As for fibers, rayon is now so good that it competes with wool, since the synthetic weaves take better dyes than wool, are just as resilient and about as durable, can stand a terrific amount of wear and are easily treated with soil-resistant compounds. Some fibers, we are told, are actually soil-resistant.

Popular Cotton

Cotton is growing in popularity and is now available in most attractive rugs and carpeting, fine enough for any interior. Nylon is growing in popularity, and is said to be even more desirable, when mixed with rayon to give a better, thicker, more gleaming surface and pile.

As for wool, it is, of course, still in demand. Worst isn't much used anymore. Acknowledged as the most durable of all wool weaves, its high cost has priced it out of the carpet field. Apparently durability is no longer considered the main virtue in floor coverings. Texture, color, design originality—these are what today's shopper wants and gets.
