NEWS NOTES.

Gold continues to flow into London.

There were eight suicides in New York city last week.

The exports of gold from New York last week were \$5,585,369.

It is rumored in London that Henry Irving, the actor, is to be knighted.

An exchange remarks that advice from the western States report that the weather conditions have been very favorable for all growing crops. The temperature during the heavy rains which have fallen in the southern section during the latter part of the week, the warm weather and occasional brisk winds has assisted in drying and rapidly putting the ground in good shape for plowing. Seeding is practically finished in the central and southern section and about half-finished in the northern section. Corn and potato planting is general in the central and southern sections. Gardening is general and vegetation is doing well. Pasturage is excellent and cattle are bringing on grass in the central and southern sections. Bees are gathering pollen from willow and box-elder. Some wheat sown in March had to be sown on account of the damage done by frost and wet weather. All small grain, early sown is well up and fields are looking excellent. All indications so far point to a bountiful harvest of all crops in all sections.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure adopted—Other Business Transacted.

The adjourned regular meeting of the City Council was held last evening, Mayor Dawson presiding. Recorder Hazard and every member of the board was present.

Mayor Dawson submitted the written opinion of the Recorder, regarding the bill of W. F. Best for analysing samples of water from city wells. The substance of the opinion was that inasmuch as the analysis was not made on the authority of the Council, the city was not liable for the amount of the bill or any portion thereof.

Councillor Hughes moved that the Council do not recognize the claim of Mr. Best, in accordance with the opinion of the Recorder. Carried.

On motion of Councillor Tanton, the committee appointed to procure plans for improving the sanitary arrangements of the City Building and Market House, were authorized to call for tenders.

A letter was read from Judge A. J. Le, addressed to the City Surveyor, asking him to define the street line in front of a house owned by the Judge on Hill-borough Street, as required by a bill relating to the streets and squares and the duty of the City Surveyor.

Some discussion took place on the subject matter of the letter, and the importance of having the streets of the city surveyed with a view to the establishment of uniform and correct lines was dwelt upon by Mayor Dawson and several members of the board.

On motion of Councillor Hazard the communication was referred to the City Surveyor.

Councillor Hazard then submitted the estimates of expenditure and revenue for the current year as follows:—

Councillor Hazard briefly explained the various items of expenditure, pointing out what increases were to be effected and what savings were proposed, after which he moved that the items of expenditure be taken up one at a time and disposed of.

The motion carried, and consideration of the items began.

On the item for streets, Councillor Taylor moved that \$200 be added for the purpose of extending Richmond Street through to West Street. He spoke of the great necessity there was for this work, and claimed that Ward Three had not received its share of the expenditure on streets in the past.

Councillor Tanton seconded the motion. He regretted, however, that the amount was not \$1900. He pointed out that before the last election nearly all the Councillors came out in favor of permanent improvements on the streets, but it now looked as if we were to go on in the same old ruts. He thought the Council should take the matter up fairly and squarely, and endeavor to give the people better value for the money expended on the streets than had been given in past years.

Councillor Hooper said he would like to see better streets, but did not think the people would stand any more taxes than they are now paying.

Councillor Fenell was not favorable to extending Richmond Street through to West Street for the purpose of enhancing the value of property in that vicinity.

Councillor Dawson pointed out that the extension would be in the interests of the public rather than in the interest of persons owning property in the vicinity.

Councillor Hazard explained that the money set apart for streets would be expended fairly and that each Ward would get its share.

Councillor Taylor then withdrew his motion.

The item passed.

On the motion that \$100 be granted the Provincial Rifle Association being put it was declared lost on the following division:—

Ayes—Hazard, Hughes, Hooper.

The other items of expenditure have all been disposed of, the estimates were then adopted as a whole, with the item of \$100 for the Rifle Association struck out.

Councillor Hazard then submitted the by-laws levying and specifying the rate of assessment on real estate and personal property for general civic purposes. The by-law was read a first time, and submitted to a committee of the whole council with Councillor Hooper in the chair.

Councillor Hazard moved that the rate of assessment on real estate be one per cent.

Councillor Tanton moved in amendment that the rate be seven-eighths of one per cent.

The amendment was then put and declared lost on the following division:—

Ayes—Tanton, Douse, Taylor.

Nays—Hazard, Fennel, Robertson, Hughes, Hooper.

The main motion was then put and carried.

Councillor Hazard moved that the rate of assessment on personal property be one per cent.

Councillor Tanton moved that the rate be 3/4 of one per cent.

The amendment was declared lost on the same division as the rate on real estate, and the main motion carried.

The Mayor took the chair, and the bill was reported agreed to and ordered to be read a third time at next meeting of Council.

Councillor Hazard then introduced the by-law for allowing a rate of discount on real estate and personal property taxes paid before a certain date, which was read a second time in committee with Councillor Hooper in the chair.

On motion of Councillor Hazard, it was decided to allow a discount of 2 1/2 per cent. on taxes paid before the 14th July next.

The bill was then reported agreed to, and ordered to be read a third time at next meeting.

Councillor Hughes then introduced a by-law providing for the granting of an annual license to theatres or public halls, which was submitted to a committee of the whole Council, with Councillor Hooper in the chair.

After a good deal of discussion, Councillor Douse moved that the Mayor take the chair and the chairman report the bill not agreed to.

This motion carried, the Mayor took the chair and the bill was reported not agreed to.

Councillor Hooper gave notice that at the next meeting he would move that the vote taking away the grant of \$100 to the Rifle Association be reconsidered.

Councillor Hughes moved that the street committee be authorized to purchase a horse for the use of the city.

Councillor Taylor moved in amendment that the horse be purchased by the Public Property Committee.

The amendment was put and lost, and the main motion carried.

On motion of Councillor Hazard the Mayor was authorized to issue a debenture for \$500 for waterworks purposes if necessary.

Council adjourned sine die.

Notices were issued this morning for a special meeting of Council on Monday evening at half-past seven for the purpose of reading for the third time and passing the assessment by-laws, and to consider the appointment of scavengers.
