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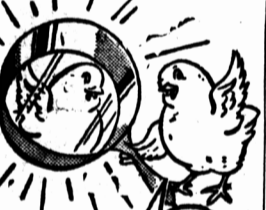

Claim Youthful Driver Struck Two Pedestrians

INDIANAPOLIS, (AP)—A 20 year-old automobile driver was accused Tuesday of hitting two pedestrians within 39 minutes, injuring one of them fatally. Police said the youth, Eddie Long of Indianapolis, struck Raymond Gordon, 52, Castleton, Ind., at a south side street intersection at 10:47 o'clock Monday night and just 39 minutes later hit Mrs. Louise Kelso, 64, Indianapolis, on a west side street. Mrs. Kelso died Tuesday in hospital. Gordon was in serious condition. Long was charged with reckless driving after the first accident and with reckless driving and failing to give a pedestrian the right of way after the second.

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
