U.S. And Russia Clash Over News Reporting

PARIS, Feb. 5.—(Reuters)—Russia clashed with the United States today at the first meeting of the new United Nations commission set up to hammer out agreement on ways and means of atomic disarmament.

The clash came over the question of news reporting at the commission's future meetings. U. S. delegate Ernest Gross supported a Dutch suggestion that most of the sessions should be closed to the press. Britain and France joined him.

Russia's Jakob Malik said the meetings should be open. He contended that if the meetings were closed, U. S. delegates would give slanted reports of what happened. The commission solved the problem by leaving the matter up to the discretion of members.
