

Argonauts Crush Riders; Ti-Cats Capture Top Spot

Hamilton Tiger-Cats breezed into their second consecutive Big Four football league championship Saturday on a 29-10 victory over Montreal Alouettes who now

are faced with a tough battle for a spot in the three-team eastern Canada playoffs.
At Ottawa, Toronto Argonauts emerged as a new power in the league, crushing Ottawa Rough Riders 41-0 for their second shut-out victory in a week.

Meanwhile in Senior Ontario Rugby Football Union action at London, the Lords moved into second place Saturday night with a second-half rally to defeat Kitchener - Waterloo Dutchmen 28-25. The win snapped a second-place deadlock between the Lords and Dutchmen.

SECOND HALF POWER
In Hamilton's Civic Stadium, the third-place Alts tried desperately to salvage a win. They held Tiger-Cats to a 7-3 half-time lead, but Hamilton, the greatest second-half scoring team in the league, ran away with a two-touchdown third quarter and another in the final period.
The loss left the Alts just three points ahead of the surging Argonauts. With three games remaining in the 14-game schedule, Riders hold down second place with 10 points, one up on the Alts. Argonauts trail with six points.

The loss snapped Lions' three-game winning streak and left them with six points, well back of fourth-place Calgary.

Dotted Line was 7 1/2 lengths ahead of the third horse, Byrman Stable's Civet, in the field of seven. Warhead finished fourth, another three-quarters of a length back.

THOSE WHO ARE laboring under the impression that Pat McMurry was just a stepping stone for George Chuvavo must have received quite a jolt last Friday night.
The Canadian champion, who was considered ready for the top brass in the world's heavyweight division, just didn't have what it takes against the unruffled ex-marine. The 26-year-old McMurry displayed terrific boxing skill and taught Chuvavo a mighty expensive lesson. Irish Pat showed that he could do more than dish it out. He took Chuvavo's best in that second round, was close to a knockout victim but fought the Canadian off with his great boxing knowledge.

After that it was a sorry story for Chuvavo and his many followers. Big George was a clumsy figure from then on, although he did rally briefly in the ninth. But it was to no avail as McMurry had an answer to his every move. The television patrons were not on the edge of their chairs waiting for the decision. The only thing folks wanted to hear was how badly the officials figured Chuvavo had been beaten. There wasn't much difference in the call of the three officials. One was 8-2, another 7-3 and the third 8-1.

YOU WOULD FIND a lot of folks before Friday's fight that would insist that the Toronto boy was championship material. There are some who still stick to that opinion. But we are certain that a great many who sang George's praises earlier are not doing that after his dismal showing last Friday. Chuvavo looked awful trying to avoid those jabs of McMurry. He appeared to have no defence whatever as the Irishman kept pointing away at the Canadian's face.
There's no denying that Chuvavo's has a terrific punch. But he got very little chance to use it after that second round. He was facing a guy who knew how to defend himself and could deal out plenty of punishment as well.
Chuvavo may have the makings of a champion. But he has a tremendous lot to learn, judging by his showing against McMurry. And after all, Pat was ranked in the first ten by the fellows who are supposed to know what they are talking about. He has a long way to come.

THE NEW YORK YANKEES certainly were liberal with their world series money. The boys forgot nobody when they went into conference on how to split the "gravy" up.
Virgil Trucks, relief pitcher since the Bombers in June, two months after the season was underway, yet he received a full share, just the same amount as Bob Turley who won two world series games and saved a third.
Sal Maglie was released by the Stengelites on June 14 but the Yankees didn't forget the Barber when they were dividing the spoils. They cut Sal in for half a share which was a generous gesture to say the least.
42-year-old Murray Dickson was ready to call it quits early this season. He was laboring with the Kansas City Athletics and decided he had enough. The Yankees changed his mind by acquiring him in late August, just one month before the end of the regular season. Murray was with the New Yorkers from August 26 to be exact and he had two brief appearances in the recent world series. It was well worth his time. His teammates decided the veteran should get three-quarters of a share.

