Controlled Fluoridation Benefits Million Canadians

Almost one million Canadians are now drinking water with fluoride content adjusted by fluoridation. Many thousands more have, for many years, been drinking water with similar fluoride content derived only from underground deposits, reports the Canadian Dental Association.

Several communities have approved by plebiscite the fluoridation of their water supplies but do not yet have the necessary equipment in operation.

A recent government survey showed 66% improvement in tooth decay of children in Brantford, Ontario, which has had fluoridation for 12 years.

The Canadian Dental Association, which strongly endorses the measure, has compiled a list of 28 Canadian municipalities which had begun fluoridation by the first of this year.

Meeting In Halifax Of Conservative Candidates

Almost all the 33 Conservatives from 31 Atlantic constituencies met over the week-end in Halifax N. S. to review the accomplishments of the Diefenbaker government, and the benefits that have accrued to the Atlantic Provinces since their first similar meeting in May, 1957, and to draw up a second set of "Atlantic Resolutions".

All four of the P. E. I. Conservative candidates were present, accompanied by Geo. Rogers of Charlottetown and W. Chester S. MacDonald of Summerside.

Three other Cabinet Ministers were there in addition to Angus McLean, Minister of Fisheries.

Hon. Geo. Nowlan, Minister of National Revenue, Hon. W. Brown, Minister without Portfolio, and Hon. A. J. Braocks, Minister of Veterans' Affairs, the latter being general chairman of the meeting, Premier Stanfield of N. S. and Hon. Robt. Pichette of N. B. represented the Provincial governments. W. R. Shaw of P. E. I. was unable to be present, as he was attending an Agricultural meeting in Ottawa.

The spirit of co-operative effort between the Atlantic members was strongly stressed, and the members pledged themselves to continue this work together to further the interests of this Maritime region.

Atom-Powered Plane Planned

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The United States Navy has disclosed that it plans to produce atomic-powered seaplanes by 1965.

In an announcement of research being done at the Philadelphia naval base, the navy said Friday that a proposed fleet of nuclear seaplanes is scheduled to go into operation in the 1964-65 period.

