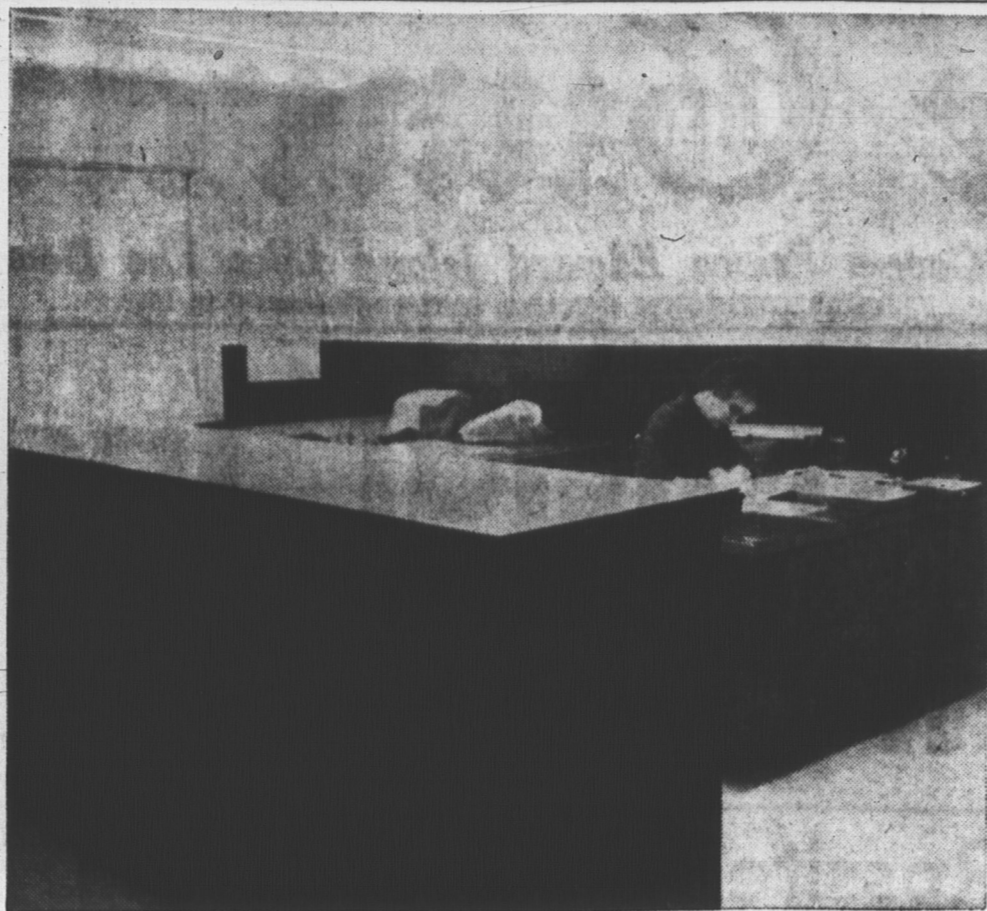
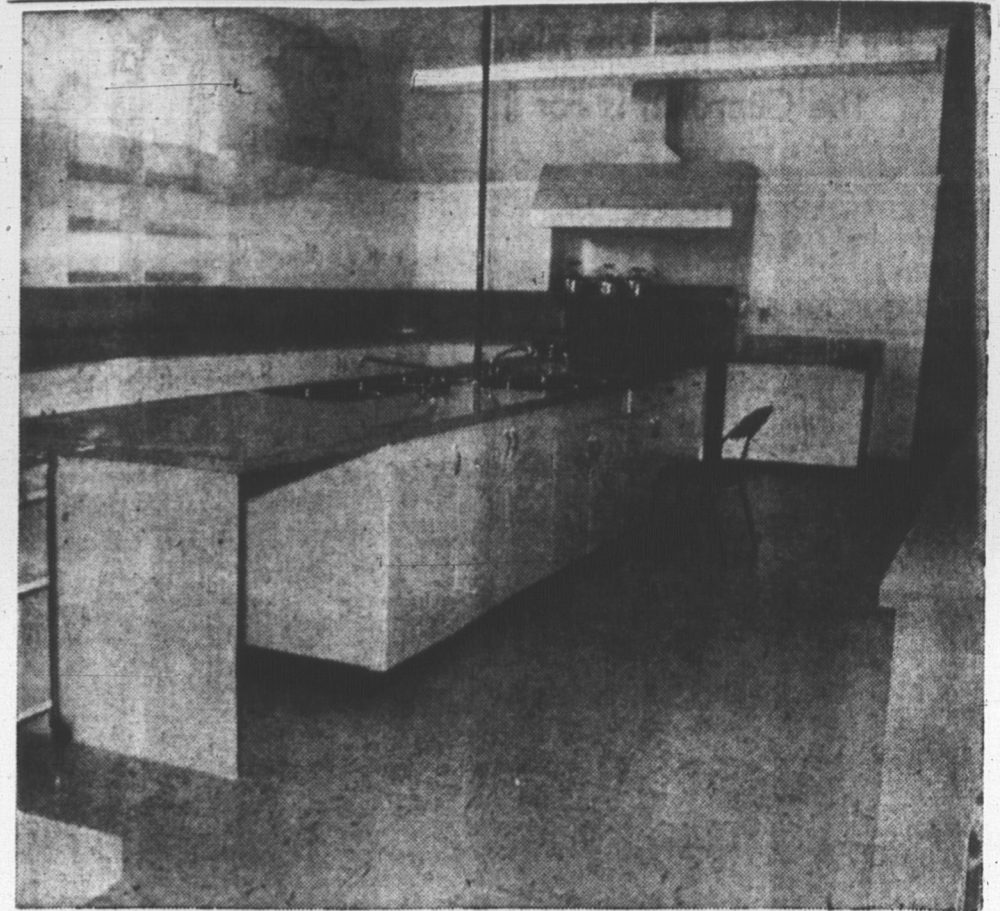

