FIRE AT MONCTON.—The dwelling house of Mr. H. O. Waldman, Luz Street, Moncton, was destroyed by fire at five o'clock on Saturday morning. The fire caught about the fire on the second floor. Mr. Waldman was about half past four, and after starting a fire went back to bed. Shortly afterwards the fire was discovered. Nearly all the furniture was saved.

VALUABLE COAL FIELDS.—Prof. St. John, of the geological survey, reports that there exists in Crow's Nest Pass, in the Rockies, 144 square miles of coal fields. He estimates that 25,000,000 tons are available in each mile and says the fields are destined to be the most valuable and productive in the Dominion.

FIREMEN RESIGN.—There is trouble in the Moncton fire department. The City Council recently passed an amendment to the fire by-law vesting the sole power of the appointment to the department in the Council, and as a result of the appointments at the last meeting of the Council No. 3 fire company resigned in a body. The Council acted promptly in the matter by accepting the resignations, and appointing men to their places next afternoon.

WHO IS SHE?—A Boston correspondent of the St. John Sun writes: "An Island woman with two small children figured in the divorce proceedings here a day or two ago. The woman who sought for a separation from her husband was Mrs. Mary E. Graham, of Charlottetown, and she was married to James R. Graham at that town five years ago. James departed last over three years ago and she has been living in hard straits ever since. The separation was granted."

ADULTERATED COFFEE.—According to an Ottawa despatch a bulletin issued by the Inland Revenue Department shows that of fourteen samples of coffee obtained at Halifax for analysis, every one was adulterated. At Truro, Dorchester, Seckville, Amherst, St. John, Sussex and Hampton, when the samples varied, some pure, others adulterated. Moncton has the best record, all its samples being genuine.

HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.—The annual report of the trustees and medical superintendent of the Hospital for the Insane was handed THE EXAMINER on Saturday. The report of the medical superintendent shows that during the past year there were 172 persons under treatment—85 males and 87 females. During the same period 28 have been discharged and 7 have died, leaving a total of 137 there now. Of these 22 have been residents of the institution less than one year, and the others for periods varying from one to thirty-nine years. The result of the year's work, the superintendent says, has not been as satisfactory as might be desired. The percentage of recovery is not up to the mark this year, the percentage on admission being only 25.5. This, the superintendent thinks, is largely due to the fact that the medical officer lives at a distance from the Hospital. The plan of managing the Hospital without a resident physician has not proved at all a satisfactory one in any particular. With only a daily visit, it is utterly impossible to do justice to any acute case of disease, and it is from acute cases only that recoveries are attainable. "During the past year," adds the superintendent, "Mr. McFadden has continued to fill the office of supervisor faithfully and conscientiously, though the present method of conducting the Hospital throws much more responsibility upon his shoulders than he should be called upon to bear."

THE FISHERIES PROTECTION

A New Commander.

OTTAWA, May 9.

It has been decided that Wakeham shall be the commander of the protection fleet during the coming season. Commander Gordon's health is not such as to enable him to take active work at sea for the present; but irrespective of this fact, the Government has decided to retain his services at Ottawa for consultative purposes. Wakeham will be aboard the La Canadienne until about July first, when he will transfer to the Acadia. Lieutenant Spain will be the new sailing master of the Acadia, and reports for duty here tomorrow. Spain is, comparatively speaking, a young man, but has a splendid record in the navy, from which he retired four years ago. It is expected that the protection fleet will pay considerable attention to the Newfoundland vessels off Canada and Labrador this season, although the precise line of Government action is not yet announced. It is reported that Newfoundland vessels operating there will be required to take out license. Two hundred and eighty Newfoundland vessels fished in Canadian waters last year.

Fire at Fairville, N. B.

ST. JOHN, May 9.

