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Contrasts Feature Teeming Fashion Centre In N.Y.

NEW YORK (AP) - Whether it's fashionable or functional custom made or ready-to-wear, unionism as its best or labor racketeering they can get it for you wholesale in New York's bustling, boisterous garment industry. Many of the world's great dress here. So has Murder Inc., designer of another sort. The garment district has often been called the fashion capital of the world, but more often the most unecological place in the world to do business. As befitting a fashion centre, it deals in contrasts by the yard and in a variety of colors.

Sounded on the north by the Metropolitan Opera House and the glittering lights of Times Square, and on the south by Macy's department store, Penn Station and the massive General Post Office, the 20 square blocks of mid-town Manhattan that comprise the garment district are a congested and confused jungle of loading and unloading trucks, scurrying samplemen, dress racks plowing tank-like through the surging crowds, sidewalk business conferences and occasional picket lines.

Above the narrow Eastside of uninspired architecture the thousands of cluttered factory streets between 35th and 41st, and the wider avenues between Broadway and Ninth, rise in drab rows of tenements, the cutters, pressers, spongers, button hole makers and other skilled craftsmen produce nearly 80 per cent of the women's clothing sold each year in the United States.

FASHION IS QUEEN This is the business—and it's New York's largest—where fashion is queen, where the whim of a woman can mean an overnight fortune or a Monday morning bankruptcy. Annually, it's a \$6,000,000,000 industry, but has yet to produce one \$25,000,000 corporation. There's no General Motors or Westinghouse in the garment district, and there probably never will be.

"How you gonna' mass produce individuality?" asks a dress manufacturer in the 335 wholesale or medium priced field. "A woman's not a Ford or Cadillac."

Of the shops, 15 per cent will go in a depression. The same number will start up again under new or regrouped management with a out of business every year in good times, and as high as 45 per cent for you wholesale in New York's bustling, boisterous garment industry.

Competition is cut throat and the margin of profit slim, sometimes less than one per cent. Since much of the work, particularly in the low priced lines, is contracted to "outsider" plants in the suburbs, the truckers can make or break you. So can an unseasonable change in weather, a sudden drop in prices or a radically new style change.

RIFE FOR CRIME Crime investigators have known for a long time that fickle fashion, tight profit margins, loose credit and all around dependency on the trucking industry can make a fertile field for extortion, intimidation and shakedown. The racketeers have known it even longer—Arnold Rothstein and Jack (Legs) Diamond in the 1920s, Louis (Lepeke) Buchalter (later executed); and Murder Inc., in the 1930s Thomas (Three Finger Brown) Luchese, and "Scarface" Louis Lieberman in the 1940s and (now awaiting trial in the acid blinding of labor columnist Victor Duce) Corallo in the 1950s.

Though subject to certain refinements and now limited mostly to the lower-priced dress lines, changed appreciably through the tumultuous years. It still retains the classic outlines of influence peddlers offering unscrupulous or intimidated manufacturers an "edge" over their competition by having their work done for less, for a price, in non-union shops. Racketeer truckers act as the go-between.

The theory behind the system is simple arithmetic—a dress manufacturer might prefer paying \$100 a week to a racketeer to burdening his payroll with union scale wages. Since it is not against the law to operate a non-union shop, this type of connivance is hard to prove.

The wonder is that any of this could exist in the ballroom of David Dubinsky, an outspoken foe of racketeers, and his International Ladies Garment Workers Union, one of the richest and most powerful unions in the country. With its 450,000 members and its multi-million-dollar treasury, the ILGWU has blazed many new labor trails, eliminated sweatshop conditions, fought for an ethical practices committee in the combined AFL-CIO, built hospitals, apartment houses and a summer resort for its members.

Why then has it been unable to cope with racketeers operating in non-union shops and sometimes in violation of union contracts? The answer is that an industry of many small shops, with subcontractors scattered through the suburbs, is hard to police.

Hopes To Re-visit The Posts He Has Built In Northland

By RICHARD ANCO FORT CHURCHILL, Map. (CP) Lt.-Col. Wayne D. McAlpine, 52-year-old American army engineer, has a long record of achievements in Canada's island-dotted Arctic. They include construction of weather stations and landing strips at such isolated spots as Resolute Bay, Eureka Sound, Frobisher Bay and Thule, Greenland.

Among the most recent, is the building of a rocket-launching base on Barren Muskeg, 12 miles east of here, at an estimated cost of \$22,000,000. The base, already tested, is to be used during the International Geophysical Year, from next July to December 1958, to measure composition of the upper atmosphere by rockets.

Called "Pop" by his co-workers, Col. McAlpine, who comes from Michigan City, Ind., says he likes Canada's north and promises himself to return to the north as he planned and built thousands of miles north of here. One is a weather station on Ellesmere Island, about 700 miles from the North Pole.

QUICK WORKERS The colonel and his engineering battalion from Fort Belvoir, Va., moved into this Canadian joint services military centre, 610 miles north of Winnipeg, last April after details of the rocket site had been worked out in New York. In four months they had roads laid and had built ready for the scientists who follow.

The operation involved 500 men, who were flown in and out by the United States Air Force, 15 railway cars of equipment and 100 railway cars of construction material. About 800 cubic yards of concrete was used, and 300,000 cubic yards of gravel.

Eight observation centres were built surrounding the 120-foot metal webbed, vertical rocket-launching tower in a radius of 37 miles. In all, about 500 tons of steel was needed. Building and linking passages were all made of metal sheets and designed to withstand winds of up to 120 miles an hour. Usual wind velocity is 40 to 50 miles an hour, but September blasts this year reached 85 and records show that winds ripped in off Hudson Bay in September, 1955, at the rate of 110 miles an hour.
