DEAR C. C.: As I get the picture, this bachelor is coming of age about 30 years behind normal schedule.

It would have been more "proper and fitting" of him to fix his mind and heart on a lady of his choice around his 12th birthday, or thereabouts, and firmly close his ears to family objections, if any, on that score.

As it is, he apparently has waited until late middle age, to begin to find his way out of the bog of adolescent timidities, concerning sex and such.

Evidently he sees in the widow a maturely formed, self-possessed, worldly wise woman who, in his way of thinking, has all the strength, warmth, consistency, character, dependability and congeniality that he once imputed to his Mom - plus a lot more going for her (the widow), too, in the way of sweetheart charm and promise.

In my view, you, the family, lack justification for butting in, solicitously. Proof Of Fig Popularity Is In Steamed Pudding

BY IDA BAILEY ALLEN At this season, beautiful foods converge on our test-kitchen. This morning brought a large box of exquisite tinned figs, California dried figs, peaches and moist. They can be a delightful dessert as is, plain, or served with the new less-fat Neuchâtel cheese; or cut in dice and combined with whole or halved orange sections.

Added Advantage There is another advantage. The sweetness of figs is due to the natural fruit sugar which is quickly assimilated by the body. This is why a fig, slowly eaten, and well masticated gives a quick lift.

I am planning to use some to make a steamed fig pudding, a favorite holiday dessert in California. Made now, the pudding can be frozen until Christmas. To make two puddings calls for little more work. Just double the recipe, and use the extra pudding for a holiday gift. Include a half-pint jar of Hard Sauce, and write directions for reheating the pudding on the gift-card.

Measurements in 1 STEAMED FIG PUDDING CALIFORNIA 1 1/2 c. California dried figs 1 c. walnut meats 1-3 c. shortening 1 c. packed brown sugar 2 eggs 2 1/2 c. sifted enriched flour 1 tsp. salt 1 tsp. baking soda 2 tsp. double-acting baking powder 1 c. cinnamon 1 c. milk 1 tsp. vanilla 1 tsp. grated orange rind

Strip off the stems and coarse-chop the figs. Clean the walnut meats and put aside. Smooth-mix together the shortening and brown sugar. Beat in the 2 eggs, singly.

Sift together the flour, salt, baking soda, baking powder, and cinnamon. Blend alternately with the milk into the first mixture, along with the vanilla and orange rind. Fold in the chopped figs and walnut meats.

Turn into an oiled 2-qt. mold or a dozen miniature molds. Cover snugly with a lid or aluminum foil. Place on a rack in a kettle. Add boiling water to half the depth of the mold. Cover. Steam steadily, 2 hr. for the large mold, 1 hr. for the miniatures. If necessary add more boiling water.

Unmold. Serve warm with Orange Hard Sauce. Serves 8 to 12.
