The rest of the day was spent in Committee on the Bill to further amend the Road Compensation Act. The Chairman reported progress, and obtained leave to sit again on Monday.

MONDAY, January 31.

The Order of the Day, for the House in Committee to consider the expediency of establishing a Copper Currency, being read;

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee. After some time spent therein, the Committee rose, and the Chairman (Mr. D. Macdonald), reported a Resolution, to the effect that the subject be referred to a Special Committee, for consideration, with power to report by Bill or otherwise.

On the motion for receiving the Report, Mr. D. Macdonald spoke against the measure, as being uncalculated for; it was, however, agreed to, without a division, and Messrs. Thomson, Longworth, Maclean, J. S. Macdonald and Clark were appointed a Committee accordingly.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by George Wright, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod.

Mr. Speaker; His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker, with the House, went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber:

And being returned—Mr. Speaker informed the House, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency had, in Her Majesty's name, been pleased to give His assent to the following Bill, viz:

An Act to confirm and render valid certain proceedings of the Executive Government of this Island.

A Message was received from the Lieutenant Governor, transmitting a number of Despatches and Orders in Council, leaving Acts passed last Session to their operation, all of which, we believe, have been published, with the exception of one relating to Crown Lands, which we intend to insert in an early number.

The House went into Committee on the Bill to amend the Road Compensation Act, which was amended, and ordered to be engrossed.

TUESDAY, February 1.

On the motion of the Hon. J. S. Macdonald, it was Resolved, "that a Supply be granted to Her Majesty." After some routine business had been gone through, the House adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, February 2.

The Bill to amend the Road Compensation Act was read the third time, passed, and sent to the Council.

Mr. Palmer, in his place, presented the Impost Accounts for Charlottetown. On examination, they exhibited a falling off in the Revenue, for this District alone, of nearly Two thousand Pounds, compared with the year previous.

Mr. Palmer reported a Bill to continue and amend the Act for the regulation of the Public Wharf at Charlottetown. Second reading to-morrow.

A Message was received from the Legislative Council, praying that the House would grant leave to the Honorable J. S. Macdonald and Joseph Pope, and William Dingwell, Esq. three of its members, to attend a Special Committee of the Legislative Council, to be examined on the state of the Central Academy, and upon education in general.—Leave granted.

The Legislative Council and Assembly having agreed upon a Joint Address to the Queen, congratulating Her Majesty upon the birth of an Heir apparent to the Crown, and upon Her Majesty's restoration to health, a Committee of both Houses waited this day upon the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency would be pleased to transmit the same, which he said he would have much pleasure in doing. The Address is as follows:—

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

Most Gracious Sovereign; We your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council and Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in General Assembly convened, humbly approach the Throne with sentiments of the most sincere and affectionate attachment to your Majesty's Person, to offer to your Majesty our congratulations upon the birth of a Royal Prince, and Her apparent to the Throne of these realms—and upon your Majesty's restoration to health.

We beg to assure your Majesty, that in no portion of your extensive dominions has this auspicious event diffused more heart-felt joy and gratitude than among your Majesty's devoted subjects the inhabitants of Prince Edward Island; as it has afforded them the additional security of perpetuating the succession to the Crown in the immediate line of your Majesty's illustrious Parent, whose memory is deeply and deservedly cherished as the revered Patron of our soil, and a further guarantee for the rights and liberties of your Majesty's faithful subjects.

We trust that the Almighty disposer of events will continue to bless your Majesty, your Royal Consort and your Royal offspring with every happiness; and that at a very distant period, the Sceptre may descend to your Royal Son; and that he may possess those great and noble qualities which have so eminently adorned your Majesty's illustrious race, is our united and fervent prayer.

THURSDAY, February 3, 1842.

Mr. Thomson, from the Committee appointed to consider the expediency of issuing a Copper coinage in this Island, reported a Bill for that purpose.—Second reading to-morrow.

Mr. Thomson, by leave, introduced a Bill to impose a certain rate for the use of Stalls in the Charlottetown Market-house.—Second reading to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Fraser, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole, on the State of the Colony. The first subject entered upon was that part of the Governor's speech at the opening of the Session which relates to the proposed Lunatic Asylum. The prevalent opinion seems to be, that the annual expense of maintaining such an Institution would greatly exceed any advantages that could be expected to be derived from it, or that the present state of the finances of the Colony could afford it. It was resolved, however, to appoint a Committee of five Members, to endeavor to ascertain the probable annual expense of maintaining such an Institution—when the Committee rose, the Chairman reported progress, and obtained leave to sit again.

