British Business, Industry Pleas With Vote Result

LONDON (CP)—British business and industry expressed quiet relief Tuesday at the result of the Canadian election but it was tinged with disappointment in some quarters. Those who feared a stalemate result, foreshadowing a period of instability in Canadian affairs, were hopeful that the Liberals might succeed in forming a working government with the aid of the New Democratic Party.

Several investment counselors expressed disquiet that no party had gained a clear majority. One qualified informant said British industry had been hoping for a Liberal victory. It would take a "certain pleasure" in the outcome, but would be disappointed that the Liberals had not won a clear triumph.

PREPLEXED BY RESULT
The Evening Standard, in the first editorial comment published here, described the result as perhaps Canada's most perplexing vote since Confederation. The paper says Pearson's chief difficulty is that his most amenable allies may well be the New Democratic Party, who speak "the same political dialect" as the Liberals. But the diabolical policies of the two parties are "essentially alien," the paper says.

Harkness Asks Leadership Convention

CALGARY (CP)—Former defence minister Douglas Harkness, re-elected in Calgary North, said Monday night the Progressive Conservative party should hold a leadership convention.

Mr. Harkness, who resigned from the cabinet in February in a dispute over nuclear weapons, told reporters "After this election it is apparent a leadership convention will be in order."

Mr. Harkness, who has won seven consecutive elections in the constituency, has said his disagreement is with Mr. Diefenbaker, not the party.

He campaigned on his own defence policy — that Canada should fulfil its commitments to its allies and acquire nuclear weapons.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Hearst official told the House antitrust subcommittee Tuesday the company lost \$4,000,000 in 1950 and 1961 on its Los Angeles newspaper operation. G. O. Markson, general manager of the Hearst Newspapers, said the heavy losses led to the consolidation of Hearst's morning Examiner and evening Herald-Examiner in January, 1962.

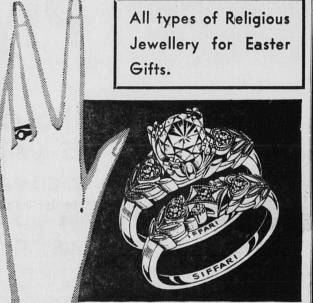
