Butterflies Come As Trials Near

By JIM PEACOCK Canadian Press Staff Writer SASKATOON (CP) — Butterflies had a ball with athletic tumblers here Thursday as the Canadian British Empire Games track and field trials approached. As more and more athletes arrived for the competition, speculation increased on those likely to make the 22-member team that goes to Wales for the games in July. Many names were mentioned by the athletes as almost sure winners in the trials, a battle not only against other individuals but against undetermined standards by which their value to the Canadian team will be measured. The trials open this afternoon and continue through Saturday afternoon. Then a committee will sit down with the results to name the team, expected to include seven girls and 15 men. The intangibles of the competition set the butterflies churning in the tummy of George Shepherd, a 20-year-old Port Colborne, Ont., hurdler. ESTABLISHED RECORD Shepherd is a University of Western Ontario student who in his first race in the 440-yard hurdles established the Canadian record 5 minutes 53.8 seconds, 1.6 seconds off the Empire record. He arrived Wednesday with coach Murray McNeil. "Murray's not worried," said Shepherd Thursday. "But he can have my stomach for a couple of days." Shepherd's name was among those being mentioned as having an inside chance for a team berth. He also runs the flat 440 and if he can win the hurdles

and reach the final of the 440 he will stand a good chance of selection. Terry Tobacco of Vancouver, although suffering from an infection following removal of a wisdom tooth, is favored in the 440 while Joe Mullins of Glace Bay, N.S., and Doug Clements of Vancouver are leading contenders for the half mile. Mike Agostini of Vancouver and Stan Levenson of Toronto are top rated for the 100 and 220 yards. The mile has three men among the pre-meet favorites, Wes McLeod of Toronto, Don Loadman of Regina and Ed Morton of Winnipeg. They have run the distance in under 4:47. Three berths on the women's team are foregone conclusions here—sprinters Eleanor Haslam of Regina and Diane Matheson of Montreal and Vancouver having been on the Canadian Olympic track team and showing promise in early competitions this year. In the field events Mrs. Jackie MacDonald Gelling of Toronto heads the shot put list and possibly the discus where her main competition will come from Marie Dupree, a six-foot three-inch army nursing sister who holds the Canadian record but who has had little time to train this year. Sunny weather Thursday helped dry the rebuilt cinder track at Griffiths Stadium and it began to appear in first-class condition. The forecast calls for sunny weather today with a high temperature of 65 degrees. Showers are possible Saturday, the forecaster said.

Yankees Upset Indians; Pirates Nip Giants 6-5

New York Yankees clubbed rookie Gary Bell and veteran Bob Lemon for five home runs Thursday, thumping Cleveland Indians 9-3 for a sweep of their three-game series. In other action American League Chicago White Sox blanked Boston Red Sox 4-0 and Washington topped Detroit 4-3. Baltimore played at Kansas City in a night fixture. In the National League, Pittsburgh Pirates squeezed out a 5-5 victory over San Francisco Giants. Three National League games were scheduled at night: Los Angeles at Philadelphia, Chicago at Milwaukee and St. Louis at Cincinnati.

Only four Boston batters reached first. None advanced farther. Wynn now has a 7-5 record this year. Frank Malzone and losing pitcher Frank Sullivan got the only hits, singles, off Wynn. At Detroit, Albie Pearson's extra-base hitting and Russ Kemmerer's effective pitching gave the Senators their win over the Tigers. It took reliever Dick Hyde to save Kemmerer's fourth victory as the Tigers scored two unearned runs in the ninth. Washington carried a 4-1 lead into the ninth as Pearson drove home half the Senator's runs with a double and triple. Kemmerer was lifted in the inning after Harvey Kuenn doubled with two out. Kuenn took third on Hyde's windup and scored as Charlie Maxwell was safe on Roy Siever's error. Successive singles by Al Kaline and Gail Harris brought home Maxwell before the rally ended. PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Rookie right-hander Ray Semproch hurled no-hit, no-run ball for six innings Thursday night as Philadelphia coasted to a 9-3 win over Los Angeles. The 27-year-old rookie, in beat-

ing the Dodgers for the third straight time, extended his winning streak to four. He is 8-4. Semproch, Phillies winningest pitcher, walked one man and allowed no hits until Charlie Neal singled in the seventh inning with one out. The Dodgers scored three runs in the ninth on home runs by catcher Joe Pignatano, his second, and Duke Snider, his fifth. The Phillies scored in the first inning on a three-run homer by Stan Lopata. MILWAUKEE (AP) — Tony Taylor's first major league home run, a ninth-inning, tie-breaking blast, and the fourth of the game by Chicago batters, carried the Cubs to a 5-4 victory Thursday night over the National League's first place Milwaukee Braves.

All four of the Chicago homers came off Milwaukee starter Warren Spahn who was charged with his fourth defeat against eight victories. Walt Moryn belted a pair of the Chicago homers and Al Dark the other. Spahn led the Braves at the plate with a two-run homer, his first of the year, before he was replaced by Bob Trowbridge in the ninth. LeW Burdette, the 1957 world series hero and the man who almost single-handedly beat Casey Stengel's New York Yankees, has finally gone a complete game for manager Fred Haney. He hurled the world champions to a 6-3 verdict over the bothersome Chicago Cubs at County Stadium, Milwaukee Tuesday night. For Lew it was only his second complete game in ten starts and it must have been a most welcome victory for both Burdette and the Braves. Milwaukee will certainly need the pitching craft of Burdette to get them home in front in the 1958 National League pennant race. His teammate Bob Buhl is a big question mark, so Lew may need to shoulder more of the load than ever. But perhaps Lew has found himself. He was no ball of fire against the Cubs but he did hold them to three runs, much better than most of his recent performances. One way of viewing the situation is this: Braves are still leading the league race with not too much help from Burdette. Perhaps with Lew performing in proper fashion Milwaukee can walk away from the other teams who are pennant conscious. Well, See.