The Charlottetown Wharf Bill was read a second time, committed, and ordered to be engrossed. The Bill confers some additional powers on the Wharfinger, as to enabling him to cause vessels to be shifted from one position to another, as he may see necessary; it also increases the rates of wharfage.

FRIDAY, February 4.

The Hon. Mr. Pope introduced a Bill to explain and amend the Trespass Act. It would appear, that doubts had arisen as to the meaning of the term "wilfully and maliciously," which occurs in the said Act, the Supreme Court having decided, in a case of appeal, that a trespass must not only be "wilfully" but maliciously committed, in order to render offenders amenable to punishment. The intention of the present Bill is to remove any difficulty upon that score.

The Copper Currency Bill was read a second time, committed, and reported, with amendments. It empowers the Lieutenant Governor in Council to cause a coinage to be made for the use of the Island, and to draw upon the Treasury to the amount of One thousand Pounds, to defray the expense thereof; and that upon the said coins being put in circulation, proclamation is to be made prohibiting the importation or circulation of any base or spurious copper coin within the Island. The bill was ordered to be engrossed.

The House went into Committee on the Bill for regulating the letting of the Stalls in the Charlottetown Market House, when the several clauses were gone through, and with some amendments, agreed to. The bill provides that six stalls are to be set aside for butchers, and that these are to be let by auction, by the year, to the highest bidder—the upset price being Four pounds per annum each. The remainder of the Stalls are to be let by the day.

The Hon. J. S. Macdonald, by command of His Excellency, presented to the House a copy of the original plan of the Island, obtained from the Surveyor General's Office at Quebec, in compliance with the request of Sir Charles A. Fitz Roy, as desired

by the House at its last Session; also, a "Copy of the Field Book of Prince Edward Island," of record in the said office, and a description of the Island by the late Honorable Samuel Holland.

The Colonial Herald.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 5, 1842.

The Royal Mail Steam-boat BRITANNIA arrived at Halifax, from Liverpool, on the 20th ult., after a passage of 16 days; but the mail for this place only reached us on Saturday last. Our latest London dates are to the 3d January, and Liverpool to the 4th. The news, although not particularly important, is not devoid of interest, as will be found on reference to our extracts.

In our present number will be found a brief summary of the proceedings of the House of Assembly down to last evening. It will be seen that no measure of any very great public importance has yet been introduced. It is probable, that the Public Accounts and Estimates will be furnished in the course of a few days, when the House will be enabled to set to work in earnest; and it seems to be generally supposed that the session will not be greatly protracted. The Legislative Council have appointed a Committee to investigate, by evidence, into the state of the Central Academy, and Education in general.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.—The second reading of the Rev. J. Waddell's lecture on "Reciprocal Duties" took place last Wednesday evening, according to announcement. The Hon. George Dalrymple, V. P., in the chair. At the commencement, the Rev. Lecturer adverted to the novelty of his position—congratulated the Institute upon the taste and judgment displayed in the choice of a moral and practical subject for the first they had endorsed—and said he felt proud in being the first called to make a second appearance before them. In addition to the lecture, as formerly delivered we observed an anecdote or two illustrative of the utility of punctuality to tradesmen, and some very pointed remarks under the head of duties of subjects—upon the very careless manner in which the statute labour on the highways is often performed, as also upon the indifference of subjects generally to the obligations to enforce the due observance of the laws, when they know them to be violated, to the prejudice of the government under which they live. Some discussion followed the delivery of the lecture, which served to confirm the position assumed by the Lecturer.

P. E. ISLAND AUXILIARY TO THE NEW BRITISH AND FOREIGN TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.—The First Anniversary of this Society was held in the National School, on Monday evening last, the Rev. J. Waddell, President, in the chair.

The meeting having been opened, as usual, with prayer, and a short address from the chair, a Report of the proceedings of the Committee for the year was submitted, which, we regret, want of space will not allow us to insert in full.

