As preparations were being made across the island for today is Remembrance Day observances, messages in keeping with the occasion were issued by the presidents of the Summerside and Charlottetown branches of the Canadian Legion.

"On November 11," observed S. W. Leard, Charlottetown president, "the face of nature is sad and the dull chill of nature fills the air with Remembrance of the dead and Armistice Day. But death is not sad and we should rejoice in the 'spirit of the dead,' the men and women of the navy, army and air force who gave their lives for Canada in both World Wars."

This centre is expected to open in the near future she added. At this meeting four new members were welcomed and introduced into the League.

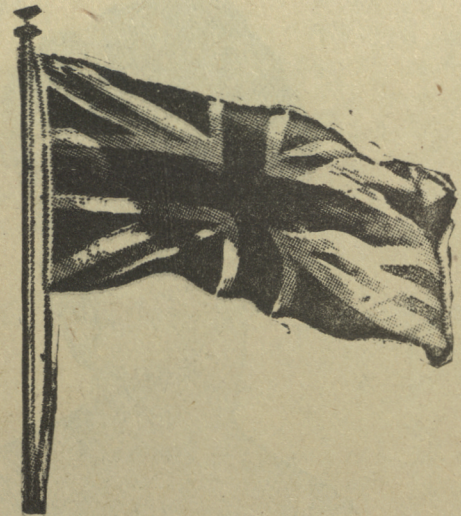
