

L.A. Wins Double Header; Pirates Whip Atlanta 3-0

ATLANTA (AP)—Bob Veale blanked Atlanta Braves on four hits and home runs by Willie Stargell and Don Cledenon provided all the runs as Pittsburgh Pirates whipped the Braves 3-0 Friday night.

Despite the victory, the Pirates lost one-half game in the National League pennant race to front-running Los Angeles Dodgers, who swept a doubleheader from Chicago Cubs. Pittsburgh trails the Dodgers by 1 1/2 games.

Stargell hammered his 33rd home run in the first with Matty Alou on base. Then Cledenon delivered his 26th with the bases empty in the sixth.

Veale, working with a sore back, won his 15th game, striking out 12. The tall southpaw was in trouble only twice, but pitched his way out both times.

HIT CLINE

He hit first baseman Ty Cline with a pitch in the first and Rickey Carter followed with a double. Bob Veale retired Gene Oliver on a grounder, ending the threat.

The Braves mustered another challenge in the bottom of the seventh when Mike de la Hoz and Denis Menke collected consecutive singles with two out. But Veale struck out Mack Jones.

Atlanta played without two of its leading hitters, catcher Joe Torre who is batting .318 and Felipe Alou, who owns a .330 batting average.

Torre was stricken before the game with tonsillitis and Alou has been out of action since last Sunday with an injured left hand.

CHICAGO (AP)—John Roseboro's ninth-inning two-run homer gave first-place Los Angeles Dodgers a 4-2 victory over Chicago Cubs and a sweep of a doubleheader Friday.

Don Drysdale shut out the Cubs 4-0 in the opener as the Dodgers opened their lead to three games over Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Pirates played at Atlanta Friday night.

Third-place San Francisco which was idle fell five games behind.

Roseboro connected with one out in the ninth after Dick Schofield, who had driven in the first two Dodger runs with singles, was hit by a pitch.

Schofield had two hits in each game and drove in half of the eight runs. Los Angeles scored in the doubleheader.

OPENED WITH A WALK

Pinch batter Lee Thomas opened with a walk. Don Kesinger laid down a sacrifice bunt and when pitcher Bob Miller heaved the ball into centre, pinch runner Jose Amalfitano scored and Kesinger went to third. Miller and Phil Regan escaped without further damage.

Chicago took a 1-0 lead in the second on an error, a walk and a run-scoring single by Kesinger. The Dodgers scored in the fourth on a single by Jim Lefebvre, a walk and a single by Schofield and went ahead in the sixth when Schofield singled home an unearned run.

The opener was a Drysdale-Schofield show. Drysdale scattered eight hits to record his third straight victory and boost his record to 12-16.

Schofield singled in the second, stole second, took third on a wild pitch and scored on a fielder's choice, beating Curt Simmons' throw to the plate on Murry Will's bounce.

The Dodgers added three more runs in the third on a single by Tommy Davis, a run-scoring double by WestParker and run-scoring singles by Schofield and Drysdale.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Cincinnati Reds erupted for six runs in the first and scored a 7-0 victory over New York Mets Friday night behind the five-hit pitching of Jim Maloney.

Maloney (15-8), who had lost his last four starts, struck out 13.

The Reds got seven hits in the first as they chased Met starter Dennis Ribant, who failed to retire a man.

Tommy Helms' double scored the first. Vada Pinson followed with a two-run homer.

Four more hits and a sacrifice fly produced another three runs.

KANSAS CITY (AP)—John (Blue Moon) Odum hurled a four-hitter as Kansas City Athletics blanked Cleveland Indians 2-0 Friday night.

The Athletics broke a scoreless deadlock in the sixth, touching loser Gary Bell (14-14) for two runs on a triple by Bert Campaneris, a single by Rick Monday, a grounderout and first baseman Bill Davis' two-base throwing error.

Odum's second straight shut-out over the Indians boosted his pitching record to 5-5.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rookie Hank Allen's first major league home run, a three-run blast off Tommy John in the third, helped Washington Senators to a 5-4 victory over Chicago White Sox Friday night.

Allen also singled and scored in the fifth.

Pete Richert, who squared his record at 14-14, needed help from Ron Kline after Tommie Agee hit his 22nd homer with a man on in the eighth.

