**THE PARTY SYSTEM.**

In the course of his latest speech to the people of the Empire, Lord Salisbury lamented the decadence of the Opposition party in Great Britain, and says:  
"The dual character of English parties is for the moment almost destroyed, and we cannot but feel that if this state was to continue too long we should be in danger of falling into that condition of Parliamentary groups which is fatal to the constitutional existence of more than one Parliamentary system on the continent. (Hear, hear.) I earnestly hope—I do not hope for their victory—but I earnestly hope that they will get into fighting trim before very long. (Laughter.) I am quite sure it is bad for them, it is bad for us, and it is bad for the country, if they continue to occupy a position so little conspicuous and effective as that which they occupy at the present moment."

These words of our greatest statesman ought to be well weighed by those who desire the abolition of the party system under which Canada as well as Great Britain has wonderfully prospered. There is danger in Canada—note the present condition in British Columbia—of falling into that condition of Parliamentary groups which is fatal to constitutional existence!

A writer in Scribner's, for June, says:  
"It appears to me one of the clearest inductions from history that British politics have been purified by colonial responsibilities; that the ablest men and cleanest men in Britain have been drawn into unselfish service of the state by the interest attaching to the development of the Empire, and the dangers attending it."

Addressing the people of the United States, this writer continues:

"We, too, must rise to the occasion. We absolutely must send our best men into public life. We must make the service of the state our highest aspiration, worthy any personal sacrifice; we must banish trickery and corruption from the dark corners where they still lurk."

We commend these words to the people of Canada, and particularly to the people of this Province.

It ought to be our aspiration to emulate the example of Great Britain when selecting and electing representative men to sit in Parliament.

With two strong parties in the State, and honest as well as capable men in each, the State will reach its highest prosperity. It is as true now as when the words were first written that "Righteousness exalteth a nation."

Down with Pinesu politics and humbug; up with men of principle and honor in both political parties!

**WELL DONE, SIR CHARLES!**

The country will, we feel sure, approve Sir Charles Tupper's dismissal of Mr. Robert Birmingham, the party organizer in Ontario, who wired the Conservative leader as follows:

"Unless payment of my account submitted to you yesterday, and the terms of future engagements as handed to you, Montague last night, are accepted by you, I shall wire the Premier to extend investigations to include from 1882 to 1896."

To this message Sir Charles replied,—"OTTAWA, May 25.  
"ROBT. BIRMINGHAM, Toronto:

"Your message of May 22nd received. You will never receive another dollar from any fund which I can control.  
"(Signed) CHAR. TUPPER."

That Mr. Birmingham should be paid whatever money the Conservative party may owe him admits of no dispute. But his impudent threat was properly met by

the Conservative leader. If Mr. Birmingham, or any other Conservative agent, has done anything at all comparable with the acts of the Liberals as set forth in the McNish confession and the Pritchett affidavit, it is well that the country should know the fact. Sir Charles is evidently not afraid of the developments that may be made—at all events he has not allowed himself to be blackmailed.

**MR. STEWART'S ADDRESS.**

MR. W. S. STEWART, Q. C., while in Moncton addressed the Tupper Club, by the members of which he was given a cordial reception. The Times reports that his address "was of the impromptu sort; yet he made a good impression by the fluent and concise manner in which he dealt with the political situation in Canada." Mr. Stewart reviewed the political situation in this Province, and was loudly applauded when he declared "the readiness of the Conservatives to contest every constituency in the Province with most excellent prospects." Of course he referred to the Pinesu and Wise outrages, which have lately shocked the moral sense of all Canadians. "All these disgraceful tactics, Mr. Stewart said, enabled the grit government in P. E. I-land to hold on. The grit tactics on the Island were only along the same lines followed by the grits at Ottawa. They made promises they never could or never intended to fulfill, and once obtaining power they made up their minds to hold on by tyrannical methods which if followed out must become revolutionary. Such methods, the speaker was sure, must be condemned by the people when the Liberal party went to the country. The hand of Tarte and his associates at Ottawa were recognizable in the disgraceful events being practised in P. E. I-land, Ontario and other parts of Canada, and the people were determined when the opportunity came to let these men know that such dishonorable tactics must cease."

The impression made by Mr. Stewart was so favorable that he received an enthusiastic vote of thanks and was invited to address the club at greater length in the near future.

**A QUESTION FOR THE SPEAKER.**

It is stated in a semi official letter, in Friday's Patriot, that Mr. Wise's seat in the Legislature had become vacant by reason of that gentleman having been sent to England as a delegate a year ago and having since been paid by the Local Government for his time and trouble. We are not aware of the terms under which Mr. Wise was sent to England, and consequently are unable definitely to say whether his employment vacated his seat or not. But, if it did, we should imagine that the law which vacated Mr. Wise's seat has also vacated some other members' seats. If we mistake not Mr. Farquharson himself has been receiving pay from the Local Government for trips to Ottawa, and he has also been in receipt of money for services rendered to the Dominion Government; and Mr. Arthur Peters, another member of the Legislature, is now employed by the Dominion Government in drawing deeds and examining titles in connection with the Belfast Railway. Mr. Fred Peters has been employed by the Dominion

Government in connection with the Behring Sea Arbitration and has received thousands of dollars from the Dominion Treasury. If, therefore, Mr. Wise vacated his seat by reason of being sent as a delegate to England, the seats of the other members referred to have also been vacated. The Speaker has ruled that he has power to deal with these matters, and we direct his attention to them.

"We learn that all work on the Belfast and Murray Harbor railway was stopped this morning by an order telegraphed from Ottawa. What's the matter now?"

**THE SECOND DISTRICT.**

MR. SPEAKER CUMMISKEY has informed the House that Mr. Joseph Wise resigned his seat as a member of the Legislature for the Second District of Queen's County and that, early in March last, he notified His Honor the Lieutenant Governor of the vacancy in the district. It then became the duty of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, within seven days after the receipt of the Speaker's notification, to have issued a writ to fill the vacancy. This has not been done, and as an excuse we have been told by the Patriot that the Government, not the Governor, has a "discretion." The law however gives no such discretion. The duty of the Lieutenant Governor is clear and explicit, and admits of no delay. The word used in the 20th section of the 56 Vic. Cap. I. is "shall." "The Lieutenant Governor shall, within seven days after the receipt of a notification," issue the writ. The word "shall" in the construction of the statute is to be construed as imperative. The Interpretation Act 41 Vic. Cap. 22, sec. 9, so declares, and the word "Lieutenant-Governor" means and refers to the Governor and not to the Governor in Council. This is also settled by the same statute.

We therefore, most respectfully, call the attention of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor to this matter and to the fact that not only seven days, but nearly three months, have elapsed since the Speaker notified him of the vacancy.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**