## Opening Program Is Set For Park Royal UC Centre

The three-day official opening ceremonies and dedication services for the Park Royal United Church Christian Education Centre begin today and continue through Monday. This afternoon at 2 o'clock the "Children's Hour" is featured, with activities and refreshments for all the children of the congregation and their friends. The admission is a donation of clothing for church relief work.

Tonight is "Teen-ager's Night" from 7.30 to 11, with a prepared religious program, film, games and a sock hop, plus a lunch prepared and served by the young people themselves. George Crawford is master of ceremonies and all of the congregation's teen-agers 18 and over and their invited friends are welcome. Elders will act as chaperons.

For the older people, a congregation social will be held Monday evening at 8, and the public is invited to attend. This should be of special interest to many families of the congregation. Admission to the Teen-ager's night and congregation social will also be a donation of clothing for the roundup of new and used clothing which is the special project to celebrate the opening of the Centre.

**DEDICATION SERVICE**  
At 11 a.m. Sunday there will be a congregational service of worship and dedication, highlighted by the unveiling of a plaque which will later adorn the wall of the main entrance of the new Centre. The unveiling will

be done by two young people of the congregation, Janet Woodgate and David Watts.

The public service of dedication will take place in the auditorium of the new Centre at 2 p.m. Sunday with the Clerk of Session, Russell Ewing, master of ceremonies.

Charles Crawford, co-chairman of the building committee, will give an account of the work done since the decision to build the centre four years ago. Rev. C. S. Lewis, minister of Spring Park United Church, will speak briefly to the workmen who did the construction work on the building.

Following this "The Ceremony of the Keys" will be performed by the architect, Keith Pickard, M.R.A.I.C.; Norman MacLeod, representing the general contractors, Williams, Murphy and MacLeod; Charles Crawford, representing the Church Extension Committee; and William Ellis, speaking for the trustees.

In the actual act of dedication, the people will be led by the presiding elder, Russell Ewing. Rev. David Barwise, chairman of the Presbytery, will dedicate the building. This will be followed by remarks from James Williams, chairman of the Christian Education Committee.

The final part of the dedication program will be a ceremony of commitment to the use and purpose of the building by the Mid-Week Youth Groups. Refreshments and tours around the building will follow.

It was felt that the only appropriate projects in conjunction with the ceremonies would have to do with Christian service, and thus the clothing drive for relief was set up. It was also decided that the special offering on Sunday afternoon will be entirely devoted to relief work.

When the present church and hall were built in 1958, the classrooms were intended to accommodate 180 children. There are now over 500 attending Sunday School. With the new classrooms there will be more than enough accommodation for all these children.

The annual meeting of the congregation in January 1962 made the decision to enlarge and renovate the building, and actual construction work began in August of 1965.

The building occupies an area of 78 feet by 121 feet, with 9,906 square feet on the main floor and 6,906 square feet on the second floor, a total of 16,812 square feet of floor space.