Fire broke out at Fairville, opposite this city, yesterday noon. Three hours later a large part of the town was in ashes. Forty-two buildings were destroyed, and over fifty families are homeless. Among the buildings destroyed are the Methodist church, the Temperance Hall, Mealy's foundry, and Messie's carriage factory. The total loss is estimated at \$100,000, with \$30,000 covered by insurance.

Mercier Gone Up Spout.

QUEBEC, May 9.

Mercier is ruined financially as well as politically. His liabilities are said to be \$85,000, and an offer of fifty cents on the dollar has been made to his creditors, but refused.

Island Athlete Dead.

TORONTO, May 9.

Donald Cameron, a student of Queen's University, died last night of heart disease. He was one of the noted Cameron family, the athletes of Prince Edward Island, and was Queen's crack football player.

General Telegraphic News.

BOSTON, May 6.—The question as to whether or not two Chinamen who were brought here yesterday by the steamer Halifax and who have papers showing them to be naturalized subjects of Great Britain, shall be allowed to land, has not yet been decided. The commissioner of immigration and the customs officials have asked the United States District Attorney's opinion in the case and the matter is now being considered by that official.

BERLIN, May 6.—Eugene Wolff, special correspondent of the Berliner Tagblatt for the German colonies in Africa, telegraphs this evening that Arabs arriving at Zanzibar say that Dr. Emin is dead. The report lacks confirmation, although it was undoubtedly true, as Wolff telegraphed on May 3 that Dr. Emin was struck with small-pox, while following his advance force from Wadai to Bukoba.

MONTEAL, May 6.—Fire took place tonight in the shed of the Hansa line wharf, where the outgoing and incoming cargo of the steamer Cremona, to the value of \$600,000, was destroyed. The ship caught fire but sustained no damage.

CAMPBELLTON, May 6.—A good deal of anxiety is felt over the exact condition of the steamer Miramichi which had arrived in Campbells Bay. Despatches say that Fraser's steamer St. Olaf will tow her to Summerside. The owners express the belief that the shaft has not been broken, although the following despatch indicates the contrary:

MIRAMICHI, P. Q., May 6.—The steamer Miramichi, with passengers and cargo for P. E. I. and Picton, was towed in here by the steamer Admiral, having been off Cape Rosier with broken shaft in a gale for about twenty-four hours. (Sgd) J. S. MAYO.

Mr. Mayo, who goes to the lower provinces in the interests of a beet root sugar company, was on board at the time of the accident.

BERLIN, May 6.—A general strike of colliers in Upper Silesia has been inaugurated. The condition of the inhabitants of these mining regions is pitiable. Many of the colliers have been shut down for some time; others have been reduced to such starvation rates that those who had work hardly considered themselves more fortunate than their unhappy brethren. It is feared that violence must grow from the situation as the destitute suffering are general, with no apparent prospect of a change for the better, while the socialists are actively sowing seeds of revolt among the unhappy population.

Mr. Norman Schurman, first of North Beauce, carried off the first first workmanship prize, and came out second in a class of 60, leading in German and in the workshops. He also stood second in the class of freehand drawing and third in descriptive geometry. Mr. Herbert Shaw, of Beckley Point, leads the second year students in the electrical and engineering course although only having been there one year. We also observe in the lists the names of Chas. H. B. Longworth and Walter M. Scot, of Charlottetown, and Michael E. Griffin, of Georgetown.—Pioneer.

A KINDLY WORD.—The Boston Traveller paid a compliment to the Canadian Government last week for their judicious treatment of the Indians. It says: "The total Indian population of Canada is 121,308. Many of the Canadian Indians own their own homesteads, farm their own lands and have become initiated into the mysteries of bank accounts. Of 13,420 children of school age, over 8,000 are in regular attendance upon school, and the most of those who are not in attendance are so situated because they are in provinces where there are inadequate school facilities. All this is in marked contrast to the state of Indian affairs this side the line. The Dominion Government has kept faith with the Indians, has observed its treaties. We have not. Here lies the difference."
