...HEAVY RUN OF SMELTS—A large number of fishermen are engaged in fishing smelts at the present time, and their reports indicate a fairly heavy run for the early part of the season. Some fishermen have as high as twenty nets in areas where the smelts are running, and have had a good return during the period of fishing. The price in the Montague area is fifteen cents per pound to the fishermen, which is considered a fairly good price for smelts. A considerable quantity of the catch is being sold to the local cold storage, although there is a small amount of local trade. Fish huts are being put in readiness for the

winter fishing, and once again, about January, the lower river ice will be dotted with these huts where the fishermen remain for the better part of the day. As the season progresses, the fishermen look forward to a good catch in view of the fine returns with which the season began.

Magistrate's Court At Georgetown

Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, held court in the Court House at Georgetown on Friday, Oct. 27th. The first case involved a resident of Murray River, who pleaded guilty to a charge that he unlawfully failed to make return of income tax for 1949 under section 119—(1) of the Income Tax Act. He was fined \$25.00 and costs of \$7.50 or 30 days in King's County Jail. The party was given to the end of October to make returns of income tax forms.

The second case was that of a Montague resident, who also pleaded guilty to "unlawfully failing to make return of income tax for 1949 under section 119—(1) of the Income Tax Act." This party was fined \$25.00 and costs of \$5.50 or 30 days in King's County Jail. Given to end of month to make returns. A second resident of Murray River pleaded guilty to "unlawfully failing to make return of 1949 income tax, under section 119—(1) of the Income Tax Act." A fine of \$25.00 and costs of \$7.50 was imposed or 30 days in King's County Jail. A resident of Brudenell pleaded "not guilty" to "unlawfully hunting game birds on Sunday, under section 6(E) of the Game Act." Evidence was heard and the case adjourned to Friday, Oct. 3rd for decision. Court adjourned to Friday, Oct. 3rd at 2:00 P.M.

IN MEMORIAM

JOHN C. CAMPBELL After bearing his lifetime cross with true Christian patience and cheerfulness, the soul of John C. Campbell took its flight heavenward on Sept. 30th, fortified by the last rites of Holy Mother Church administered by Reverend Frank Campbell. His short life of twenty-four years was almost entirely spent as a cripple from Rheumatoid Arthritis which followed Rheumatic fever contracted when he was about two and a half years of age. His physical helplessness was compensated for by his mental ability, his interest in world affairs, and in sports, and his keen sense of humor made him admired and loved by all.

During the past few years he made three pilgrimages to St. Anne de Beaupre and after his pilgrimage this year he spent an enjoyable summer at the Crippled Children's Camp at St. Alphonse de Joliette, Quebec. On his return he entered the Charlottetown Hospital for a minor operation from which he did not recover.

His remains were conveyed from the Frank Hennessey funeral home on Sunday afternoon Oct. 1st, to his home in Primrose. The many friends who called on Sunday and Monday to offer prayers and sympathy bespoke the love and affection he had won from the hearts of all.

The funeral held on Oct. 3rd, to St. George Church was largely attended. The Requiem Mass was celebrated by his pastor, Reverend B. J. MacDonald. Reverend Harold Croken of Cardigan occupied a seat in the sanctuary. After the Libera was sung, the remains were conveyed to the adjoining cemetery and tenderly laid to rest in the family plot beside the loved ones gone before. Services at the grave were performed by the Reverend B. J. MacDonald.

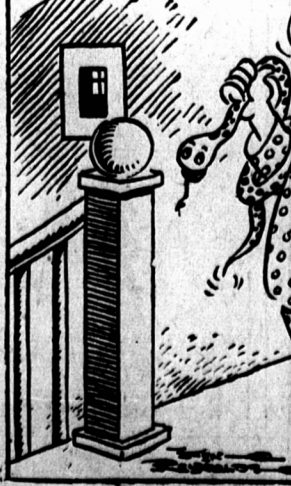
