

# Appears Crofters Will Not Have To Move To Canada

LONDON (CP) — It looks as though the crofters of the Outer Hebrides won't have to pack up and go to Canada, after all.

Although the written verdict has yet to be disclosed, sittings of a Scottish court this week indicate that British officials have succeeded in persuading the inhabitants of South and North Uist that their ancient way of life won't be completely disrupted by guided missiles.

At a hearing Wednesday, counsel for the crofters said all the hubbub was partly a dalliance in public relations.

"All the crofters really wanted to know," said counsel, "was that

the scheme for a rocket range was essential and that they were not being deprived of their ancient rights to a greater degree than was necessary."

Protests arose from the British air ministry's plan for a rocket-launching station in South Uist, off the west coast of Scotland. At one point islanders threatened to emigrate to Canada if necessary to preserve a way of life going back some 1,500 years.

The Uists are Gaelic-speaking strongholds with distinctive traditions. The crofters make a comfortable life of isolated living collecting seaweed—the so-called "picking of the isles"—cutting peat, packing eggs and farming. Rev.

John Morrison, a Roman Catholic priest, said recently the crofters have "many friends" in Canada. They had a "secret plan" for migrating to Newfoundland, British Columbia or Alberta.

During the hearings Lord Gibson, court chairman, suggested that spirits who were not brave enough to go to Canada might find refuge nearer home on the deserted islet of Heisker, which he suggested should be renamed Honeymoon Island.

History is fairly rich in examples of Uist migration to Canada. In 1772 a ship arrived in Scotland, P.E.I., with 210 immigrants mostly from South Uist. Others arrived in the Maritime provinces in 1838, 1840 and 1848.

## Swiss Seeks Legendary Huge Wild Men Of Cdn. Mountains

VANCOUVER (CP) — Raised eyebrows, knowing smiles and even open derision have not discouraged a young Swiss mountaineer from his plans to look for a "lost" race in western Canada.

Rene Dahinden, 26-year-old immigrant, says he has no doubt the wild men of the mountains, the legendary Sasquatch, still rove the wilderness in a primitive state.

To prove his theory the young mountaineer and amateur anthropologist plans an expedition this spring. His sights are set on the Harrison Lake hinterland. Although it's only about 80 miles northeast of Vancouver, most of the recent leads point to this jungle of forest, canyons and towering peaks as the lair of the fabled "hairy giants."

"Wouldn't it be fabulous to produce a completely primitive race living right in our midst," he said in an interview.

REPORT MANY CLUES  
While scientists cough politely and the general public titters, Dahinden is quietly preparing for a journey in an aura of adventure, mystery and suspense.

"There is too much evidence of this creature to disregard it," he says.

"The Sasquatch is right at your door. He is a living being and I'm going to prove it."

To support his claims and beliefs, the young Swiss offered the result of two years of research into the background of the legendary race of powerful, wild giants of B.C. whom he describes as similar in appearance to the Abominable Snowman of the Himalayas.

In Canada for 3½ years, Dahinden first heard of the Sasquatch from a Calgary farmer. When he moved to Lumby, B.C., in the Okanagan Valley, Rene became seriously interested.

INDIAN LEGENDS  
The Indians of the area tell many legends and some claim actual experience. One such is Chief Pierre Louis of the Okanagan band, now about 80, who recalls that in his youth a woman from his tribe came upon a sleeping Sasquatch. He disappeared, but left his marks.

"I saw his footprints," the chief told Rene. "They were twice as big as a man's."

White men first came in contact with the hairy giant in the 1860's and a Hudson's Bay factor wrote of his encounter with a group of "huge wild men" along the Harrison River.

Chief August Jack of the Caplano Indians in Vancouver told Dahinden of the capture of a nine-foot-tall female Sasquatch in the late 1880's.

The old chief says he saw the creature in New Westminster where she was caged and exhibited "for 10 cents a peek."

The captive, says the chief, was taken to Victoria for exhibition but would not eat, and soon died. REPORTS PERSIST

Sasquatch sighting reports have continued since. Latest came from Stan Hunt, an auctioneer in Vernon, B.C., who claims he saw a group of Sasquatch on the highway along the Fraser on May 3, last year.

Probably the outstanding authority on the Sasquatch is the man who named them, a former teacher at the Chehalis Reserve school. J. W. Burns, now retired and living in San Francisco, told Dahinden he believes in the exist-

ence of the Sasquatch, meaning wild men, which he coined into Sasquatch.

Mr. Burns taught the Chehalis for 16 years, starting in 1925. The Sasquatch, he wrote to Dahinden, "are there."

"They do not use bows or arrows or other weapons. They hypnotize their game, such as deer and birds."

He said he himself has come across their footprints but has never seen the Sasquatch in real life.

Dahinden's appeal for support for his expedition has met with little enthusiasm. Even the Harrison Hot Springs village committee was divided when its members proposed to send Dahinden on a Sasquatch-hunting expedition as a B.C. centennial project for 1958.

Said one commissioner: "I have no intention of taking part in such a project which would be the laughing-stock of the country."

## WRONG KING

After giving some historical details of the Babylonians which are already known, the writer of this scroll mentions King Nabonidus as the last ruler of the Neo-Babylonian dynasty and talks of his sojourn of between seven and eight years at the oasis of Tiema, in northern Arabia.

## Scrolls Indicate Error In Old Testament Text

JERUSALEM (Reuters) — The Dead Sea scrolls found in the Qumran region of the Judean wilderness point to an error in the Old Testament of the Bible.

It concerns King Nebuchadnezzar, the Babylonian ruler who, according to the book of Daniel, went mad for seven years and lived like an animal in the wilderness.

M. Milik, dean of the team of eight international scholars who are preparing to publish translations of the scrolls in various languages, says that one small Aramaic scroll, entitled The Prayer of Nabonidus, reveals the probable biblical error.

There is also a scroll known as the Rule of War, which describes the war between the "children of light and the children of darkness," or the Apocalyptic War. Other small manuscripts contain commentaries on various books of the Old Testament of the Bible.

All the discoveries of Qumran, Father Milik added, dated back to the first century B.C. and to the first century A.D.

The scrolls, which were kept for four months in a safe at the Ottoman Bank in Amman, were re-

stored to the Palestine Archaeological Museum in Jerusalem last March 4 to enable the team of eight international scholars to complete their studies and interpretations and prepare the documents for publication.

The whole of the material is to be published in about 10 volumes by the Oxford University Press in various languages.

The manuscripts are essential to the study of the Old Testament, Father Milik said. The oldest manuscripts of the Hebrew bible date back to the ninth or 10th century A.D. These scrolls are about 1,000 years earlier.

"The 11 caves contained fragments of 600 scrolls. One-quarter of them are biblical, and most of the rest are apocrypha, like the book of Tobit; Pseudepigrapha, like the book of Jubilees of Enoch; or sectarian including the Manual of Discipline, a book which explains the rules followed by the Essenes in the wilderness.
