In his address, Mr. J. A. Sullivan, the rector, said that while contending with the problem of accommodating large numbers and making as much provision as possible for the future, the university must always attend to the ever pressing and most important duty of university life, the preparation and proper formation of young people to take their place in life as enlightened citizens, to fulfill their duties as individuals and as members of society.
