ST. MARK'S CHURCH.—The Summerside Journal says: The new spire recently added to St. Mark's Church, Lot 7, by Mr. John Doyle, from architect Baker's plan, is a first-class piece of work and adds very much to the appearance of this beautiful little church. Internally, St. Mark's was finished in ash, from Mr. Harris' plans, some three years ago, the work being done by the above-named contractor and pronounced by all who have seen it a "perfect little gem." Now, the new spire makes the exterior as handsome, particularly as it has just been painted from cross to base. The presbytery and outbuildings have also been nicely painted.

ACTOR COGHLAN'S MARRIAGE.—The recent marriage of actor Charles Coghlan, and his reputation of the woman who has in the past been looked upon as his wife, is the sensation of the day. The New York papers are full of the affair. Mr. Coghlan in January, 1891, at the Bankruptcy Court in London, who then admits that he then had a wife and family, and goes on to comment as follows: "Three years ago Mr. Coghlan had, according to his own testimony, a wife and family. It was in 1889 that he was at the Buckingham flats with a woman whom everyone knew as his wife and a girl of 14 years. It was last spring that he was at the San Remo Hotel with the same woman and the same girl, grown to be 18 years old. Part of the intervening time, according to Mr. Coghlan's friends, he spent with the same woman and child in Prince Edward Island, which is in 'Canada,' and from there they are known to have gone to England in the fall of 1889."

AN ISLANDER ABROAD.—The South Dakota Daylight says: Ex-Lieut. Governor J. H. Fletcher is about to leave his Brown County farm to take up his residence in Salem, Oregon. Mr. Fletcher is one of our pioneers, a gentleman who is an honor and a credit to any community. He was twice elected to the Territorial Legislature from this district, and was again honored by the voters of the State of South Dakota, by electing him their first Lieut. Governor. As a presiding officer over the State Senate, he distinguished himself by his marked ability and thorough knowledge of parliamentary tactics. In all his official capacities he has shown himself to be on the side of the weak and the poor, and his record while in the halls of the legislature is as pure and clean as man could possibly make it. WILL WORK NO MORE.—The Truro Herald says: Mr. John Hines, Halifax man, has been working in Truro for some time past. The other morning as he was at his work a telegraph messenger handed him a despatch, which, of course, he at once read, and then exclaimed: "I am done working." The despatch said that a rich uncle, named Jones, had died in Boston and left him (Hines) heir to a fortune of \$100,000. Mr. Hines has in obedience to the despatch, come to Boston to receive his windfall.

HIS CONSCIENCE SQUITS HIM.—A man named C. J. Stackerweather recently became convinced at a Salvation Army meeting at Addison, New York. Since his conversion he has publicly confessed to keeping a poker room, and has also confessed to drawing a fraudulent pension of \$17 a month from the United States Government. He was not a soldier in the war of the rebellion, but was in the regular army, his line of duty being fighting the Indians. While on picket duty he fired a bullet through his left wrist. He has forwarded his papers to the Pension Department, and a confession. He has been drawing this pension six or seven years.
