New Classes In South Shore Festival

—Although a number of new classes have been included in the 1951 South Shore Musical Festival competition, yet it will still be possible to present trophies to the contestants winning first, second and third place in each class. Mrs. John Simmons, convener of the Prizes and Awards committee, reported to the Festival executive that, through the generosity and co-operation of the business and professional men of Summerside and South Shore centers, aided by the Women's Institutes, trophies had been secured for all thirty-four classes, as well as some special trophies for outstanding merit.

There are five trophies to be awarded for outstanding merit, that is obtaining the highest number of marks of any competitor in a group of classes in the same category.

The Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell Trophy — Adult Vocal Classes — 18 years and over.

The P. E. I. Bag Co. annual Trophy — Boys' and Girls' Vocal Classes — 11-18 years of age, inclusive.

The Sheen and MacLennan-Barbara Ann Shoppe Award — Boy's and Girl's Vocal Classes — 10 years and under.

The Pleasant Circle Women's Institute, and the Tryon Women's Institute Award — Children's Pianoforte Classes — 16 years and under.

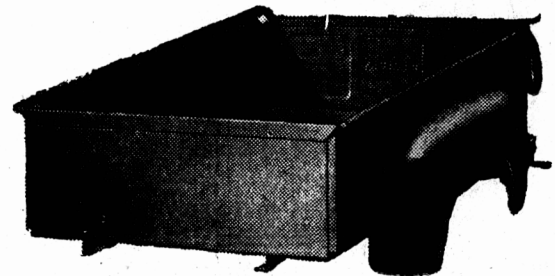

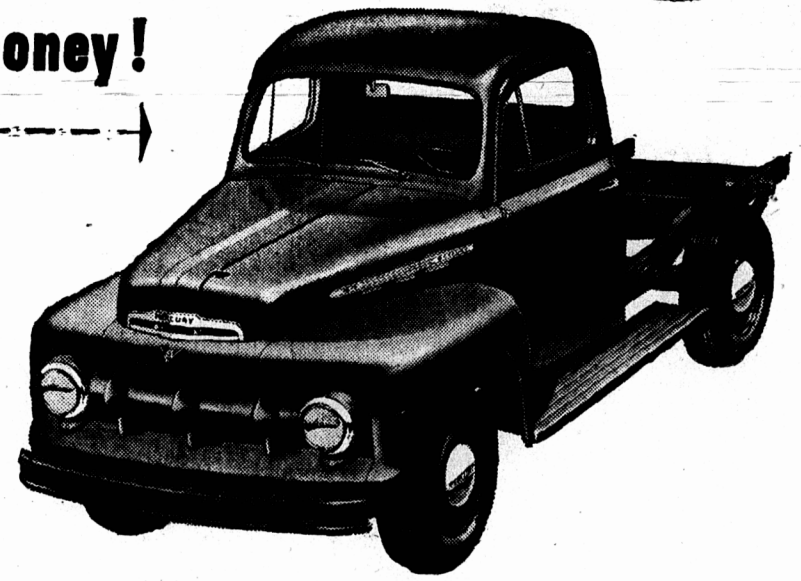

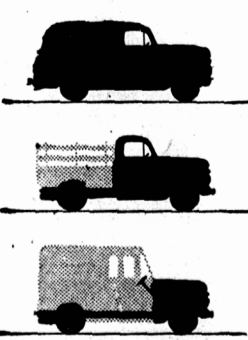
