

\$50 Fine levied For Theft of Gas

GEORGETOWN — Donald Jerome O'Brien, Cardigan, pleading guilty to theft of one gallon of gasoline when he appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Kings County magistrate's court, yesterday, was fined \$50 and costs for 30 days.

It was revealed to the court that the 16-year-old accused had been given a year's suspended sentence in September, 1962.

Dominion Tar Sales Increase

MONTREAL (CP) — Dominion Tar and Chemical Co. Ltd. reports its sales of chemicals rose 12 per cent in 1962, compared with gains of six per cent in sales of building materials and four per cent in pulp and paper products. The company does about three-fifths of its business in pulp and paper products, and about one-fifth in each of chemicals and building materials.

As previously reported, the company's total sales in 1962 rose 5.6 per cent to \$343,975,650. Net income in 1962 was \$20,717,046, or \$1.40 a share, compared with \$18,799,052, of \$1.29 a share, in 1961.

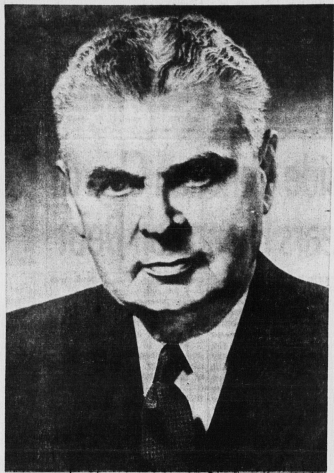
