### PC \$100 Pension Promise Is Described As Deception

ELLIOT LAKE, Ont. (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson said here Canadians are being deceived when they are told that the old-age pension can be raised to \$100 from \$75 a month at once out of contributions to the Canada Pension Plan.  
He told a crowd of about 600 in the community hall of this uranium town in his home riding of Algoma East that no contributions can be taken out of the pension fund without the consent of the provinces.  
"I say it can't be done," Mr. Pearson said during a 40-minute speech.  
He made no direct reference to the Conservatives or to Opposition Leader Diefenbaker. The Conservative leader has advocated a \$100-a-month pension at age 60 to be paid out of the pension fund which begins receiving contributions from wage-earners next Jan. 1.  
PLAN SAID BEST  
Mr. Pearson said the Liberal plan of paying supplementary pensions on the basis of need is the best and fairest way of dealing with the matter.  
In this town where the number of producing uranium mines has dropped to two from 11, the prime minister said the uranium industry will be in a far better position at the end of the government's five-year stockpiling program.  
"You will be able to go ahead," he said.  
He said the government has by no means given up hope that it can conclude successfully an agreement with France for a uranium sale.  
He added:  
"But to do this we must reconcile our international obligations not to sell uranium on conditions which assure that the spread of nuclear weapons is not facilitated.  
"We must reconcile this obligation with our policy of building up markets for uranium for peaceful purposes in France and in other friendly countries."  
"I certainly haven't given up on this."  
SEES BRIGHT FUTURE  
Later he said, "the future of uranium looks bright."  
Dealing with another resource, Mr. Pearson said there will not be any sale of Canadian water to the United States in the immediate future.  
"It may be that, in the long-range future, a surplus of Canadian water resources will enable us to do some negotiating for export with our neighbors, to the advantage of Canada."  
Mr. Pearson mentioned that he was first elected to Parliament exactly 17 years ago—on Oct. 25, 1948.  
He said this is his eighth campaign and that he has never had the same opponent twice.  
He said he knew about as much about Algoma East in 1948 as his present Conservative opponent, Joel Airdred, does now.  
Mr. Pearson said there must be a strong central government to carry on negotiations with the provinces. This was not easy when the government party was weak in Parliament. This was one of the reasons why a majority government was required.  
He also said Canada is "one political state, one nation in the political sense."

### OLD MEMBERS DON'T FADE AWAY

## Paul Martin Has Been MP Since Election In 1935

OTTAWA (CP)—Some old politicians don't even fade away.  
Thirty years ago in a federal election Oct. 14, 1935, Canadian voters sent 141 new members to the 245-seat House of Commons. One of them can claim continuous 30-year membership in the Commons—Paul Martin, external affairs minister, now 68.  
He has achieved nine consecutive election victories for the Liberals in Essex East, the Windsor area of Ontario and now is aiming at his 10th.  
Next in line in point of Commons service is Howard Green, former Conservative external affairs minister, trying for a comeback in Vancouver Quadra where he was defeated in 1961.  
Mr. Green, who will be 70 Nov. 5, entered the Commons in Vancouver South in 1935 and was re-elected in 1940 and 1945. In 1949 he shifted to the new seat of Vancouver Quadra and held it until 1963.  
The third active member of the class of 1935 is also seeking election in B.C.—61-year-old T. C. Douglas, leader of the New Democratic Party, up for re-election in Burnaby-Coquitlam where he was first elected in a 1962 byelection and was re-elected in 1963.  
One NDP candidate, 57-year-old Stanley Knowles in Winnipeg North Centre, preceded the 20-year veterans from 1945 into the Commons. Richard, 58, running for the eighth time in Ottawa East.  
The NDP candidate in H. W. (Bert) Herridge, a 69th time candidate for the Commons for 20 years. He was elected in Kootenay West in B.C. in 1945 as an independent OCF, was a straight OCF candidate from 1949 to 1958 and ran as NDP in 1962 and 1963.  
One NDP candidate, 57-year-old Stanley Knowles in Winnipeg North Centre, preceded the 20-year veterans from 1945 into the Commons. He was first elected in a by-election Nov. 30, 1942, for the OCF, taking the seat left vacant by the death of J. S. Woodsworth, father of the Canadian socialist party.  
BUT Mr. Knowles, acknowledged expert on Commons rules, was defeated in the 1963 Conservative sweep and was out of the Commons from then until he returned in 1962.  
Two others who got their Commons start in 1945, but lack continuous service, are also in the election fight.  
One is David Fulton, 49, seeking a Commons comeback as Conservative candidate in Kamloops. Former holder of the justice and public works portfolios, he left the federal scene in 1958 to lead the B.C. Conservative party.  
The other is J. Watson MacNaught, 61, Liberal minister of mines who is running in Prince P.E.I., which he first won in 1945 and held until defeated in 1957. He returned with a victory in the 1963 election.  
Next in line is Prime Minister Pearson, 68, who became MP for Algoma East in a 1948 byelection and has held it ever since.

### Exchange Seat Cost Has Risen

NEW YORK (AP)—The cost of a seat on the New York Stock Exchange has risen to \$240,000—the highest level since 1953.  
Members say the high price is related to the stepped-up volume of trading on the exchange this year. Since most members are brokers who garner profits from stock turnover, increased volume means more profits from each exchange seat.  
The latest high level was reached in the sale of a seat Monday. The price was up \$5,000 from the previous sale last Friday.  
Volume on the exchange so far this year is 1,188,909,000 shares, up 16.6 per cent from the comparable 1964 period.  
Meanwhile, on the American Stock Exchange, a seat changed hands Monday for \$63,000, up \$1,000 from the previous sale and the highest level since late 1963.  
American exchange volume through Monday was 377,175,291 shares, up 26 per cent from the 1964 level. The entire 1964 turnover was 374,189,892 shares.  
The higher prices for stock exchange seats also is true for most other exchanges in the U.S.  
PLAN REHABILITATION  
OTTAWA (CP)—Dr. Gustave Gingras of Montreal, an expert in rehabilitation services, has returned from Viet Nam where he made a study for the external aid office on the possibility of establishing a rehabilitation centre in Saigon. The centre, which would include a school, would be for crippled children.  
MOTHER HONORED  
SIMCOE, Ont. (CP)—Mrs. Norah Wagner, a Peterborough, Ont., mother who lost three sons in the Second World War, has been chosen Canada's Remembrance Day Mother. She will place a wreath for Canadian mothers at the National War Memorial in Nov. 11 ceremonies in Ottawa.