After adverting to some of the difficulties with which they have had to contend, the Committee take notice, in their Report, of many cheering circumstances connected with the progress of the cause in the world, and within the sphere of their own operations. They notice, particularly, the freedom of access afforded them to the Court House, for their public meetings, and the favourable opinions expressed by persons in all classes of society relative to the value and importance of the principles they advocate and the conduct those principles inculcate. They advert especially, with much interest, to the testimony of the Hon. the Chief Justice in their favour, at the opening of the last Court, when, after congratulating the country upon the comparative absence of aggravated crime, he ascribes it, in a great measure, to the prevalence of Temperance operations. "The Committee do not arrogate to themselves, nor to their Society, all the credit that is due to human agency, under God, for this cheering declaration; but having been first in the field, and having long and steadily laboured in the service, they rejoice that their views have been adopted, and extensively and efficiently acted upon, by others, who have brought into the field more force and more harmonious and concentrated action, and given an impetus to the work at which every philanthropist must rejoice." They advert with much pleasure to the entertainment in the Central Academy, in June last, provided by several of the Ladies connected with the Society, which they say was conducted with so much taste and skill as to delight all who were present at it, and to realise to the funds, from the proceeds, a very handsome donation—and they do not hesitate to recommend that something of the kind (on a more extensive scale, if possible) be undertaken every year, for the double purpose of bringing the friends of the cause into more immediate concert, and for aiding their funds, which are so much in need of replenishing. Still, they see need for more and vigorous exertion, and are anxious to enlist new recruits in the important service. They have circulated a large number of copies of their Prize Essay, and have still a large stock on hand, for present and future distribution, and they call upon the friends of the cause to aid them in putting them into circulation, and to help to liquidate the debt incurred in their publication. They have distributed many tracts and papers, as well as advocated their principles in frequent public meetings. They have opened a correspondence with their Parent Society, in England, and made arrangements for a direct intercourse with kindred Societies in the United States of America, the cradle of Temperance operations; and they solicit the kind co-operation of all who value their country's good, in their efforts to promote that which tends so directly, so cheaply and so happily to the domestic and civil, moral and religious interests of the world.

The following Resolutions were severally put and carried:—

1. That the thanks of this Society be given to the publishers of the Royal Gazette and Colonial Herald, Newspapers, for their kindness in gratuitously publishing their notices and proceedings.

2. That means be adopted to extend the circulation of the Prize Essay, and to liquidate the debt incurred by its publication.

DIED.

On Thursday morning last, after a painful illness, which she bore with Christian fortitude and resignation, MARY CAMBRIDGE, the beloved wife of DANIEL HODGSON, Esquire, Her Majesty's Clerk of the Crown and Coroner of this Island, and daughter of the Honorable GEORGE WRIGHT, Her Majesty's Surveyor General of this Island, aged 26 years. Her funeral will take place from her husband's residence, to-morrow, at One o'clock, p. m. when the friends of the family are requested to attend.

At Brackley Point Road, on Thursday last, Mr. Charles Russell, for upwards of 60 years a teacher of youth in this Island, aged 88 years.

At his residence in Brighton, the Right Honorable John, Earl of Westmorland, aged 84 years.

The deceased lord was the college friend of Mr. Pitt, and his colleague in a long political career, during which he was a staunch and consistent Tory. He was the personal friend and steady adherent of George the Third, from the first period of his taking office on the question of the Regency, in 1789. The following year, his lordship became Viceroy of Ireland, where he remained five years. After his return to England, he was appointed Master of the Horse, and then Privy Seal, and held that office (we believe), for a longer succession of years than it was ever retained by any other nobleman. The Earl was also senior Knight of the Garter. His Lordship was twice married, first, to Sarah, daughter and heiress of Robert Child, Esq., of Osterly Park, distinguished as the head of one of the most ancient and extensive commercial establishments in this country. The great possessions of that family were inherited, according to the will of her grandfather, by the present Countess of Jersey. The Earl married, secondly, Jane, second daughter of Doctor Hicks Saunders, M. D., one of the most eminent and exemplary men of science of his day. Her ladyship and her sister (the late Viscountess Melville) were co-heiresses to their great uncle, Admiral Sir Charles Saunders, who commanded the naval operations as colleague of the great and lamented General Wolfe, when the combined forces achieved the conquest of Quebec, one of the most important and brilliant exploits, naval and military, which adorn the annals of the British Empire, and which, eventually, under the command of Lord Amherst, added to the crown of Great Britain the vast and splendid provinces of the Canadas, now become of such renewed and hopeful interest to this nation. The Earl of Westmorland succeeded in his titles and estates by his eldest son, Lord Burghersh, lately appointed British Minister at the Court of Berlin. His lordship is married to a daughter of Lord Maryborough, and niece to His Grace the Duke of Wellington; by this lady he has five children, now living, four sons and a daughter.

At Demerara, of Yellow Fever, the beloved Wife of Major P. D. Stewart, Royal Artillery, after an illness of ten days; she departed this life on the 22d September, 1841, leaving a large family to deplore her loss. She was a kind and affectionate mother, and a sincere friend to all who knew her. She is deeply lamented by her friends.—London Morning Herald, Dec. 7th.