NEW YORK (AP)—Lee Stange held the New York Yankees to two hits and retired 19 batters in order from the third inning on as Boston won a 2-1 decision Friday on Tony Conigliaro's two-run homer off Mel Stottlemyre in the first inning.

It was the 19th defeat for Stottlemyre, and the 46th for the last-place Yanks at Yankee Stadium, their worst home record since the park opened in 1923. Only 1,440 fans turned out.

Carl Yastrzemski walked and stole second before Conigliaro homered.

The Yanks got their run in the first on a walk to Mike Hegan a single by Horace Clarke and Joe Pepitone's sacrifice fly.

Tom Tresh, who walked with two out in the third, with the last Yankee base runner.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Minnesota Twins kayoed Denny McLain's bid for his 20th victory when they scored eight runs in three innings and went on to a 12-4 triumph over Detroit Tigers Friday.

Don Mincher's grand slam home run in the first launched the Twins.

Tony Oliva hit a solo homer—his 24th—Ted Uhlaender singled for a run and winning pitcher Jim Grant doubled home two more runs in the third for another four-run inning.

Russ Nixon's single produced two runs for the Twins in the fourth.

Norm Cash's throwing error let in two more in the sixth for a 12-1 Twins margin.

Grant (12-13) held the Tigers to four hits through seven innings, including Al Kaline's 27th homer in the fourth. But Detroit cracked Grant for five hits in the eighth, when Dick McAuliffe hit a two-run homer.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Tony Taylor's bases loaded single in the 12th gave Philadelphia Phillies a 5-4 victory over St. Louis Cardinals Friday night, extending the Cardinals' losing string to four games.

Rookie Dick Hughes hit Cookie Rojas with a pitch and one out later Rojas went to third on a single by Tony Gonzalez.

Mets Rise To Mediocrity But Still Have Fans

NEW YORK (CP)—The amazing New York Mets, firmly anchored in last place during their first four years in the National League as one of major league baseball's expansion teams, have climbed out of the cellar this year.

But contrary to some predictions, their rise to mediocrity on the field has not been matched by a decline in fan support.

The day after Labor Day, the Mets' paid attendance for 1966 stood at 1,800,170, the highest ever achieved by a National League team in New York, more than ever saw the Giants and Dodgers before they fled to the West Coast.

The fifth consecutive annual increase does not, however, put the Mets in quite the once-invincible American League Yankees to occupy.

The Yankees drew 2,373,901 fans in 1966, their best year. This season, with the club battling to avoid last place, they will be hundreds of thousands behind the Mets.

One reason the Mets are outdrawing the Yankees is the magnificent stadium they occupy on Long Island adjacent to the 1964-65 New York world's fair site.

Shea Stadium, which is also used by the Jets of the American Football League, is modern, comfortable and in a pleasant part of the city.

BRONX RUNS DOWN

Aging Yankee Stadium, in contrast, is in a declining area of the Bronx, at East 161st Street and River Avenue.

"The area is almost as bad as the ball club," says one local sports expert.

Many people dislike going to Yankee Stadium at night. Parking is difficult and the subways are a bit frightening.

The biggest night crowd to watch the Yankees in New York this year was 29,449, for a doubleheader with the league-leading Baltimore Orioles. The Mets attract as many as that on a Monday afternoon.

Since 1961, the year Roger Maris hit 61 home runs, Yankee home attendance has dwindled this way: 1961—1,747,000; 1962—1,493,000; 1963—1,308,000; 1964—1,305,000; 1965—1,213,000; 1966 (estimated)—1,200,000.

The Polo Grounds stand just across the river from Yankee Stadium and were the

Western Football Conference coaches, accustomed to scanning their rosters for healthy players, have elevated the search to a science this season.

Each WFC club has physical problems and each will play at least once between Saturday and Tuesday. Calgary Stampedeers, Saskatchewan Roughriders and British Columbia Lions are scheduled for two appearances each.

The Stamps play at home Saturday against Edmonton Eskimos and Winnipeg Tuesday against the Blue Bombers. B.C. visits Toronto Argonauts Sunday and Montreal Alouettes Tuesday in Canadian Football League interlocking games.

The Roughriders, who lead the WFC standings, play Hamilton Tiger-Cats Saturday and Ottawa Rough Riders Monday.

