

Coroner Says Doctor Tried For Private Post-Mortem

EASTBOURNE, England (Reuters)—A coroner testified Friday that Dr. John Bodkin Adams, accused by the Crown of poisoning three patients, tried to arrange for a post-mortem while one was still alive.

The coroner, Angus C. Somerville, said the doctor wanted him to arrange a post-mortem for 50-

year-old Mrs. Gertrude Hullett the day before she died.

He said Adams told him he was not certain of what Mrs. Hullett was going to die from and he wished to have a private post-mortem examination.

UNPRECEDENTED ACT
Asked by the Crown counsel whether it was usual to have a

private post-mortem, the coroner replied: "Never." Nor, he added, had he ever been asked to arrange a post-mortem before a patient's death.

Adams is specifically charged with the murder of 51-year-old Edith Morrell, a widow who died in 1950. But in the course of a preliminary hearing to determine whether he will face trial on the murder charge, the Crown also has accused him of being responsible for the deaths of Mrs. Hullett last July and of her husband, Alfred Hullett, 71, who died four months earlier.

The plump society doctor is accused of poisoning his patients because he thought he would benefit from their will. After their deaths, he received two Rolls Royces, a chest of silver and £500.

DECLARED SUICIDE
So far, 37 witnesses have been called by the Crown. The hearings are expected to last into next week.

Friday, evidence revolved around the death of Mrs. Hullett originally declared a suicide at an inquest.

Adams allegedly wrote to the coroner that she died after losing "the will to live" after the death of her "adoring and rich husband."

Dr. Ronald Harris, one of Adams' associates, testified he examined Mrs. Hullett a few days before her death. He said he asked Adams about the possibility of an overdose of sleeping drugs, but Adams suggested the actual cause of the illness was cerebral hemorrhage.

Harris said he would have insisted on hospital treatment for Mrs. Hullett, but Adams told him she had "an intense dislike" of nursing homes and hospitals.

TRUE CHRISTIAN INFLUENCE CAN HELP REMAKE WORLD

My Dear Christian People: For the Christian who realizes and feels the responsibility placed upon him by his incorporation in Christ there is a problem which, at first glance, appears to be beyond solution. That problem arises from Christ's comparison of His followers to yeast, which is to permeate and to change a much larger mass. The problem for the Christian is then, put in words which have become well known in our time, "How can I change the world?"

Indeed, when one looks at the world situation in our day, the problem posed does not seem hopeless. But we must remember that each of us is able to exert influence in a definite sphere, be it at home, in the plant, in the office or in the store. If you like this is our world, a world not cut off from the world at large, but making up an important part of that world. We can make this "World" of ours a world of love rather than a world of selfishness, rash judgment and suspicion. The effect of this change can be compared to the effect of dropping a stone in a pond. At first there is but one little circle caused by the small stone; but eventually one circle seems to cause another until the entire pond is affected by that one little pebble.

But how do we change our world and thus bring good to all mankind? What can we do to make our office, store, plant, and home a Christian world of love, and this be ourselves like the leaven of the Gospel parable which changes the entire mass?
First of all, we must start with ourselves; we must be a storehouse from which holiness can be drawn by our fellow workers and family. We must be the "salt of the earth"; and unless we be seasoned with the Christian virtues we are good for nothing and will have no effect on those around us. Just as yeast must be good yeast to work its proper effect, so also, must a Christian be a good Christian before he or she can spread Christ's love and His teachings to all.

Consider Revising Freight Rates Act

OTTAWA (CP) A revision of the Maritime freight rates act is under consideration, Transport Minister Marler said Thursday.

In reply to a Commons question by George Hees (PC - Toronto Broadview), he said he could say no more than that.

Mr. Hees asked whether the government plans to revise the act "to bring it in line with the intentions of 1927, which were to enable the Maritime producers to compete in central Canadian markets."

The Gordon economic commission, in its preliminary report last week, said there have been complaints that the original benefits provided by the legislation have been largely wiped out by the cessation of postwar freight rate increases. The commission suggested a re-examination of the act's present effects.
