

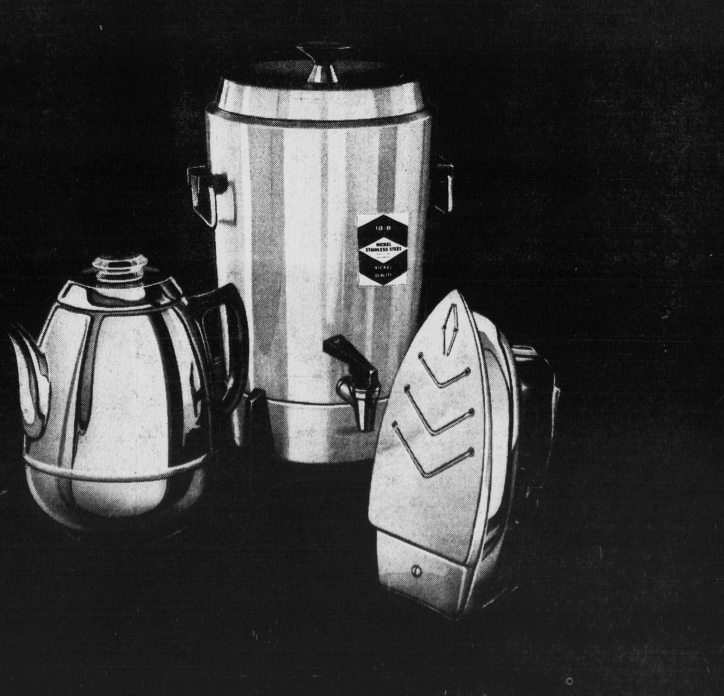
One of the requests made by the brief presented by the Federation of Agriculture was for improved rates on the heavier trucks which are used almost entirely on farms. While it is not possible to effect any change this year, the minister in charge stated that if the federation can establish that there is a really worthwhile number of trucks in this category than consideration will be given to a special schedule. The challenge is thus up to the federation to find out what the position is.

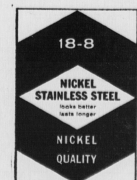
