FROM a Philadelphia paper the Agriculturalist learns that Mr. L. McLeod (Roland), of Wallace's Monthly, was selected as a judge of horses for the Philadelphia Fair, under the new system of judging by a scale of points. Good bricklayers are now receiving \$3.50 a day in Montreal. The union scale was \$3, but the employers readily offered the extra amount owing to the scarcity of help.

MR. E. H. NORTON arrived home last evening after an absence of three months during which period he has visited Great Britain and Ireland, Norway, and other points of interest in Northern Europe. He is looking well and has evidently enjoyed himself.

REV. G. O. AND MRS. GATES leave by this morning's boat for Boston. Mr. Gates will take a vacation of a month, the enjoyment of which will be enhanced by the remembrance of the kindness of his congregation, the members of which presented him with a purse at the close of Friday evening's prayer meeting.—St. John Telegraph.

FIVE agents for the sale of Picturesque Canada arrived at Buckingham, Que., on Saturday last. They intended delivering the whole work at once, but were assaulted by the infuriated subscribers, who pummeled them so vigorously that they handed over all the agreements in their possession, which the duped villagers tore up, and departed.

SATURDAY last commemorated the anniversary of three important events, viz: The establishment of the town of Boston, on Sept. 17, 1630; the adoption of the Constitution of the United States, Sept. 17, 1787, and the battle of Antietam, on Sept. 17, 1862.—St. John Telegraph. A Fatal Mistake.

WINIFORD SMITH TAKES A DOSE OF CHLORATE OF POTASH IN MISTAKE FOR ROCHELLE SALTS, AND DIES AFTER A WEEK OF AGONY.

Winiford Smith, a bright, intelligent youth of 18, died on Thursday evening last in terrible agony at the residence of his sister, Mrs. Wasson, St. John, N. B., having just a week previously taken a dose of chlorate of potash in mistake for Rochelle salts. About three weeks ago, in answer to an advertisement of T. Youngclaus, Winiford Smith, of Harvey, Albert County, went to St. John, and secured a position in that establishment. He was a fine-looking young fellow, robust, strong, and by his geniality and obliging disposition was soon as great a favorite in the establishment as he was in the family circle of his sister, Mrs. Wasson, with whom he stopped since his arrival in the city. On Thursday night week he went home from the store, and, beside natural weariness, felt slightly indisposed. Acting upon the advice of some one in the house, he proceeded to take a dose of Rochelle salts. Instead of getting that, however, he took an equal portion of chlorate of potash by mistake. He did not feel any ill effects that night, and next day went to his work as usual. During the day he went to the residence of Mr. Youngclaus, who was ill, and inquired after him. During his stay at the house both Mr. and Mrs. Youngclaus noticed something strange in the young man's look and commented upon it, but thought nothing further of it until that evening when they were informed that he was dangerously ill. Dr. Berryman worked all night with him and next day he was better but unable to go to work. During the next few days both he and his friends thought he was improving, but on Thursday morning, shortly after 8 o'clock, the summons came. His sister, in an adjoining room, heard Winiford call her sharply, and hurrying to his side she saw him die in less than five minutes. Slowly but surely the terrible dose of potash had done its fatal work and the youth who less than a month before went to the city full of hope, strength and spirit was, on Saturday, borne back to his bereaved parents a corpse.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.)

In the Vice-Admiralty Court.

SOURIS, Sept. 20.

The boats and seines of the schooner French and Argonaut have been placed in the Vice-Admiralty Court. Summonses were to-day posted on the boats and seines calling on the owners to appear in the Vice-Admiralty Court at Charlottetown within one week, and defend the actions, otherwise orders for the condemnation of the property would be made by default. The papers served charge that the boats violated the Fishing Treaty and several statutes made for enforcing its provisions.

Duelling in Mexico.

MEXICO, Sept. 18.

A duel this morning, in the barracks, caused great excitement in military and political circles. The principals were General Rocha and Antonio Gayon, chief in one of the Bureaus of the War Department. At the first fire General Gayon fell, shot through the right breast, and it is believed he is dying. This is believed to be the beginning of a series of duels, almost certain to grow out of a feud between partisans of the late empire and leading liberal chiefs.

More Railway Disasters.

DUBUQUE, Iowa, Sept. 19.

This morning two passenger trains collided in the fog on the C. M. & St. Paul Railway near here killing two engineers, two firemen and one brakeman, and slightly injuring many passengers.

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, Sept. 19.

Two freight trains collided this morning on the Pittsburg, Fort Wayne and Chicago Road firing five oil cans, exploding a dynamite car and killing the engineer, fireman and three tramps.

The Printers' Strike.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 19.

The printers' strike spread yesterday to the Globe office, and all the compositors there went out without notice. Both papers made a fair showing, notwithstanding the attempt to put them to inconvenience. It is almost needless to remark that the sympathy of the community is almost wholly with the employers in both cases.

Kelly's Body Found.

KINGSTON, Ont., Sept. 19.

The body of a man found floating near Oswego, some time since, turns out to be that of Kelly, the engineer, and one of the convicts who escaped from the penitentiary on the warden's yacht.

Attempted Suicide.

NEW HAVEN, Sept. 19.

Mrs. Mary Keil, aged 56 years, attempted suicide this afternoon by soaking watches in brandy and drinking the draught, and afterwards by cutting her throat. She will die.

A Journalist Wounded.

PARIS, Sept. 19.

Maurice Bernhardt yesterday severely wounded a journalist named Alexis, who had written an article reflecting on his mother.

Eight Men Killed.

LONDON, Sept. 19.

Eight men were killed by a boiler explosion in the West Indian steamer El-Bel, during a trial trip in Stone's Bay, to-day.

Five Years in the Penitentiary.

MONTREAL, Sept. 19.

A. D. Parent, the defaulting cashier of the Hochelaga Bank was to-day sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

The Scott Act Petition.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.

A petition asking for the repeal of the Scott Act in Charlottetown has been received by the Secretary of State.

Murdered His Wife and Children.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 19.

A French half-breed at Green Lake murdered his wife and two children. It is supposed he was drunk.

Five Persons Drowned.

GENEVA, Sept. 19.

Five persons were drowned in Lake Geneva to-day by the collision of a boat and a steamer.

A Big Blaze.

NEWBURG, Ont., Sept. 19.

A fire to-day destroyed the town hall, five stores, four other buildings. The loss is very heavy.

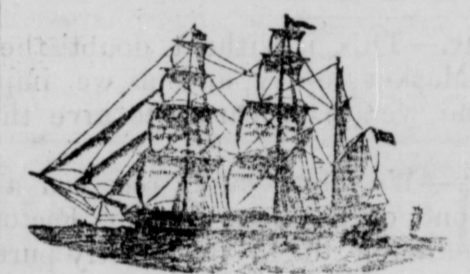

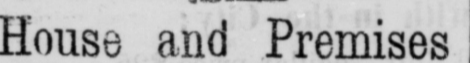
