

2 Million Lbs. Butter, Cheese Is Plant Output

More than two million pounds of butter and cheese were manufactured during the past year by Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. from the cream and milk supplied by their 2,064 patrons.

This information was included in reports presented at the annual meeting yesterday which revealed a net profit of \$14,577.46 after paying to their patrons a bonus of 2 1/2 cents per pound of butterfat, which amounted to \$37,472.90.

During the year 1,714,462 pounds of butter, and 384,282 pounds of cheese were manufactured by the company whose products won the first prizes, donated by the P.E.I. Dairyman's Association, for highest percentage first grade butter, and highest percentage bonus cheese, and the second prize for the highest percentage of first grade cheese.

This company also received a bonus of \$2,540.44 from the Federal Government for quality cheese. An interesting point during the meeting in regard to cheese manufactured by Amalgamated Dairies disclosed that of 250 boxes of 94 score cheese bonus cheese) manufactured in the whole of the Maritime Provinces during the past year, 130 of these were the product of Amalgamated Dairies.

The meeting was presided over by the retiring president Murdock MacLeod of Long River, who has served as president of the company since its organization three years ago.

He congratulated the association on the steps they had taken in regard to packaging cheese, and he described an interesting experiment being conducted in Ontario in the use of a new type of container for shipping milk from farm to dairy.
