THE APPEAL TO THE PEOPLE.

On the 21st day of July, 1897, a little more than three years ago, the Government of the day returned to power, pledged to press for an arbitration of the claims of this Province against the Dominion Government, and holding out the expectation of obtaining a large amount of money,—thus avoiding taxation.

Now, nearly a year before their term of office will expire, they again appeal to the people,—though an arbitration has not been even attempted.

But it is a case of "needs must." The removal of Mr. Fred Peters and Mr. Prowse and the absence of the Hon. Benjamin Rogers leaves them in a minority of the Legislature,—even though they have gained Mr. Pineau, who was elected to oppose them.

In the meantime they have been guilty of a deliberate violation of constitutional principle and practice in the retention in office of the Attorney-General after a majority of his electors had voted him out of the Legislature; of having added to the debt and taxation of the people, of having squandered the people's money, of having neglected the enforcement of our laws, of having broken their promises.

In such circumstances, they have the hardihood to ask a renewal of the people's confidence, and have fixed upon Wednesday, the 12th day of December, as the date of the people's decision.

Now this is the People's business,—this is the People's battle; and it is for the People to say what the decision will be.

If the people should return a majority to support the Government they will, by that act, express approval of all that the Government has done and left undone, and will of course, in the future be served by their Government as they have been served in the past.

IS TEMPERANCE ON THE DECLINE?

To the Editor of the Guardian:

SIR,—Your editorial of this morning on prohibition indicates that you fancy public sentiment is healthy on the temperance question. I am afraid it is a false security. What are the facts? Take Prince County and you will find liquor sold freely at different points from end to end. In Summerside you will find open houses without any pretence at concealing their business, and here at Kensington we have six places selling, but not so openly. Take King's County and you will find that the business there warrants the Government in giving an offender against the C. T. A. a bonded warehouse for his own convenience, and that can be taken as a fair index of the sentiment of that County. If not, why is it tolerated? For Queen's county, Charlottetown supplies the country and drunkenness is on the increase everywhere.

I have been observing the drunkenness of Charlottetown and on the trains, and it is as bad and worse than the days of the old license law,—and whither we are going? Unless there is a change we are going back to the licensed tavern throughout the whole Island. You can meet scores of temperance people who have lost courage and freely say that the licensed tavern is preferable to the present state of affairs. Briefly stated that is the state of the temperance cause at present. What is the matter? Is the C. T. A. a failure? Are questions to be squarely met. That the Act is not a failure can be proven, but a large portion of the country has lost faith in its enforcement. When Premier Peters refused for years to account for the Scott Act fines, the belief became general among the Conservatives that there was something wrong, that he was using the Act for a party advantage. That belief had a deplorable effect. Rightly or wrongly very many Conservatives believe that a fine is only an addition to the Liberal campaign fund if collected and if not collected the fine is held over the offender's head to compel him and his friends to "vote right."

The disappointment at the outcome of the plebiscite and the disregard of the pledges given the Guardian at our last local election by our local representatives in voting for the present license law in Charlottetown and other places, such as the recent Hotel Davies case, has impressed many that the whole enforcement is a farce, and to mention temperance in an ordinary political meeting now is to be laughed at. The church itself is dead on the question. You will remember the call for a large meeting of the Alliance last winter to deal with the liquor question as affecting the city and what interest the churches took in it. Why if it were not for the two Baptist and one Methodist minister who gave their assistance we would not have a church represented. The situation is certainly very discouraging. The temperance societies, Sons of Temperance, Independent Order and W. C. T. U. have lost influence and are practically dead. These are unpleasant statements, but they are true; and what are we to do? Our duty is to point out the danger and place the facts before the electors and they should deal with their representatives. But if our experience will be repeated we may get the pledge of the politician but the rum-sellers will get directly or indirectly, what they want.
