Whereas there is no available rifle range, at present, in Queen's County, longer than six hundred yards; and

Whereas there is a range to be had on easy terms near the village of Pownall where all the distances from two hundred yards up to twelve hundred yards can be obtained;

Therefore resolved, that this Association ask the Department of Militia and Defence to look into the matter with a view of giving the Militia of this Province an opportunity of practising at distances greater than six hundred yards;

And further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Honorable the Minister of Militia and Defence at Ottawa.

NEW SIDEWALK.—A new sidewalk is being laid on north side Grafton Street, between Prince and Great George streets.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.—The commencement exercises of the students of Prince of Wales College will be held in the Opera House this Friday evening, June 1st, beginning at 8 o'clock. Admission to all, 15 cents.

CRICKET.—There will be a match game of cricket at Victoria Park tomorrow between two elevens drawn from the Phoenix cricket club, commencing at 2 p. m. An interesting game may be expected.

NEW ATLAS.—Mr. J. J. O'Reilly is the agent in this city of Rand and McNally's "Atlas of Two Wars"—viz., those of the Philippine Islands and South Africa. The maps are well executed, very valuable for reference and up-to-day in every respect.

FOREST FIRES.—The southern counties of New Brunswick suffered heavily by fire Wednesday. In St. John, Charlotte, Albert and Kings Counties there were disastrous conflagrations, the first suffering the heaviest. The city of St. John lay under a pall of thick smoke and the heat was extreme, thermometers registering well over 80. Much property and valuable timber tracts have been destroyed, but no lives have been lost.

CITY COUNCIL.—A meeting of the City Council was held last night to consider the abolition of the ward system, as certain citizens had waited upon members of the Legislature asking that a bill be passed to abolish the wards. Councillor Wheat moved a resolution in favor of the retention of the ward system, seconded by Councillor Brown, until a full opportunity be given the citizens to express an opinion for or against the change. It was further resolved that a copy of the resolution be sent to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly for presentation to the Legislature. The resolution was carried as follows: Yes, Wheat, McDonald, Taylor, Brown, Balls, Nave, Tanton, Horne. Before taking a vote the Mayor stated he was in favor of abolition.
