The youngest brother took up the market and placing it at his head gleefully said, "Shoot me." The brother pulled the trigger, and the fatal charge entered the boy's brain, killing him.

SEVERAL noblemen in England are in the habit of giving special orders to makers in Virginia for their supply of smoking tobacco. There is no doubt that by that means they obtain the very best tobacco to be had, but it cost them \$2 a pound. The working men of Canada are smoking the very same quality of tobacco at 60 cents a pound, and it is known to them as the Myrtle Navy.

SAYS the Truro Guardian: Engine No 9, driven by Henry McAulay, has been four years on the I. C. R. This engine has never broken down, never been off the track, never been repaired, nor has she drawn blood on a human being. The only case of injury done to any living thing was the

killing of two snakes, each three feet six inches long, at Elmedals tank, on the 5th of April, 1886. This is a good record.

WHILE two men—Matthew Redmond and Angus Gallant—were at work this afternoon shingling the latter's house on King Street, the scaffolding broke and both fell to the ground—a distance of about fifteen feet. Redmond fell on his head and a portion of the scaffolding fell on top of him, while Gallant fell on his left side over another part of the scaffold. Mr. Redmond's injuries consist of a bruise on the top of the head and a severe shaking up, and Mr. Gallant's left side is somewhat bruised.

At a recent meeting of the Montreal Branch of the National League, the following cables were ordered to be sent: "To the Right Hon. W. E. Gladstone. The Irish Land League in Montreal send you thanks for your pronouncement in favor of Home Rule, and wish you God speed, life and strength to carry the measure through." "To Charles Stewart Parnell: The Irish National League in Montreal extends its congratulations on this advance of the cause, and pledges you support till Ireland is free. We have already forwarded \$1,000 to the Parliamentary Fund, and send to-day another \$500."

YEAR by year the number of fires in the United States and Canada is steadily and without any apparent reason on the increase. While the fire waste in these two countries during the past ten years has in the month of March averaged a little over \$7,000,000, the total during the past month was \$10,650,000. For the first three months of this year the figures were \$20,150,000, against a total of \$27,500,000 for the same three months of 1885, which is at the rate of \$116,000,000 for the current year.

A MONTREAL despatch of the 12th says that the Minister of Customs agrees to accept \$6,000 in settlement of the Government claim against the insolvent estate of the absconding jeweller, C. T. Picard. An investigation showed that the Government had been victimized to the extent of \$21,000. Sandox & Co., of Switzerland, and a Montreal firm have agreed to pay half of the fine as they are implicated in the frauds. The former supplied fraudulent invoices, and in order to save their claim of \$9,000, consented to this. The settlement of the estate consisting of the stock seized by the Government valued at \$17,000, and \$6,000 of book debts have been sold, the stock at fifty and the book debts at twenty cents on the dollar.

Analogy of Electricity and Magnetism to Gravitation.

THIS was the subject of a lecture before the Literary and Scientific Society last evening, by Mr. Newson. He showed by experiments that electrified and magnetized bodies were not merely attracted but were also polarized. That though bodies influenced by either of those forces were attracted by the influencing body, yet the opposite sides were repelled, or the body became polarized. That the force varied inversely as the square of the distance. (This was illustrated by diagrams.) The lecturer then explained the different motions of the earth and moon. He had drawn a portion of the earth's orbit, representing the distance it travels over in one lunation, on a scale of 4 inches to 1,000,000 miles. By a most ingenious piece of mechanism the earth was represented as travelling in its orbit, and the moon describing her orbit round it, showing her different phases with the utmost precision and regularity. The moon's orbit in space forms two curves always more or less concave to the sun. One curve is within the other beyond the earth's orbit. The lecturer held that gravitation gave indication of a polarizing influence. He appeared to prove that tidal phenomena are unaccountable on the theory of attraction alone. That mere gravitation as generally held of sun and moon are incompetent to explain the existence of two simultaneous tides. The lecturer next traced the presence of a polarizing influence in the fact of comet tails being always turned away from the sun. He quoted the opinion of Sir John Herschell and others as showing the necessity of assuming a repulsive force to explain this phenomenon of all comets. The lecturer closed by remarking that all attractive elements capable of analysis were polaric and that gravitation manifested the same properties in a remarkable degree.

SIR,—I understand there are about one hundred drunkard factories in operation in this unfortunate city; and specimens of their manufacture can be seen at almost any hour staggering through the streets or being "convoiced" to their unhappy homes. May we not ask where are those whose duty it is to see the laws of the city enforced? Can all these city officials suppose for a moment that the law-abiding citizens view, but with deep dissatisfaction, their insincere mockery of carrying out the Scott Act. If they are not in sympathy with the rum-sellers, why so few convictions out of so many plain cases of illegal sale? Surely it would be much more honorable on their part, and a better performance of their duty, to fine the drunkard maker instead of so frequently fining and imprisoning the unfortunate drunkard.