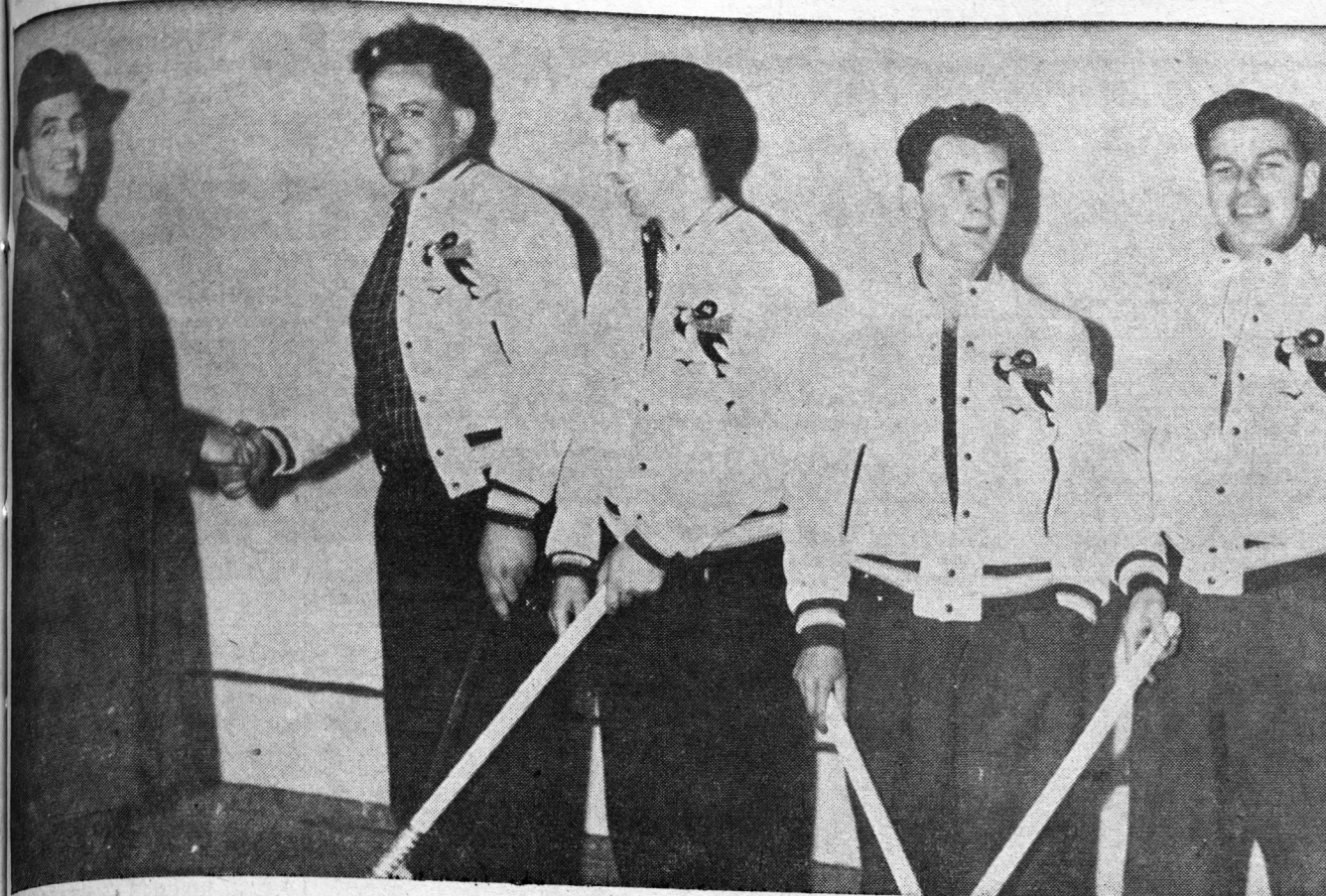

Farm Machinery Rental May Be Tried Here Soon

The rental method of "merchandising" goods — which some observers think will be one of the big developments of the business scene in the near future — will apparently soon be available for farm machinery.

Paul Mulliken, national director of the National Retail Farm Equipment Association of the United States, outlined such a plan to a recent sales conference in Toronto of Cockshutt Farm Equipment Ltd.

As outlined by Mr. Mulliken the plan would have a base charge of one per cent per day of the value of equipment, decreasing proportionately for longer periods.

Under the schedule, rental of a \$7,000 machine for one day would be \$70; for one week \$350 and for 30 days \$1,050.

John J. Phillips, Cockshutt's general manager, said his company is in agreement with a plan of this kind. "It could," he added, "be of great service to farmers."

W. C. Barry, director of production service, department of agriculture, Ottawa, told the conference:

"If our population growth continues at the recent rate, we will need to increase our food output to feed the equivalent of a new city of between 300,000 and 400,000 every year."

"We have 2,000,000,000 acres of land. We farm only 174,000,000 acres of it. At best, not more than 50,000,000 acres could be added, and even some of our present farm land is marginal and gradually being withdrawn from cropping."

"Farming is changing from a way of life to a business, with large specialty operations taking over the dominant position."

However, farming still is largely a farm-family enterprise, Mr. Barry said 80 per cent of Canadian farms are fully-owned by the operators and 72 per cent carry no mortgage debt.

The Canadian Gas Association will hold its annual meeting at the Manoir Richelieu, near Murray Bay, on June 24-27.

Speakers will include G. Alan Burton, Toronto, vice-president and managing director of Robert Simpson Co. Ltd.; Howard Mann, Moncton, general manager of the Maritime Transportation Commission; and Eric Gracey, Toronto, general manager of the Canadian Industrial Traffic League.

Kenneth A. Ross, general manager of the Halifax Board of Trade, is acting as conference secretary.

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Six In Ten Approve P. M.'s Conduct, According To Poll

Today, across the nation, six in ten voters are of the opinion that the Prime Minister, John Diefenbaker, has been doing a good job as head of the Government. One in ten do not think so, and disapprove his handling of the role. Three in ten have no definite opinion to give.

As the election campaign gets into full swing, political experts and the average man and woman, are making their own assessments of just what the nation as a whole thinks about Mr. Diefenbaker and his inter-relationships of the Prime Minister's responsibilities. The Gallup Poll, a regular "opinion-pulse" on the people's reaction to the performance of Prime Ministers in Canada and through its affiliates, in the U.K. and the U.S. Today's level of approval of Mr. Diefenbaker is considerably higher than it was last November—and this holds true for all levels of the population. Proportion who disapprove has also increased—as more citizens are making up their mind on what they think.

The same question was put by interviewers to a sample of the voting public for today's report, as for that conducted last November.

"Do you approve, or disapprove of the way John Diefenbaker is handling his job as Prime Minister?"

In November, as the table below shows 4 per cent had no opinion to give. Today this proportion has dropped to 30 per cent on the national stage.

Regionally, approval for Mr. Diefenbaker's work remains at exactly the same level in the West, and has increased by considerable margins in Ontario and Quebec. In the Maritimes approval is slightly lower, while the proportion of those who disapprove has increased. A comparison between the Gallup Poll's November report and that for today, in the four sections of the country under study, shows this pattern:
