36 Attend Murray River Blood Clinic

Murray River had its first Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic in the Canadian Legion Hall on Saturday morning between 10 and 12 p.m. when 36 donors reported. These donors came from the following districts—Glen William, High Bank, Murray Harbor and Murray Harbor North, Montague, Peter's Road, Hopefield, Little Sands as well as from Murray River itself. Dr. M. L. Bonnell, resident physician at Murray River gave great encouragement to the donors and the clinic personnel by being present and by being a donor himself. The ladies of the Murray River Women's Institute made all the advance arrangements for the clinic and were on hand to assist the Mobile Team and to provide refreshments for the donors. A group of young men assisted materially by helping the team to load and unload the equipment. Although the response was so small it was considered satisfactory as an initial attempt. Undoubtedly those who were present will do their best to influence as many others to attend the Clinic the next time it is held in Murray River.

Daily Newspaper Advertising Rates "Key To Survival"

NEW YORK, Sept. 2 (AP)—Fortune magazine said today that the survival of the large daily newspaper in the United States depends on sharply higher rates for advertising. That was the conclusion of a survey of the newspaper business described in the September issue. Fortune noted that newspaper circulation has shot up—and is likely to stay up—and said advertising rates are selling at "pre-war bargain rates." It said that as a result, dollar profits of a typical large newspaper (circulation more than 100,000—declined by more than half from 1946 to 1950, even though the newspaper took in more money in 1950. And said the magazine, "at this rate the breakeven point is about two years ahead." Fortune said no decline is in prospect in the price of newsprint, which has risen to \$40 or \$50 a ton before the Second World War to the present \$116 for Canadian output.

Clarion Call Made To Public Decency

DES MOINES, Iowa, Sept. 3—Herbert Hoover called upon the nation today to return decency to public life and lashed out at "a cancerous growth of intellectual dishonesty in public life which is mostly beyond the law." "Our greatest danger is not from invasion by foreign armies," he said at the Iowa State Fair. "Rather," he said, "our dangers are that we may commit suicide by complacency with evil. Or by public toleration of scandalous behavior. Or by cynical acceptance of dishonesty. These evils have defeated nations many times in human history." "The redemption of mankind by America will depend upon our ability to cope with these evils right here at home," he added. "In its frustration, the Congress is groping for some sort of code of ethics, which with a prefix 'New' might protect the citizen from his own officials," he observed. "Congress can well widen the law so as to clutch the New kinds of bribes and benefits they have discovered. But Congress cannot reach intellectual dishonesty." The former chief executive said he did not speak with pessimism on the nation's situation today because "the fact that we are vigorously washing our dirty linen in public is a sign that moral stamina still survives." The word "New," he said was overworked. He mentioned new order, new freedom, new era, new deal, new foreign policies and new taxes among others, but said none were really new discoveries. "The New Testament," he said, "is too often omitted."

The practical way to make over the world was to try out the word "old" for a while, he suggested, and listed the "Old Virtues" as religious faith, incorruptible service and honor in public office, economy in government, self reliance, thrift and individual liberty, patriotism, real love of country, and willingness to sacrifice for it. "These 'old' ideas are very inexpensive," he said. "They even would help win hot and cold wars."
