Judge Arsenault's Memoirs Reviewed In Moncton Paper

The Memoirs of Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault, which appeared recently in The Guardian and have now been reprinted in booklet form with numerous additions, were reviewed appreciatively in the July 4th issue of "L'Evangeline", French language paper published in Moncton. Following is an English translation of the review: "The Memoirs of Mr. Justice Arsenault give us an insight into the principal happenings in the life of one of our most eminent Acadians. His father, who was a member of the Prince Edward Island Legislature for over a quarter of a century, was also the first and only Acadian Senator of Prince Edward Island. Mr. Arsenault himself was the first Acadian to become Prime Minister of a Canadian Province, and he was afterwards elevated to the Supreme Court Bench and retired a few years ago after a well-earned career. "The Memoirs relate some of the principal events in his life; his studies in London, his voyage to South Africa, his political career, his trip to Louisiana and his second visit to Europe. "You find it in his Memoirs and are told without any pretensions the impressions of a man who has seen much, who could note and observe, and who could remember clearly the details of important events. "Notwithstanding the 188 pages, Mr. Arsenault's volume is one of those which you are loath to lay down before having reached the very last page. "May we express the hope that notwithstanding his advanced age the author may again treat us with an addition of his Memoirs even more complete and in more detail."

Airline Pilots' Strike Continues

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., July 6 (CP) - A strong picket line of striking Saskatchewan Government Airways employees today kept all but two executives of the airline away from their offices. The strike of about 70 pilot and air engineers, mechanics and other personnel was called yesterday with the aim of winning reinstatement of a pilot dismissed for undisclosed reasons. The strikers are members of the Canadian Airlines Employees Union (C.A.E.U.). The pilots' strike has sharply curtailed northern flying since not only do the strikers operate freight and passenger service but maintain far-north bases used by independent fliers.

Profitable Trade In Small Potatoes To Asia & Africa

OTTAWA, July 6 (Special) - Small potatoes are held in such low esteem on this continent that the very term means something trifling or of no account. Yet the Union of South Africa this year has made substantial profits from shipments of very small tubers to numerous areas in Africa and Asia. According to Trade and Commerce authorities here today.

Weight of the South African potatoes exported runs from one to three ounces per potato. No less than 100,000 bags of this type have already been shipped to Singapore, Zanzibar, Ceylon, Tanganyika and the African West Coast and another shipment of 25,000 75-pound units is in course of preparation.

This traffic is clear gain for the South African potato-grower since there is scarcely any demand in the Union for the small, undersized potatoes which apparently are what these Asian and African centres want. Potato shippers from South African ports have not made any attempt as yet to compete with Canada and the United States for the South American market. Since they can successfully handle their surpluses in eastern countries.

"We are in the middle of a boom and we must be prepared for it to end. There is a radical camp in the world and they are a lot closer than we realize. They have a plan to put into operation and they are ready to do it."

"We must get our plan into operation and we have not too much time to do it," he warned. "If we have not got a practical positive plan ready then all the bit and miss work that has been done will not stand up very long."
