Shortly before noon, while she was lifting a cover off the cooking stove, the fire shot up and ignited the sieve of her dress. The entire dress was soon enveloped in flames, and Mrs. Segee was in a terrible state of excitement. Her cries brought her daughter, Mrs. Fleet, to the rescue, and the latter succeeded in extinguishing the flames in a short time, but not before Mrs. Segee was badly burned about the arms and body. She is suffering greatly from pain, but will recover.

SERVED HIM RIGHT.—A Lunenburg, Ont., despatch says: An old German retired farmer named Banzhaff was victimized to the extent of five hundred dollars by a couple of strangers here yesterday afternoon. It is the old story of buying a big pile of bills (that could be used here all right) for a few hundred dollars of Canadian bank notes. Mr. Banzhaff withdrew his money from the bank and went for a drive into the country with one stranger and was met with the stuff by the partner, when the old man after seeing the strange money packed in a tin box made the fatal exchange. The box for the greater security was taken to the buggy by a stranger and wrapped in a small robe and was then carried back to town. When opened by the chief of police it was found to contain the conventional two pieces of wood and a stone.

Charles Stearns, a druggist of Maywood, N. J., met a horrible death last Wednesday. While mixing flash light chemicals in his laboratory an explosion occurred, and Stearns was blown to pieces. The explosion wrecked the building.

A despatch to the London Times from Cape Town says that the rinderpest had broken out in Aliwell North and Burgersdorp, and that there was every prospect that it would sweep the colony to the coast.

His Grace Archbishop Williams, who contemplates a two months' visit to Pope Leo XIII. at Rome, left Boston for New York on Wednesday afternoon. The incident was made the occasion of an interesting ceremony at the Cathedral of the Holy Cross.

One of the most pathetic scenes since the flood took place at Natchez, Miss., on Wednesday. Thirty negroes drifting on a raft were landed there, having been floating for four days with nothing to eat. No sooner had they reached land than they fell down and worshipped it. A colored Baptist preacher near by offered his services and began at once to baptize the whole crowd. They refused to eat or leave the river bank until baptism was completed. They said the flood was a visitation of the Divine wrath.

A Bombay cable despatch to the New York Herald says: The plague continues to diminish in Bombay, having fallen to 15 cases daily. It is diminishing also at Poona and Kurachge. New plague centres have been formed at Damoun, Cutch and Mandin. The cases at Bombay have been too few for Dr. Yerrain to continue his experiments. He is, however, treating a few patients with serum which has just arrived from Paris. Good results have been obtained in many cases with strong injections.
