

PATRIOTISM VS. PARTY

We clip this heading from the Guardian. The topic is a favorite one with our independent contemporary—when the sins and shortcomings of the Liberal Party cannot be defended by insinuation or otherwise. The Guardian seems to imagine that there can be no such thing as patriotism in and by the party. Yet it is forced to admit, in another connection, that the Liberal-Conservative Party under its great leader Sir John Macdonald worked lasting good for Canada and was patriotic in the truest sense of the term. If the party has done good work in the past, in Canada as well as in Great Britain, why may it not do good in the future? Of course there always is "the strife of parties." But there always will be strife, and never perfection, in this world; and surely the manly strife of two strong parties, even if somewhat rough, is to be preferred to the intrigues which are essential to the government of a free country in which the two parties are supplanted by a lot of little "groups" and "personalities" each having its own end to gain at the expense of the country. Whenever it clearly appears that the party in office is not truly patriotic, is not carrying on the government for the good of the country, then it is the duty of the people to turn that party out. This is the watchful and patriotic people's safeguard.

It may be said that the other party will do no better. It that should appear turn it out, also, at the first opportunity. When the people show by their votes against bad government that they appreciate good government, they will have good government.

A CONUNDRUM.

LIBERAL papers, led by the Toronto Globe, are vigorously advertising the idea that the present prosperity of the Dominion is due to the Liberal government. As the Ottawa Journal remarks, a government can certainly affect national business by its fiscal and trade policy, but hardly appreciably by anything else under ordinary circumstances of civilized communities. If, therefore, to the Liberal administration is due much credit for the national prosperity, the cause must be the nature of the government's trade policy; principally the tariff—the tariff being the essential factor in trade, so far as government operation is concerned.

Now, the tariff policy of the Liberal administration is either protective in its nature, or it is not. If the present tariff is protective, then the Liberals are carrying on the principle of the old N. P. and they are not entitled to any credit for the national prosperity. If the present tariff is not protective, but something else, to which something else the national prosperity is due, will the Globe or some other Liberal paper explain how it is that a tariff which is not protective is producing prosperity northwards from the imaginary line called the Canadian border, while under a tariff which is desperately protective there is great prosperity southwards from that same imaginary line?

"SAUVE QUI PEUT"

The Federal Ministers are said to have recognized already that the coming general election will be their Waterloo and are acting as though they had received the final order:—"All is lost. Save himself who can!" It is expected that few of the Ministers who formed Sir Wilfrid Laurier's original Cabinet will face the electors in the coming campaign.

Sir Oliver Mowat has already saved himself by becoming Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario.

Sir Henri Joly has saved himself by becoming Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia.

It is rumored that the following provisional arrangements have been made for saving some of the others:

Sir Wilfrid Laurier to be a member of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, with a salary of \$35,000 a year and a life peerage.

The Hon. J. I. Tarte to be Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec with a salary of \$10,060 a year and Spencerwood.

The Hon. Andrew Blair to be a judge of the Supreme Court of Canada with a salary of \$7,000 a year.

The Hon. Clifford Sifton to be Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba with a salary of \$6,000 a year and residence, Governor Paterson's term expiring September 23d.

Sir Richard Cartwright to be Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario with a salary of \$10,000 a year and residence in succession to Sir Oliver Mowat, who will be induced to

retire.

The Hon. F. W. Borden to be Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia with a salary of \$9,000 a year and residence, Governor Daly's term expiring July 29th.

Sir Louis Davies to be a judge with as good a salary as he can get.

This leaves only Senator Scott, Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon. W. Mulock, Hon. Sydney Fisher, Hon. R. Dobell and Hon. Chas. Fitzpatrick to be saved. Of these, Mr. Mulock is said to be restrained from accepting office by two considerations; first, his well known scruples against members of Parliament accepting offices of emolument under the Crown, and second, the fact that there is no office in sight just now that he would care to accept.

The Hon. W. S. Fielding is slated for Leader of the Opposition in the next Parliament, and the Hon. R. R. Dobell will continue to serve his country "without portfolio."—Montreal Star.

WHY THEY SHOULD GO—NO. 2.

The country is asked by the Ministerial organ to say why the Laurier-Tarte Government should go.

Here is a very good reason:

When the Laurier party was in Opposition it "viewed with alarm" an expenditure of \$37,000,000 annually, and solemnly promised to reduce the outlays by four millions if elected to office.

The people accepted the contract, but the new Government, instead of carrying out its pledge, has increased every outlay, and has added materially to the taxes.