Structural materials are steel, brick and concrete block, with plaster used in the library, board room, study, office, parlour and main entrance walls. Oak dado adorns the walls of the study, office and parlour. The roof is of wood carried on steel trusses; the floors are concrete throughout, covered in the main entrance hall and stairs with terrazzo, the auditorium, kitchen and corridors with vinyl asbestos tile, and in the classrooms with linoleum tile. The building is heated by a forced hot water system.

**TEACHING AREA**  
All classrooms are double sized which will lend them readily to the modern concept of teaching in larger classes. Other areas are also designed to be used for teaching if the need arises.

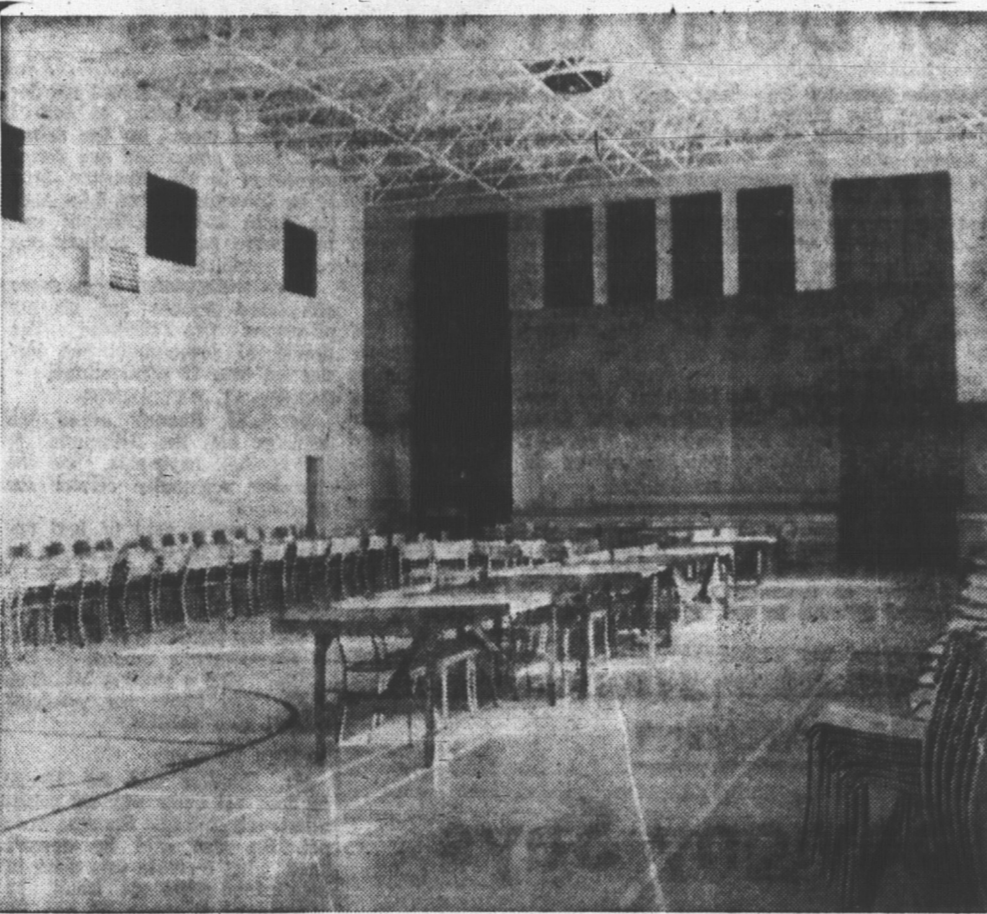
On the second floor with the classrooms are the library with facilities for books, magazines and film storage; a board room with a folding wall for larger meetings; the minister's study, church office and church parlour.

There are a total of 17 rooms, including an auditorium and unassigned space area measuring 38 by 103 feet which provides for growth and changes in church programming. The auditorium is 40 by 75 feet, and has a stage 18 by 32 feet. There are four storage rooms and four lavatories.

The main entrance hall is made attractive by a wall of arranged plywood finished in contrasting colours. The rear entrance is decorated with a window framed by plywood and coloured plastic set in a modern arrangement. Both entrance ways are lighted by glass doors and walls.

Total cost of construction and renovation of the hall is about \$170,000.

The Park Royal United Church now has a congregation of 393 families and over 1,500 persons. The minister is Rev. Henry Tye.
