...\*HOME DESTROYED — A fire of unknown origin destroyed the home of Mr. Hiram Leeco, Greek River, about 1 a.m. Thursday morning, Nov. 8th. At the time the house was vacant since Mr. and Mrs. Leeco and family are living in Summerside. The fire was noticed by passing motorists, who quickly notified the neighbors. However, the fire had gained such headway, and with no water, the neighbors were unable to save anything. The house had been recently repaired, and new plumbing had been installed. The total loss is estimated at approximately \$7,000.00, part of which is covered by insurance.

...\*BEING REPAIRED — The Bank of Nova Scotia, Montague, is at present undergoing repairs to the brick facing of the building. The bricks at the top of the building, which were considered in poor repair, are being replaced along the front and side of the building, and the eave finish above these sections is also to be replaced. The contractor, Mr. John Denham, and workmen, have already completed the placing of a steel rod through the building to prevent more spreading of the sides, which has become apparent during the past few years, owing to foundation spreading. Several large cracks have appeared in the brick facing, and will be filled at the same time as the pointing work on the three walls is being done. Mr. Denham expects that the job will take several weeks for completion before the job of re-pointing has been finished.

Mr. Dufney said that at the time they were heating the nigger-head, a drum shaped device, in the forge fire so as to remove scales. The heat, he thought, caused steam to form inside the drum, which exploded under the severe pressure.

## Dredging Of Montague River Nears Completion

...\*Approximately two weeks will complete the dredging of the Montague river, it was learned yesterday. Only a short distance on the last course remains to be completed, which, although quite heavily filled-in, will be removed during that time.

This will bring to completion a two-year undertaking, a work of great proportion since it has been some fifteen years that the last dredge, the No. 9, cleaned out the winding Montague river.

The dredge 115, under the command of Captain Keddy, was brought here in July of 1950, and carried on dredging operations until November, completing the basin course one, and part of course two. This year it has completed the task, cleaning out the river from the bridge to Shaw's Point, removing over 300,000 yards of silt fill-in.

During the two years the dredge has been attended by the tow-boats, Pugwash, Glen Livett and Canso, and sufficient scows to keep it busy, a job in itself since it can load scows so rapidly from the extra long bucket.

Even at present there is a clear channel of 14 feet depth at low water direct to the wharves, where shipping vessels can find ample space for loading produce. With such facilities at hand, it is expected that the number of ships arriving at this port will increase greatly, a fact which will do much to provide easier markets for the farmer's produce.

## Plans Formed For Operating Rink

A meeting of the Mayor and Council and Community Welfare League Building Committee was held in the Council Chamber on Wednesday, November 7th with Mayor P. L. Boudreault presiding.

The Town Clerk, Captain C. M. Fitzgerald gave the meeting a financial statement, which was approved. It was decided to operate the rink through a five-man managing committee, as in previous years. The members of this committee are: Howard S. MacLean, James MacConnell, Jr., Guy Hemphill, Andrew McNeill and W. J. Fitzgerald. The committee will select its own chairman.

It was decided to call tenders for parties to operate the rink for the winter season. The financial arrangements under which local hockey teams will operate with the rink for the 1951-52 season, will be—the first \$15.00 of the gate receipts to the rink and the balance to be split 50% and 50%. It was decided to give the Eagle hockey team one benefit night in the rink during the skating season. The meeting adjourned until November 29th.