TORONTO SPORT FANS were anything but a happy lot following that crushing defeat of George Chuvavo Friday night. Most of the Queen City folks were counting on a Chuvavo victory but they received a really big disappointment.
However Saturday certainly didn't follow the same pattern for those who like to howl for Toronto entries in Big Four Football and the National Hockey League. The Argonauts, who recently have come to life crushed Ottawa Rough Riders 41-0 while Hamilton was easily disposing of Montreal Alouettes. That night the Maple Leafs scored their first victory of the season by edging Boston 3-2.

ARGONAUTS, led by Ronnie Knox, trail Montreal for the last playoff position by three points. Each team has three games left, with two of them against each other. The Argos play their other fixture against Ottawa and Alouettes entertain Hamilton Tiger-Cats. If the Argos can continue their terrific pace (they've got 78 points in the past two games against the top clubs—and none scored against them) and win their three remaining games, they will make the playoffs. If this should happen, then Hamilton and Ottawa had better beware. This Toronto outfit seems to mean business and they'll give it everything to pull this last playoff spot out of the fire.
There's a lot of fun left in the Big Four yet.

THE MAPLE LEAFS looked good in their win over Boston. They had served notice Thursday night in Montreal that they would be tough. The Canadiens had their hands full beating the Rezy-coached team 4-3. Saturday night they were full value for their triumph. Stewart played a whale of a good game and Allan Stanley looks like he will be a big help to the Leafs.
Rangers surprised by battling Canadiens to a 2-2 tie and Detroit handed Chicago its first defeat of the season. All of which, we think, is an indication that this year's National Hockey League is going to produce the best competition in a long, long time.

CONGRATULATIONS to Saint Dunstan's football team who rolled to a 45-20 triumph over Acadia University on Saturday at Wolfville. It was the second win in as many starts for the Red and White and left them tied for top spot with Mount Allison who crushed Saint Thomas 47-13.

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs are probably wishing they could play more National Hockey League games against Boston Bruins. Leafs with Ron Stewart scoring two goals, edged Bruins 3-2 Saturday night for their first victory of the season after three consecutive losses.
Bruins lost the services of defenceman Doug Mohns in the second period. He suffered a fractured jaw when checked along the boards.
Boston took an early 1-0 lead and, after Leafs had gone ahead 2-1 in the second period, it appeared Bruins might salvage a tie when they scored early in the third. But Stewart scored his game-winning goal at 6:49.

FIRST NHL GOAL
Rookie defenceman Carl Brewer scored his first NHL goal for Leafs and right winger Jerry Toppazzini scored both Boston goals.
Leaf goaltender Johnny Bower was the "goat" on Bruins' first goal but he made up for it in the rest of the game when he pulled off some acrobatic saves.
Toppazzini opened the scoring at 4:02 of the first period when his slow sliding shot skidded into the Leaf net off Bower's stick. Stewart tied the score at 4:13 of the second.
CHICAGO (CP)—Detroit Red Wings seem to have found a left winger to replace the departed Ted Lindsay as a linemate for the great Gordie Howe.
Alex Delvecchio, a centre moved over to the left wing spot this season, scored all Detroit's goals Saturday afternoon as the Red Wings handed Chicago Black Hawks their first loss in five National Hockey League starts, a 3-1 decision.

MONTREAL (CP)—Andy Heberton popped in a goal from close range at 18:15 of the third period Saturday night to give New York Rangers a 2-2 tie with Montreal Canadiens in a spectacular battle of goalsies.
The Rangers twice came from behind to get their fourth tie, against one loss, in the new National Hockey League season.
Andy Bathgate shot the 100th goal of his NHL career to match an earlier second-period goal by Montreal's Bernie (Toots) Bloom. Geoffrion, and Heberton came through nearly 12 minutes after Marcel Bonin had given Montreal a 2-1 lead.
The crowd of 14,175 saw Montreal take a 1-0 lead at 6:57 of the middle period. Geoffrion scoring from a scramble after Jean Beliveau and Alvin McDonald had fired at Gump Worsley in vain.
Bathgate picked up Dean Prentice's pass out and scored on a low shot to the far corner at 16:58. The New York winger, now in his fifth full NHL season, retrieved the puck from the net as about 420 worshippers evacuated the building. No bomb was found.

Racetrack Fire Kills 27 Horses

UPPER MARLBORO, Md. (AP)—An estimated 27 race horses were killed and 27 others injured Sunday when fire swept the stable area at Marlboro race track.

