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Car Companies Boost Demand For U.S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP) — The automobile industry will spark 1964 to a record year for raw steel production and the third best year in history for finished steel shipments, Steel magazine says.

The metalworking weekly says automakers will move back into the top steel-buying position by the end of this month.

"From the first half to the second, shipments to the automotive market dropped 25 per cent on a 9.5 per cent drop in production of cars and trucks," Steel says. "This year, second-half shipments to auto-makers and their suppliers may be as much as 20 per cent higher than they were in the 1963 period."

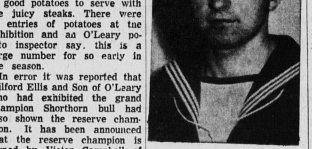
Special Request Being Made For Type O-Negative Blood

Making their first appearance in Prince Edward Island since being patented "all white" the three vehicles which make up the caravan of the Red Cross mobile blood donor team arrived in Charlottetown last evening to carry out clinics during the next four days.

On being questioned as to the present condition of the blood supply at the Maritime depot in Halifax, the nurse-in-charge of the team, stated that a second emergency clinic held in Halifax during the past week produced a sufficient amount to meet the needs until the blood being collected this week in P.E.I. is shipped to Halifax at the conclusion of each day's clinics. The blood collected in this Province during the next four days—1,000 bottles are being sought at the minimum price of \$2.00 to supply the requirements for patients in both Nova Scotia and P.E.I. for at least the coming week.

"A critical situation will develop in both provinces should the clinics in this province from August 17 to 20 fall below their quotas," according to Red Cross officials.

It was further stated that all previous "O Negative" donors from the areas in which the clinics are to be held were written a special letter asking them to make every effort to attend one of the clinics. "O Negative" is the type of blood needed in emergencies — and there are many of them, especially this year since only a small percentage of donors are "O Negative."
