Through the use of such a system, it is possible states Mr. Snazelle to spread the equivalent of an inch of rain on the ground every two hours. The sprinkler throws out two streams of water, one high in the air, the other lower to cover all ground around the system.

The openings on the sprinklers through which the water is emitted are five-thirty-seconds of an inch in diameter. The nursery area must be watered very fine states Mr. Snazelle or the seed will be washed away.

The greatest need for a sprinkler this year was in May and June in planting time when the land was baked due to the dry weather. There was certainly no need for it this week, Mr. Snazelle stated, as he recalled the recent storm.

And another addition to the three year old nursery site is the construction of a storage building for shrubs and trees. Shrubs will be imported from Holland and kept dormant in this building until planting time.

One end of the 54x20 foot structure will form a glass house. The cellar will have a six foot overhead clearance and a dirt floor covered by one foot of sand.

This year, in the first season of operation, the nursery has sold more than 5000 shrubs and bulbs in filling nearly 600 orders. A large number of pine seedlings as well as elm and maple were sold.

A number of poeony and tulip bulbs have been ordered for September and already orders have been placed for next year's shrubs.

vide the reinforcements to right the fires, care for the wounded, do other things.

Each target and cushion area will be a civil defence zone, each under controller whose peacetime job will be to help the zone into a co-operative machine that will function in disaster.

The reception area lies outside these two. There the casualties and refugees will go. In some cases, a reception area might be an entire Province. It will be the responsibility of the provincial government to co-ordinate its efforts.

Basic Organization

Inside these areas will work the civil defence organizations. The basic organization of all of them is founded on the existing police and fire services and will consist of a headquarters, wardens, rescue, pioneer, ambulance and welfare sections.

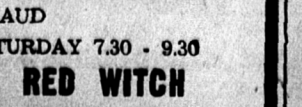

control the rest of the force. The wardens will be men and women who are neighborhood leaders the people who take over command in the streets when disaster strikes. The rescue sections will get special training for such jobs as getting people out from beneath debris.

The pioneers will deal with debris clearance, stretcher bearing, demolition, decontamination and small engineering tasks. The ambulance sections will have teams of two people and an ambulance apiece. They will pick up casualties and take them to first aid posts on the periphery of the target area.

The welfare section has the responsibility of caring for the homeless and the helpless.

Acadian Teachers

Open Sessions At Summerside

The fifty-eighth annual convention of the Acadian teachers began on Thursday, Aug. 24th, with high mass celebrated in St. Paul's Church, Summerside, by Rev. Charles Gallant of Egmont Bay. The sermon, preached by Rev. J. H. LeClair of Summerside, dealt with the spiritual importance of education. Some of the points emphasized were, Christ's love for children while he was on earth. He said that the teacher must lead his pupil to Christ and pointed out the means by which the teacher can accomplish this important task.

The sessions were held in St. Paul's hall with Mr. Elmer Pineau, B.A., presiding. Mr. Benoit DesRoches of the High School staff was the secretary. On the stage were, the Rt. Rev. G. J. MacLellan, V.G., His Honor Mayor Henry Wedge, Hon. Wilfred Arsenault, Provincial Secretary. Over fifty teachers were in attendance.

In his address the President spoke of the importance of these teachers conventions, of the beautiful progressive town chosen for the convention and of the great improvement in the Acadian educational status.

Monignor MacLellan expressed his pleasure in welcoming the teachers to Summerside. He spoke of their spiritual responsibility, of the importance of good example and of the sacrifices necessary for good education.

Mayor Wedge also welcomed the teachers to Summerside, a town which has been called the most progressive in Canada. The Acadian residents are glad that this town has been added to the cycle of centres for holding these conventions. He encouraged the teachers to keep their bilingual schools.

Hon. Mr. Arsenault extended the wish for a most successful convention and said that during the other sessions he would help by his observations to solve some of the teachers difficulties.

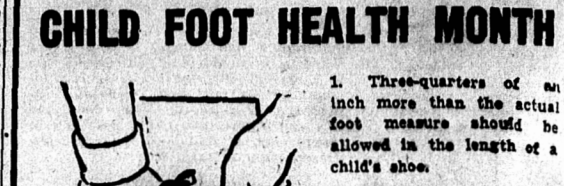
