## Bob Cloux Must Meet N.S. Fighter

**QUEBEC (CP)**—Gene Letourneau, commissioner of the Canadian Boxing Federation, said Monday the federation considers Clarence Cloux of Stephenville, Nfld., the prime contender for the Canadian heavyweight championship.

Mr. Letourneau said champion Robert Cloux now must defend his title against Penn. He said Cloux was fitted for the title defense.

The commissioner last week said he would recommend to Cloux that he must defend his crown against Gene Chivalvo of Toronto before Jan. 15. The federation no longer considers Cloux a contender for the title because he has not fought in a year and a half, Letourneau said.

Chivalvo has moved with his family to Detroit, but the reason he was dropped as a contender for the Canadian crown is his long inactivity. Letourneau said he has received incorrect earlier reports that Cloux had been a dropped contender because of his move to Detroit.

Cloux was censured last Oct. 20 for not living up to a rematch clause in the contract for his last fight with Chivalvo, when he lost to win the championship.

# Orioles White Sox Make Trade Involving Six Players

**CHICAGO (AP)** — Baltimore Orioles and Chicago White Sox, both disappointed last season, packaged a trade involving six players Monday for their 1968 objective of dethroning the New York Yankees.

The Sox, who finished fifth in the 1962 American League race, drafted a trade involving six players Monday for their 1968 objective of dethroning the New York Yankees.

The Orioles, who shared seventh place with Boston, gave up knuckle ball relief ace Hoyt Wilhelm, 39; shortstop Ron Hansen, 24; the 1960 AL Rookie of the Year; third baseman Pete Ward, 23; a 328 hitter for Rochester, second in the International League's 1962 batting race; and outfielder Dave Nicholson, 23, a \$115,000 bonus baby five years ago.

Both clubs were pleased with the deal as mutually strengthening each other where it was needed.

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"I've had nothing but great reports on Ward. Nicholson has tremendous potential—he is fine on defence, can throw and has great power."

Oriole president Lee MacPhail said in Baltimore the decision to trade was difficult.

"But we had the opportunity to get the best shortstop in the league and one of the best hitters," he said. "We just couldn't pass it up."

"Wilhelm did a magnificent job for us in relief. Hansen has had two disappointing seasons but if he comes back to his 1960 level, the White Sox have made themselves a good deal."

The Sox have been hurting at third base, where Al Smith, essentially an outfielder, was used mainly last year with Charlie Smith backing him up. Al's defensive play left something to be desired but he more than made up for it by hitting .292, slugging .416 homers and driving in 82 runs.

Aparicio's slump has been blamed by Lopez as one of the reasons the Sox finished 11

games behind the champion Yankees.

The Sox had slashed Aparicio's 1962 contract from something like \$43,000 to \$35,000.

From his Venezuelan home, Aparicio was quoted as saying he wouldn't sign and would quit the game if his salary were cut.

Ward's bat work included 22 homers, 34 doubles, six triples and 90 RBI. He also stole 17 bases and scored 114 runs.

Wilhelm has made more relief appearances than any other pitcher in major league history

and his career 2.74 earned run average is the best since the advent of the lively ball in 1920. He was 7-10 last year with a 1.94 ERA and was credited with 13 saves.

Hansen's Rookie - of - the - Year honors in 1960 were based on 22 home runs and 86 RBI. As he batted .255, He spent most of the 1962 campaign in the army and then missed the last six weeks with a broken bone in his left hand. He hit .173 in 71 games.

Nicholson never has lived up to expectations but it generally is believed he was rushed along too fast. He batted .175 in 97 games last year.

The White Sox also sold the contract of southpaw pitcher Dean Stone to Rochester, an Oriole farm club.

The Orioles have Stu Miller to replace Wilhelm. Miller was obtained from San Francisco. Giants in another major deal this winter.

Nine Mile Creek nipped Powell Royals 43 in regular league action for the W. T. Shaw trophy at North River rink last night.

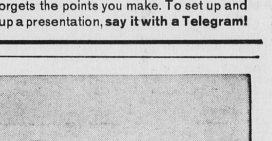

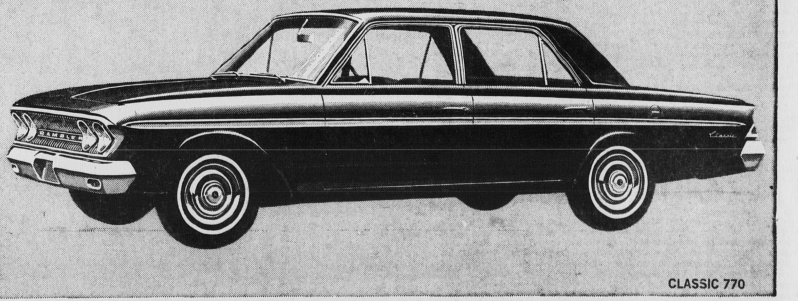
