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PHOTOS OF THE UNSEEN.

Dr. Luijs Has Photographs of Nervous Emanations of the Human Body.

A new wonder of science is the photographing of the effluvia or invisible emanations of the human nervous system. It has been accomplished by Dr. Luijs, a prominent member of the French Academy of Medicine.

In the course of one of the last meetings of the Society of Biology of Paris Dr. Luijs, member of the Academy of Medicine, explained his discoveries. In collaboration with M. David the doctor has succeeded in fixing, in a very clear manner, on a photographic proof the so called effluvia which are given off by the fingers of an adult of good constitution and enjoying perfect health.

To obtain this result two scientists shut themselves with their subject in a laboratory entirely without light. They placed the hand which was to serve for the experiment in a bath of hydroquinone, the underside of the fingers being applied to a plate of gelatino-bromure of silver. The pose lasted 15 to 20 minutes.

The plate of gelatino-bromure, treated according to the customary methods, gave a proof as curious as it is instructive.

One saw the lines of the ends of the fingers with the effluvia given off from them like a kind of spray. On the corner of the plate, in the upper left hand corner, there appeared a fragment of detached skin floating in the bath, which emits effluvia directly in the form of vertical filaments. All the little white points which were seen on the black background of the proof represented the dust of effluvia floating in the bath of hydroquinone.

Dr. Luijs did not stop there with his researches. He proposed also to record the effluvia of the eyes and the ears. New experiments have given excellent results in this respect, and even plates influenced from a distance registered very faithfully the impressions felt.

It goes without saying, says the eminent scientist in his report to the Society of Biology, that these new studies will give a new meaning to a series of phenomena long known as suggestive conceptions in default of any demonstration of their reality.

The fluid of magnetism termed by Reichembach the odd and the neutric force of Baroty will now receive the certificate of scientific reality.

It is proved that there is given off normally from the human body in a continuous manner a special fluid which seems to be an essential manifestation of life, and which exteriorizes itself, as lately Colonel de Rochas has tried to prove with so much zeal. He terms it the exteriorization of sensibility.

Several objections were raised on the examination of the first proof of the fingers, effluvia. Certain incredulous persons asked if the impressions produced on the plate of gelatino bromure did not result simply from the contact of the fingers.

To answer these critics, Dr. Luijs insulated two fingers, avoiding all contact with the plate. The result was a proof which bore three impressions like the first and two others less developed, but yet convincing.

We may be sure, says the doctor, that this process is likely to have prolific results in physiology and in pathology. It is easy of application and is within the reach of all persons who have an elementary knowledge of photography. The immersion can be effected in an ordinary bath of 9-12.

One can thus record the variation of the nervous force which is incessantly given off from the digital extremities of human beings. It varies according to age, sex, the different periods of the day and the state of emotion which sets the human being vibrating.

Light Cure For Rheumatism.

A St. Petersburg physician has been experimenting with electric lights as a cure for rheumatism with great success. He reports cures of 14 out of 18 cases of chronic rheumatism, 2 out of 4 cases of neurosis and of all the cases of sciatica and lumbago so treated. The patient, wearing blue glasses, is placed about five feet from a powerful arc light provided with a reflector, and is protected by a screen in which is cut an aperture to allow the light to fall upon the part affected, the temperature being never raised more than 4 degrees above normal. The patient is exposed from 45 seconds to 2 minutes.

During the experiments it was observed that after six or eight hours' exposure itching and tingling are felt, the skin reddens and in 48 hours peels off. The doctor says that there has been a notable diminution in the number of cases of rheumatism, neuralgia, migraine and other nervous diseases among electric workmen, which he attributes to the effects of the arc light.—Exchange.

Rubber Lined Warships.

In French naval circles there is again some talk of adopting a "filling" between the interskin and the inner shell. At present cellulose and corn pith seem to have gone out of favor, and it is now proposed to utilize caoutchouc, or some similar elastic substance, so that even should the vessel or shot penetrate, the rent will close again, and only a small quantity of water be admitted. Tests have already been made, a structure representing a small part of the length of a vessel being fitted with the cellular double sides filled with caoutchouc and it was perforated within and outside at various depths above and below the water line and allowed to float in the river, and yet it was found after a considerable time that only a few pints of water had leaked through the interior.—Industries and Iron.
