More than 19,000 fans saw Stampede take their commanding lead in the two-game, two-point series. The second game will be played tonight at Regina.

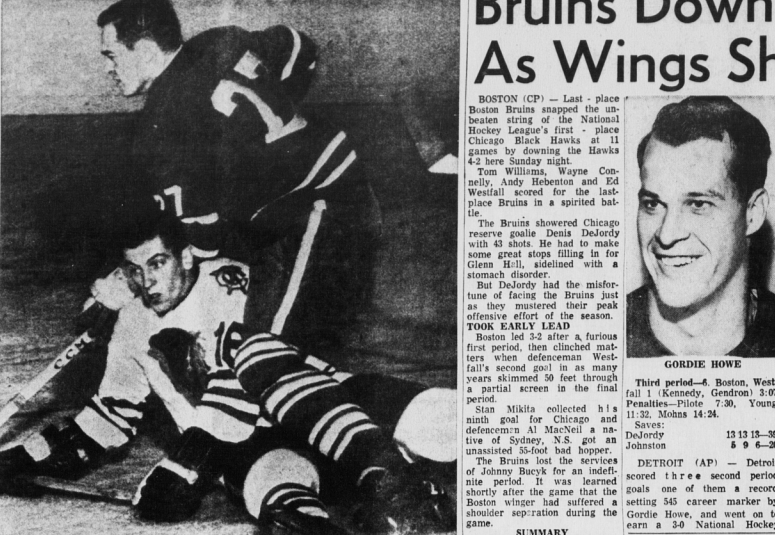

# Race Rules To Be Changed Following New York Riot

WESTBURY, N.Y. (AP)—In the wake of a riot at the worst in harness racing history, president Alvin Weil of Roosevelt Raceway said Saturday he will recommend a change in the rules to protect bettors in the event that half the horses in a race are involved in a spill.

Rioting erupted Friday night after six of the eight horses in the sixth race at Roosevelt went down. Only two finished in what then became an official race.

Conrad Rothengast, head of the track's police, collapsed and was treated for injuries and released.

Police said 15 people were arrested on various charges, including two for malicious mischief. There was no official estimate of the damage but unofficial guesses put it as high as \$100,000.

P.L.L. DRIVER HURT  
One race driver involved in the mass pileup, Joseph McAluff of Prince Edward Island, suffered cuts and bruises and was kept in hospital for observation.

Well said he would recommend a rule change to the New York State Harness Racing Commission to give someone in authority the power to call off a race before its conclusion if 50 per cent or more of the starting horses don't finish.

Commission Chairman Robert A. Glasser said tracks should have power to declare an automatic "no contest" in such an event.

BOSTON (CP)—Last place Boston Bruins snapped the unbeaten string of the National Hockey League's first place Chicago Black Hawks at 11 games by downing the Hawks 4-2 here Sunday night.

ANTIGNONISH, N.S. (CP)—St. Francis Xavier University chucked up their seventh consecutive win of the season Saturday, by stymieing a 3-0 trouncing of St. Dunstan's in an Atlantic Football Conference fixture at Memorial Field here.

Playing on a mud-soaked gridiron, the vaunted Xavier offensive unit exploded for 19 points in the first quarter, added two touchdowns in the second quarter, then coasted the rest of the way for victory. High winds and heavy rains limited the passing attack of St. FX, so quarterback Roger Sevigny kept the ball on the ground, alternately using Eddie Amoral on wide sweeps and Dick Moly on inside line rushing plays, to set up the five St. FX majors.