Our ordinary expenditures have grown thus:

1887 to 1891 (Cons., average)	\$36,326,821
1892 to 1896	37,249,223
1897 (Laurier)	38,349,757
1898	38,832,502
1899	41,903,500

Our united consolidated revenue and capital expenditures have jumped up in this way:

1887 to 1891 (Cons., average)	\$42,530,000
1892 to 1896	42,141,000
1897 (Laurier)	42,973,751
1898	45,354,281
1899	51,542,656

The expenditure per head has been lifted from \$8 14 in 1896 to \$9 70 in 1899, and the taxes have grown from \$25,446,000 in 1895, to \$34,958,000 in 1899.

This year the taxes taken out of the pockets of the people will aggregate \$39,000,000—nearly \$8 for every man, woman, and child in the country.

Men who promise to decrease expenditures by \$4,000,000 and increase them by \$9,000,000 instead, men who promise to relieve us of taxes and increase the burden by \$9,000,000 in one year and by \$14,000,000 in another, are reckless, extravagant, and unfaithful, and they ought to be punished—Mail and Empire.

WHY THEY SHOULD GO—NO. 1

By the Laurier organ Canada is challenged to say why the Laurier-Tarte Government should go.

Here is a business reason:

The Liberal-Conservative policy is and has always been a constructive policy; it has always developed the great agricultural industry in its various branches; it has built, and is building now, the industrial enterprises upon which the great centres of population flourish; it gives us our prosperity.

Everybody knows where the Liberal-Conservatives stand on the question of the development of Canada.

The Laurier-Tarte policy is an uncertain policy, a policy of opportunism, and, as many believe, of corruption as well.

A few years ago it was a policy of free trade up to the hilt, and death to Canadian industry.

More recently it was a policy of commercial annexation to the United States, with discrimination against Great Britain and the destruction of Canadian industry by the United States monopolies as its leading features.

It tolerates Canadian industry at this moment in order to get a second term and a free hand for its eccentricities.

Laurier is pledged to strangulation by slow degrees; he is negotiating with the United States for a scheme of reciprocity, the details of which he will not and dare not give out to the people in advance of an election; he is violently opposed to preferential trade with Great Britain.

The Liberal-Conservative policy is Canadian and British; the Laurier-Tarte policy is unsafe, and no assurance can be given that it will be harmless because unfortunately Laurier adheres to no public pledges, and no one can accept his most solemn promises.—Mail and Empire.

In the Senate on Wednesday, a lively discussion took place on the Paris exposition and the Pineau conspiracy. Senator Ferguson brought the matter up, reading Pineau's letter from Ottawa and the affidavits made in Prince Edward Island. The Minister of Justice grew angry and refused to admit the responsibility of the Government for any offers made to Pineau or any arrangements made with him.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

In reply to an enquiry we have to say that the Hon. Sir Henri Gustave Joli was in the year 1888 authorized by the Legislature to take the additional name of de Loubiniere—the maiden name of his mother.

The Ontario Conservative Union has practically invited Mr Birmingham to go before the judicial commission and tell all he knows of Tory crookedness in elections. Now let Sir Wilfrid Laurier even things up by issuing a summons to Mr Alex Smith, who directs the Liberal forces of Ontario at election times. The judges have already pointed to him who can tell much.

Some of the people of England are not unwilling to take a lesson from the United States and Canada. The London County Council has decided to send a deputation of engineers to this side of the Atlantic to investigate the public asylums, their construction and system of management. Perhaps they will come to look at our "annex."

President Schurman of Cornell University said to the graduating class:—"The most imminent danger in modern politics is the exploitation of the weaker races by the stronger races into whose power they have fallen. It may be done by regulations of trade and commerce, or it may be done in more insidious ways. But, however done, it is certain to prove a bane to both."

Hon. Mr. Paterson, the Minister of Customs, has accepted the Liberal nomination in North Westworth and Brant, the seat presently held by that light of Liberalism, Mr. James Somerville. It seems to be on the cards, remarks the Montreal Gazette, that the country will soon have another evidence that the Liberal plank which condemned the appointment of members of Parliament to office was meant for opponents and not those who shaped it.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that:—Dr De Vin's going away from Ottawa a few hours before he was to be examined in the matter of the emergency rations is in keeping with the efforts of the Liberal majority of the investigating committee to prevent the whole truth being made known. It was an utterly foolish proceeding. It cannot save Mr De Vin's reputation and it will not, in the slightest
