

Weak Economic Program Seen Nkrumah Downfall

ACCRA (AP) — Diplomatic quarters here express belief President Kwame Nkrumah might have remained in power had he been able to grasp the economic facts of life.

"Nkrumah was often a brilliant politician but his fiscal policies were those of a dull eight-year-old," said one veteran diplomat.

The new military regime, which threw out the leftist leader Thursday, portrayed in its first announcement a one-official nation plunged into economic chaos.

"The country is on the brink of national bankruptcy," said the National Liberation Council. When Ghana gained independence from Britain in 1946, it faced a bright future with more than \$500,000,000 in the treasury and the most experienced civil service and judiciary in black Africa. Today, Ghana is black-

N.B. Premier Urges Watch Over Rights

TORONTO (CP) — Premier Louis Robichaud of New Brunswick has called for constant vigilance against "those who would ride roughshod over the rights of their fellow citizens."

Speaking at a Brotherhood Week dinner sponsored by the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews at Beth Emeth Yehuda synagogue, the premier said:

"Only when all men accept that they are no longer, as individuals, islands unto themselves, can we hope to bring men closer together in co-operative efforts to achieve peace and brotherhood."

Mr. Robichaud said he doubts whether the most dedicated efforts of organizations can ever erase prejudice from the hearts of men.

But he told his audience:

WORK WITH GOVERNMENT.

"You must... be prepared to work with your governments to tear out the roots of prejudice; you must help in the war on poverty; you must contribute your considerable talents to originating a and encouraging programs to accomplish social justice and equality of opportunity; you must contribute to the struggle against social isolationism and effect a collective responsibility among individuals for the community, the province and the nation."

Mr. Robichaud said the great danger in times of change comes from persons motivated by bigotry, prejudice or intolerance and see in the honest apprehensions of many a chance to exploit and subvert the democratic process.

"In a constructive way, we must instill in the citizens of this nation a collective responsibility for what goes on in Newfoundland, or Ontario, or British Columbia."

Text of his address was issued to the press prior to delivery.

Tax Changes Announced For Sask.

REGINA (CP) — Reduction of Saskatchewan's income tax surcharge to five from six per cent, a grant to all but a few home-owners and a one-cent increase in gasoline tax were included in a record \$268,800,000 provincial budget.

Soaps, detergents and cleaners were added to items taxable under the province's four-per-cent sales tax, while some agricultural equipment was exempted.

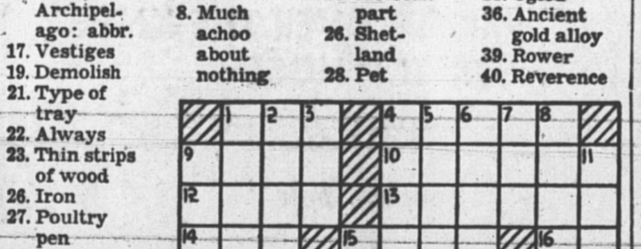

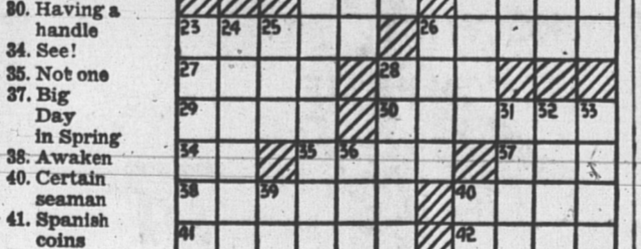

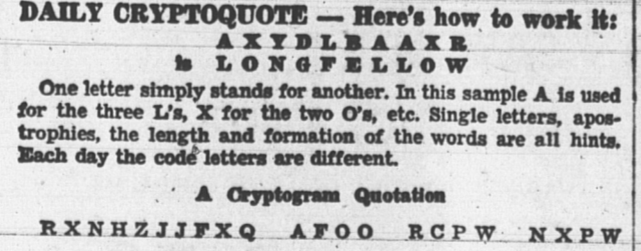
