REV. DAVID SUTHERLAND.

MANY persons in town and country will lament the death of the Rev. David Sutherland, the highly esteemed pastor of Zion Church. Though not many years resident of Charlottetown, there were few men who had more thoroughly secured the respect of its citizens. He was a man of high education and character, a man of excellent literary taste, a good preacher, a capital lecturer, God-fearing and upright, with the prudence and ready tact of the canny Scot at the bottom of all. An ardent promoter of the temperance cause, he was inclined to moderate and safe, rather than radical measures in that regard. As the pastor of Zion Church he was distinctly successful. The loss of his bereaved wife and family, of his congregation, and of the community at large, is very great. A strong man has been taken from us in the midst of his years and usefulness. We deeply sympathize with those who will feel the loss most keenly—the widow and the fatherless.

THE WAR.

THOUGH Santiago is not yet under the Stars and Stripes, its people have evidently been aroused to a clear perception of the horrors of war. The President and people of the United States have also, apparently, had glory enough. Peace, for which the American people are asked to pray, would soon be declared if it were not for Spanish stubbornness, the ambitions of her politicians and royal aspirants, and the jealousies of the European Powers. These latter will be very apt to make additional trouble unless the United States are prepared to give up a large proportion of the fruit of their conquest. But the States will, in such a contingency, have the sympathy, and if need be, the aid of the British Government in any just and reasonable contention. The gallantry lately displayed by their soldiers and sailors, and the prudent measures adopted by President McKinley and his advisors, prove that the States will be a capable ally of the world-wide British Empire. When the two nations shall have agreed to unite their interests and work together in harmony a new era will have dawned. The alliance will be one of freedom against tyranny, of peace against strife; and will be certain to make for the betterment of both nations and of the world at large.

LIBERAL EXPENDITURES.

How extremely touchy The Patriot is now about the statement of public expenditures. Time was when our contemporary regarded all the Government's receipts as the products of taxation and regularly lumped the expenditures. But the scene is changed. Now we find it carefully dividing the capital expenditures from those out of the Consolidated Fund, and charging with "tricks" those who fail to do so upon every occasion, not sparing even THE EXAMINER. We have repeatedly set forth the exact sums of the authorized governmental expenditure in the present year, compared them with the average of the expenditures of the late Conservative administration, and shown that they were, in fact, the peradventure of a death's million upon millions in excess of those which the Patriot and Sir Louis Davies denounced as "extravagant" and "corrupt." Yet the Patriot dares to contend that the Liberals are highly economical, and to censure THE EXAMINER whenever it fails to quote the figures with absolute correctness. The Patriot ought, in view of its party's talk before the election and their acts since to hold its head in shame. The total expenditure set forth in the estimates passed last session is \$47,973,947, against an average total expenditure by the Conservatives—extending over ten years to their resignation of office—of \$40,639,747.

MARITIME MEDICAL ASSOCIATION.—The Maritime Medical Association met at Halifax on Wednesday. Dr D A Campbell called the meeting to order. He referred in a pleasant manner to the presence at this meeting of the veterans of the medical profession, Dr Bayard of St John and Dr Parker of Halifax. The president then read his address. Dr Bayard moved a vote of thanks for the able and interesting paper. Dr Daniels, who seconded the motion, strongly advocated interprovincial reciprocity.

SUPREME COURT.

THURSDAY, July 7th.

The Supreme Court reserved judgment in the Carmody Bail Case. Re: application of John Thompson, for leave to issue execution against the lands of Susan Cairns Administratrix.—Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C. shows cause against the rule issued in this matter and moved that it be dismissed with costs. Mr. J. H. Bell in support of the application. The Court dismissed the application with costs against Thompson. Re application of John Thompson for leave to issue execution against the lands of Terence Cairns.—Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C. opposed the issuing of the execution for any amount in excess of the original judgment, and argued that the judgment did not bear interest since the 5th June, 1880. Mr. Bell on behalf of the applicant claimed the right to issue execution not only for the original amount, but also interest thereon at 12 per cent from April 1880, in all about \$76. The court held that the judgment did not carry interest after the 5th June, 1880, and gave leave to issue execution for the original amount without interest. The costs of the counsel opposing this application to be paid by Thompson, and the costs of the application to issue execution to be allowed applicant. The court then adjourned until 16th July instant for judgments.

EXPENSIVE BRAM.—Thomas Bram, mate of the bark Herbert Fuller, who was lately found guilty in Boston of murdering Captain Nash, has had two trials and wants another. His first trial cost the government \$12,000, the second one between \$25,000 and \$30,000. His present sentence is imprisonment for life, and in asking to be tried again he runs the risk of being hanged.—Harper's Weekly.

SAD SUICIDE.—Mrs. Alonzo Daniels, suffering from nervous prostration, committed suicide by drowning in the Annapolis river, near Bridgetown last Sunday. Her body was recovered Monday. At the same place just a year previously the wife of Rev. F. M. Young drowned herself.
