FRED. MORSE HEARD FROM.

He Will Race Again—Contest With Unsworth Recalled.

Fred Morse, well known in cycle-racing circles, has joined the Lake View club and may reconsider his determination to quit the path. He will probably commence training for the season in the course of a couple of weeks. His friends say that he has a severe attack of the racing fever.

Morse made his first appearance on the race track many miles away from Chicago. The interesting event took place in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, in the summer of 1894. In company with F. R. Hodgson, he was spending a vacation in that country. One evening the pair fell in with a crowd of cyclists and before long the conversation turned to the race meet which was scheduled to take place the approaching Saturday. One of the locals suggested that Morse should enter, as a rider from Chicago would be a great attraction. After a little coaxing the Chicago man consented to do so. The committee put up a prize for a match race between Morse and the local champion, named Unsworth.

Morse, on the day of the meet, was on hand ready to make his first appearance on any track in a half-mile race. When the time came he turned out in a pair of racing trunks which he had borrowed for the occasion, a white shirt and a pair of patent-leather shoes. When the pistol was fired Morse tried to lose his man at the start, but quickly discovered that he had caught a tartar, as Unsworth drew alongside of him without any apparent effort. Finding that he had a snap, Unsworth decided to have some fun at the Chicagoan's expense. At the last turn he looked round and made some jocular remark about his opponent to some friends. Morse noticed this and knew it was now or never for him, so he jumped and before Unsworth realized it he had opened a gap of about twenty feet. Riding for all that was in him, Morse approached the tape more dead than alive. Glancing under his arm, he could see the other fellow coming along like a whirlwind. The distance, however was too short and he landed a winner by a foot. Time, 1:13.15. He says that had he not caught Unsworth napping he could not have won. The latter was a fine rider as he entered in the twelve races that day and won them all. Morse thus became the "foreign" champion of Prince Edward Island. Four months after the race he received a gold medal, which he now wears on his watch-chain.

Morse afterwards entered in several local club races and won them all. His success gave him the idea that he could ride, so he entered in the racing game, with what success is well known.
