

Canadiens Come From Behind For 5-2 Win Over Detroit Red Wings

DETROIT, April 5—(AP)—The underdog Montreal Canadiens literally got up from the floor tonight to topple the favored Detroit Red Wings, 5 to 2, and move within one game of the Stanley Cup hockey finals.

Montreal scored three second-period goals to come from behind and nip the defending Stanley Cup champions 5-2. Canadiens now lead the best-of-seven semifinal series three games to two with the next game in Montreal Saturday night.

A sell-out crowd of 14,221 saw Detroit score its two goals in the opening period. But the Canadiens, who had finished in third place in the National Hockey League, jumped right back in the second period to pass the Detroiters.

The third period was all Montreal's too.

Little Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion put the second period spark into the Canadiens. It was his goal at 17:51 of the period that pushed the Canadiens ahead 2-2 and left Detroit a dazed, unaggressive club.

Maurice (The Rocket) Richard, Billy Reay, Bert Olmstead, and Calum MacKay scored the other Montreal goals.

Sid Abel and Gordie Howe, Detroit's biggest goal producers in this series, tallied for the Wings. The two clubs now move to Montreal for Saturday's battle, the seventh game, if needed, will be played at Detroit Tuesday, with the winner of the series moving into the finals against the Toronto-Boston series victor.

Goalie Gerry McNeil of the Canadiens posted a sparkling performance after Howe and Abel punctured him for close-in goals in the first 11 minutes of play. He made 28 saves to Detroit's Harry Sawchuk's 25.

Reay opened the Montreal scoring at 4:04 of the second period from 15-foot out. With Detroit short-handed one man, Olmstead deflected Richard's long try into the net at 11:48. Geoffrion's goal put Montreal ahead.

Richard, whose overtime goals won the first two games, skated in on goalie Sawchuk at 14:45 of

the third period and flipped the puck past Sawchuk's left shoulder. MacKay ended the scoring at 18:07.

The game started off roughly with referee George Gravel calling three penalties in the first period on Ben Woit and Ted Lindsay of Detroit and Richard. The only major penalty was called against Richard for fighting with Lindsay in the first period.

Smythe Says Saturday Game Big One In Series

TORONTO, April 5—(CP)—Saturday's fifth game is the big one in the Boston-Toronto Stanley Cup semi-final, says Conn Smythe.

"Whoever team wins that one will be in the driver's seat the rest of the way," the Toronto manager said today, discussing the outlook for the best-of-seven series in which his Maple Leafs hold a 2-1 edge over Bruins. One game was tied.

Smythe reported that Harry Watson, idle for almost two weeks with a shoulder separation, won't be ready for any games in the Boston series. A workout today at St. Catharines doused any hopes that the 200-pound left wing, who scored three of his 18 goals in the National Hockey League season against Boston, would see action.

The rest of the Toronto squad is in good shape and goalie Turk Broda "is a day older—but that doesn't matter, he's spry enough."

The Bruins were due to arrive in Toronto tomorrow morning and have scheduled a workout during the day. Weakened by injuries to right-wing Johnny Peirson, a doubtful starter Saturday, and veteran centre Milt Schmidt, they have called up two players from Tulsa, their United States Hockey League affiliate—centre Bart Bradley, a former Port Arthur player, and defenceman Bill Davidson.

After Saturday night's game, the Leafs and Bruins will head for Boston for the sixth game Sunday night. The seventh is billed for Toronto next Tuesday. If an eighth is necessary to settle the issue, the issue it will be here—in effect a replay of the 1-1 tie last Saturday.

Twice during the game Hal had the Club physician administer a local anesthetic with a needle in the shoulder to deaden the pain, but despite it all, performed brilliantly in his case for a one-goal show. Receiving the fullest cooperation and protection from his fellow teammates, Gordon still was compelled to handle a total of 22 shots.

Although Hal is in hospital at the present time with a cast on his shoulder, and will be replaced in tonight's game by Dennis Brodeur, he can rest assured that both Dennis and the rest of the team will not let him down. After the fine support he has given them in their quest of the Maritime hockey crown, they'll be in there jitching tonight. All Island fans will be wishing the plucky custodian a speedy recovery, but in the event that he will not make it back to his team for the rest of the season, they say "thanks for everything Hal."