Two barns were destroyed and two others damaged as a stiff northerly wind whipped flames into a fire that burned for an hour.

The half-mile track is located about 15 miles southeast of Washington.

The melee brought to an abrupt end a match between Catania and Vigevano, of Italy's second-rate "B" league. The score was tied 1-1 with nine minutes to play when a man of Catania fans poured out of the stands on to the playing field.

Rescued After Nightmarish 2 Days At Sea

VANCOUVER (CP)—A Ferndale, Wash., fisherman was pulled from the sea Friday by the British freighter Pacific Stronghold following a nightmarish two days in which his boat broke down and he was forced to swim for his life.

Raymond Hong, about 20, was picked up by the 11,300-ton freighter off Point Roberts, south of here, after he had drifted and prayed for three hours, thrashing the icy waters to keep afloat.

His struggle for survival began Wednesday when his small gill-netter, loaded with fish, broke down in dark grey fog a few miles off Point Roberts.

Trying to attract attention, he fell overboard but managed to pull himself aboard again. But the boat began to fill with water, and finally settled to her gunwales.

Friday morning he found himself swimming, alone, in a cold, silent sea.

It was then that the Pacific Stronghold, bound to Vancouver from Bellingham, Wash., spotted him and went to his aid.

They gave him clothing, food, and a warm cabin.

He was taken to the United States consulate and provided with bus fare and pocket money to return home.

Canadiens Top Rangers; Bruins Beat Hawks 4-1

NEW YORK (AP)—Rocket Richard powered Montreal with a pair of goals as the Canadiens rallied in the final period to turn back the winless New York Rangers 5-3. The Rocket's second goal broke a 3-3 tie and Boom Boom Geoffrion added the clincher in the last minute as the Canadiens overcame a two-goal deficit in the exciting National Hockey League game.

Veteran Harry Haulkula paced the Mounties with a pair of touchdowns and two converts.
Peter Smallman, Bruce MacFarlane and Doug Yryde each collected a touchdown. Bryan Jones and Terry Gulliver picked up the St. Thomas majors.

The Rangers pulled goalie Gump Worsley in the final minute in an effort to gain a tie. But the manoeuvre backfired as Geoffrion scored on an open net.

NEW YORK, the only team without a victory this season, went to the front with only 46 seconds gone in the game on Lou Fontinato's 60-foot screed shot that bounced past Jacques Plante, the Canadiens' netminder.
Wally Hergeshimer clicked from close range at 8:21 to give the Rangers a 2-0 advantage before Jean Beliveau climaxed a power play and converted Geoffrion's rebound at 12:40. New York was shorthanded at the time with Larry Popein sitting out a penalty.

Camille Henry gave the Rangers a 3-1 lead late in the stanza, lifting the disc over Plante, who was lying flat in the goalmouth. Then the Canadiens went into action with one goal in the second period and the three-goal third period outburst.

CHICAGO (AP)—Vic Stasiuk's three goals and the outstanding goal-tending of Don Simmons paced Boston Bruins to a 4-1 win over Chicago Black Hawks in a National Hockey League battle at the stadium Sunday night.

Stasiuk's feat was the second hat trick scored against the Black Hawks in two days, Detroit's Alex Delvecchio having done it Saturday afternoon.

The fourth Boston goal was scored by Stasiuk's linemate, Johnny Bucyk, who also gained credit for assists on two of Stasiuk's markers.

Chicago's line tally was made by Bobby Hull late in the final period.

Ullman scored on a slap shot in front of the Toronto net when the contest was less than two minutes old, and in the second period did practically all the work on the second goal. He stick-handled through the Maple Leaf defence, got off a weak shot and rookie Claude Laforege skated across the goalmouth and flicked in the rebound.

Defenceman Red Kelly got the third Detroit goal on a setup from Gordie Howe, who stole the puck at the Toronto blue line. Howe shoved a pass to Kelly who whizzed a 25-footer under goalie Johnny Bower's left arm.

Only six penalties were called by referee Red Storey, but Hull and Boston's Guy Gendron each were given five-minute raps for fighting in the final period.
A goal by Hull was disallowed in the second frame because referee Storey had been knocked down by the Chicago skaters and temporarily stunned. According to NHL rules, when an official is injured play automatically stops.
