Reassure Egypt
ROME, April 7.—(A. Italian troops recently reached the Lake Tana area, where are the headwaters of the Blue Nile, furnishing much of the water supply for the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan and Egypt.

reconcile Franco-British differences over the treatment of Germany and Italy. Flaminio, with a French plan to "punish" Germany in his pocket met Eden at the Geneva train and was said to have insisted that sanctions against Italy must be abolished or imposed upon Germany. Officials here, however, expressed belief Eden would seek to increase pressure against Italy. He continued on to Geneva, where the League committee of 13 is to resume consideration of the Italo-Ethiopian war.

The survey of the condition of the teeth of the school children conducted by the Department of Health in co-operation with the Charlottetown Dental Association has been completed in West Kent, Queen Square, Model and Notre Dame, there being only Prince Street School left to be done following the Easter holidays. The examining dentists were Drs. Allen, Blanchard, Dougan, Corrigan, Miller, McGuigan, McIntyre, Reid, Robbins, and Waye. They report some slight improvement in mouth conditions since the survey made a year ago but consider it deplorable the way in which permanent teeth in young children are being lost through decay due to neglect of early attention.

By Guardian's Special Wire) CALGARY, April 7.—Farmers of Alberta today faced the prospect of a late seeding season, possibly the latest in 10 years, particularly in Central and Northern Alberta, according to a survey made by local agriculturists. Snow still covers the ground in many areas. There need be no great apprehension yet, however, regarding the possible crop yield, they said.

Malone Guilty Of Theft Charges

Willis and Co., Ltd., and manager of their Campbellton, N. B., office was found guilty on nine of 15 counts charging theft of stocks belonging to clients by converting them to his own use or that of the firm. He will be sentenced tomorrow.

To Study Plight Of Young Canadians

OTTAWA, April 7.—One of the duties of the proposed National Employment Commission will be to study the plight of young Canadians, jobless as a result of the long depression. This information was disclosed to the House of Commons today by labor minister Rogers, replying to J. P. Pouliot (Lib. Temiscouata). A committee of the commission will be appointed to draft special provisions for youth.

Off to Siberia to Study Sun's Eclipse

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CAMBRIDGE, Mass., April 7.—A party of 20 scientists, bound for Siberia, hurried final tests today of the battery of giant spectographs with which they plan to study the chemical composition of the sun's outer atmosphere during a solar eclipse June 16. The expedition, arranged by Harvard University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, will establish a camp near Ak-Bulak in the Ural mountains 150 miles north of the Caspian Sea. The eclipse will not be visible in the western hemisphere.

Saint John Police Chief Dismissed

Guard Export Cattle Against Warble Fly

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 7.—Cattle exported from Canada to England, Wales and Scotland between March 15 and June 30 each year must be treated with a preparation which will reduce the hazard of introducing the warble fly, according to an announcement issued here today by the Department of Agriculture.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) QUEBEC, April 7.—Story of an unsuccessful race against death by the government icebreaker N. B. McLean as the vessel attempted to convey a sick woman from her isolated island home to hospital was unfolded today by the Department of Marine.

Icebreaker Loses Race With Death

The woman, Mrs. J. H. Leslisle, was taken aboard when the icebreaker put into port at South Point, a tiny village on Anticosti Island, to be placed in hospital at one of the places touched by the McLean. Despite careful attention of the captain and crew the ill passenger died yesterday. But the vessel is still plowing its way slowly upstream somewhere down the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the body will be landed at the nearest point of call.