Fred Hughes paced the winners with two goals. Harold Hughes, Jim Ayers, Deacon and Robinson were the other Covehead marksmen. Cal MacDonald and Burke scored for the losers.

Last night's win marked the end of a successful season for the Red Wings. During the season they won the S. R. Johnston and the Kelly and McInnis trophies for winning the North River League. One of their players, Harold Hughes, won a trophy donated by the Sport Lodge for scoring the most points in league play. Hughes racked up 20 points, one more than team mate Vic Deacon.

Ontario House Is Prorogued

TORONTO, April 5—(CP)—The third session of Ontario's 23rd Legislature ended today with the possibility that the House will meet again this year and with the assurance by Premier Frost that he doesn't intend to call a June election.

After nine weeks in which members passed 125 bills—97 of them government measures—the house voted 48 to 34 to support the administration on a non-confidence motion by the C. C. F. opposition.

In his budget debate speech preceding the vote, Mr. Frost said he had "not even remotely considered" calling a general election in June.

Islanders - Millionaires Meet Tonight In 5th Game Of Finals Series

There will be two red-hot irons in the fire tonight when the P. E. Islanders and Sydney Millionaires skate out to do battle over Forum ice at 8:30 in the fifth game of their best of seven series for the Maritime Major hockey championship and the right to continue on along the playoff trail for the Alexander Trophy.

To Take No Action On Complaints Of Sydney Fans

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., April 5—(CP)—President Bryce M. Love of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association announced tonight that no action will be taken against Charlottetown Islanders regarding alleged improper conduct by some members of the team at a game in Sydney, N. S., last Saturday.

A telephone and telegraph vote of the M. A. H. A. executive had been taken, Mr. Love said, and the majority ruled no action should be taken in the absence of a report from the referees at the Sydney game.

Some Sydney residents had filed complaints with the president, claiming certain members of the Charlottetown Islanders were guilty of "filthy" language and actions during a Maritime major playoff game against Sydney Millionaires. Charlottetown's Johnny Horek was named in particular.

Mr. Love said referees Bill Roberts and Bill Slater, both of Montreal, had made no such report following the game. Contacted in Montreal today, they said they did not observe any disgraceful actions or hear any such language during the game. "Otherwise penalties would have been imposed."

In a Sydney-Charlottetown series now stands at two games to one in favor of Sydney, with one game tied. The next is scheduled for Charlottetown tomorrow night.

Mr. Love said the association "does not approve nor will they condone for a minute any foul language or filthy actions by any player under their control. But if the referees who are the sole representative of the association on the ice fail to observe such conditions and do not file the necessary report, how can the officers of the association take action against a player? If a case of this nature should reach the courts the officers would be without vital evidence so necessary in such a matter."

With Dennis Brodeur, top goalender with Saint John Beavers during the regular Big Four season, as net custodian to replace the injured Hal Gordon, coach Leo Lamoureux will be sending his Islanders' warriors out on the ice to pick up where they left off on Wednesday night when they belted Millionaires for a convincing 8-1 victory.

Smarting under the worst lacing they have taken this season, Sydney are quoted to be coming out looking for retaliation, and although a little worried and shaky at the prospects, will be a determined band of pucksters tonight.

The game could be the key one of the series for either team, depending on how the tide of battle goes. Islanders, still the underdogs on points, need this victory to put them on an even keel with the opposition before the series shifts back to Cape Breton ice on Monday and Tuesday night for the sixth and seventh games. The Monkeys, with a two point lead in the series going into tonight's fray, could really put the locals behind the eight ball in the series with a win that would stretch their lead to four points with two games left for home ice.

With the exception of a few possible last-minute changes, the Millionaires are expected to enter the fray with much the same roster they led here during the past two contests, while the Islanders will also be sticking close to their Wednesday night formation.

Coach Lamoureux stated last night that he may have centre Frank Bathgate back in action tonight, but would not be able to decide until today until he makes a final check on his charge's condition. Frank suffered a painful back injury in Tuesday night's game against Sydney.

India Declines Low-grade Wheat

OTTAWA, April 5—(CP)—India has decided to decline a gift of low-grade wheat from Canada, P. K. Banerjee, India's acting high commissioner, said in an interview today.

"The poor people of India would not have understood the gift," he said. "Even though there is hunger in India and more wheat is needed, we have decided to wait until high-quality wheat is available in Canada next fall."