Calgary plans several changes in its bid to narrow the gap between fourth place and its third-place rivals, Edmonton and Winnipeg. Coach Jerry Williams said Jerry Keeling will start at quar-

terback for the second time this season with Pete Liske operating at safety on defence. Willie Ross will take the fullback spot, vacated this week by Art Baker, who was picked up on waivers by Toronto.

MAY REPLACE CAMPBELL

Linebacker Jerry Campbell, out with a leg injury, may be replaced by Fred Forsberg, a late cut of Denver Broncos of the American Football League.

Saskatchewan coach Eagle Key hopes line man Dick Schnell and defensive back Dale West will be fit to play. Schnell has knee problems and West has dislocated his shoulder three times this season.

Coach Dave Skrien of the Lions had two doubtful starters — flanker Sonny Homer, complaining of chest pains, and defensive tackle Mike Cacic who has an ankle injury.

Edmonton coach Neill Armstrong reports one major injury — Jim Tee Thomas, second-best goal garner in the west, who is nursing a charleyhorse.

Campbell Has No Thought Of Retiring Presidency

MONTREAL (CP)—Once upon a time, Clarence Campbell dreamed of early retirement from the turbulent world of professional hockey.

Not any more.

"I've no thought of retiring now," says the man who has been president and principal moulder of the National Hockey League for the last 20 years.

At the start of the 1967-68 season the NHL will expand from six teams to 12. New clubs will spring up in Los Angeles, San Francisco-Oakland, St. Louis, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and Minneapolis-St. Paul.

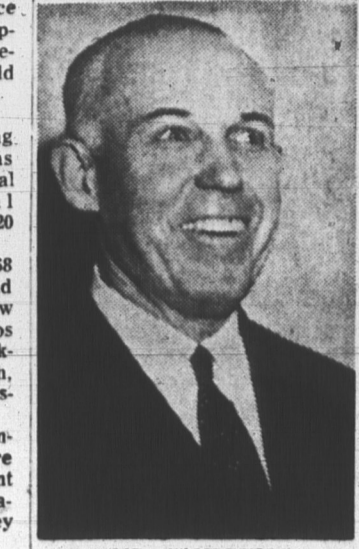
There are television contracts to negotiate and there is a new working agreement coming into force with the Canadian Amateur Hockey League.

Retirement? He hasn't the time.

At 61, and after 20 years of guiding the collective destiny of the Montreal Canadiens, Boston Bruins, Toronto Maple Leafs, Detroit Red Wings, New York Rangers and Chicago Black Hawks, he still has much to do.

One of the trickiest problems facing the league president is television exposure on a national scale in the United States.

Last season, the National Broadcasting Corporation televised part of the Stanley Cup semi-final and final series in color. This year, the league had hoped to have 10 or 12 late-season games, plus some

playoff games, accorded similar treatment. NBC said no.

BUILT PENSION FUND

A few days after he took office in 1946, Campbell said hockey should be considered a career to which any Canadian parent should be able to conscientiously direct a son, who shows exceptional aptitude for the game. To this end, he developed the NHL players' pension fund into the richest in sport.

As with the fund, expansion

of hockey generally, and the NHL in particular, is another personal goal. Television, he feels, could help here.

"Excitement generated by the actual viewing will become contagious and stimulate editorial comment. We have a certain amount of egotism and we think the tremendous exposure, on a medium entirely suited for the game, will serve to build up attendance at the games."

Expansion of the big league through the U.S. will have another benefit, providing "a great stimulus for playing the game."

"Thousands of American boys will become interested and when they find out that salaries, pensions and other benefits match other sports, they'll start making their own comparisons."

"Our history has indicated that practically all U.S. hockey players come from Wisconsin, northern Michigan or places having similar climatic conditions to Canada. This interest dropped off when hockey bowed out in these districts. Now, with expansion the interest will be revived."

INTEREST SPREADS

Campbell looks forward to the time when hockey will become a truly international sport, where now it is limited somewhat by climate.

MORE BRITONS JOBLESS

LONDON (AP)—Unemployment in Britain rose to 339,947 this month, the government reported Thursday. This was an increase of 22,936 over August.

The figure represented 1.5 per cent of the work force, officials said. The increase was attributed to the credit squeeze instituted as part of government measures to defend the pound sterling.

Winnipeg coach Bud Grant reported no new injuries after a 43-9 victory Wednesday over Toronto and said his club is looking forward to a playoff berth.