This is National Water Safety Week—a week set apart to impress the public with facts to ensure safe swimming and safe boating. Especially in July and August the water is a delightful playground for thousands of our citizens. It should be kept just that and not turned into a graveyard. Every year lives are lost in swimming and boating accidents that should have not occurred. Most of these are the result of safety giving way to carelessness. We feel that no matter what we discuss in this column is as important as the matter of enjoying our beautiful beaches and rivers in a sane and sensible manner. For that reason we list for your most serious consideration the following safety rules for swimming and boating.

- 1-Don't swim alone. 2-Don't swim at unsupervised swimming places. 3-Don't dive into unknown water. Rocks and branches may be hidden. 4-Don't swim after eating. Wait at least two hours. 5-Don't swim when overheated. Cool off gradually first. 6-Don't swim parallel to the shore. 7-Don't swim until you become exhausted particularly if the water be cold. 8-Don't swim after dark unless thoroughly familiar with the swimming area. Know it is safe, and make sure you are accompanied by a "buddy". Stay close to shore. 10-Don't panic if you should get into difficulties. You must think clearly if you are to do the right thing. 11-Don't duck or push bathers into water. Playfulness may cost a life. That's the advice to the swimmers. Here are some valuable pointers for those who use boats. 1-Don't go out in a small boat unless you are a swimmer or wearing a life preserver. 2-Don't overload any boat, large or small. 3-Don't use any boat that is not completely seaworthy. 4-Don't go out in a boat in stormy weather. 5-Don't stand up in a boat or canoe. Learn to handle watercraft. 6-Don't change places in a small boat. 7-Don't leave the boat if it capsizes. Cling to it until rescued. 8-Don't attempt to swim to shore. 9-Don't shoot rapids. 10-Don't use home-made rafts or logs as boats. If swimmers and boaters would follow the rules set out above, then the summer holidays would not be marred by many unnecessary fatalities. Let's all be obedient.

Yankees co-owner Del Webb thinks all this time about the Yankees making a runaway of the American League pennant race is a whole lot of nonsense. Del says the Bombers will leave nothing undone in order to repeat as pennant winners but he feels it's much too early to start conceding the flag to Casey Stengel. Mantle Admits Pain In Shoulder

CLEVELAND (AP) — Mickey Mantle finally admitted Thursday there is pain in his right shoulder but insisted he doesn't want to come out of the New York Yankee lineup. Manager Casey Stengel doesn't want to take his star centre fielder out of the lineup, either, but he indicated he may have to. "I have a catch in the shoulder which doesn't let me take my regular cut at the ball swinging left handed," Mantle said. "But there isn't enough pain there to be the reason for my batting slump. I'm just not hitting, that's all." Stengel said Mantle took an x-ray treatment in New York last Monday, another here Wednesday and that Mickey would have a third and final of the series of penetrating beams on Friday in Detroit. Before Thursday, Mantle was batting .476 righthanded and .228 left handed. A year ago he averaged .342 left handed with 26 home runs and .414 right handed with eight home runs. His present homer output is eight left and four right. Mantle suffered the injury in the third game of the 1957 World Series.

Bolt Takes Lead In Flint Open

FLINT, Mich. (AP) — Tommy Bolt defied the letdown that often plagues a U.S. National Open champion and fired a three-under-par 69 that stood up Thursday for the first - round lead in the \$62,000 Flint Open golf tournament. Bolt captured a one-stroke lead over Bill Casper Jr. of Apple Valley, Calif. Casper missed a three-foot putt on the 18th green and lost his chance for a tie. Toronto's Al Balding had a first-round score of 34-38-72, three off Bolt's pace. The monstrous Warwick Hills course at nearby Grand Blanc took a heavy toll as a field of 140 golfers teed off in quest of the \$9,000 top money. Only 15 were able to match or better par of 36-36-72 over the sprawling layout that measures 7,280 yards.

Former Riding Champ Fatally Injured In Race

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) — Jackie Westrope died of injuries Thursday night, two hours after he was thrown from his mount in the feature race at Hollywood Park. Westrope, 40-year-old former national riding champion, was thrown from Well Away when she hit the rail while moving into the lead of the \$23,500 Hollywood Oaks. He landed on the inner guard rail on his side and back. He was taken to hospital unconscious. A physician said many of his bones were fractured and he was in deep shock. He died at the hospital at 7:15 p.m.—two hours after the start of the seventh race in which he was injured. An autopsy will be conducted to determine the cause of death. Westrope's injuries included fractures of the shoulder, arm, elbow and ribs, plus undisclosed internal injuries.

Won Ascot Gold Cup

ASCOT, England (AP)—Gladness, a five-year-old mare, won the Ascot Gold Cup for Ireland Thursday. It was the first time an Irish contender had won the major race at the Royal Ascot meeting. Gladness, the only mare in the field of eight runners, was a joint 3-to-1 betting favorite with Scot II, a French contender who finished fourth.
