Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone have received autograph letters from the Queen, both missives being couched in language showing high appreciation of the services rendered to the country by Mr. Gladstone. The letter addressed by the Queen to Mrs. Gladstone is full of interesting reminiscences.

The marriage of the Duke and Duchess of Fife has, it is popularly believed, proved one of the happiest in England. Whether in their highland home or their shooting place near Sandringham, or the big, dull-looking London house in Portland Square, Princess Louise and her husband are seldom out of each other's society. Now and then the Duke of Fife presides at a musical dinner or a hospital begging banquet, and the Princess Louise occasionally opens a bazaar or assists at the corner-stone laying of some more or less important public structure, but, as a rule, their lives are as free from public gaze and public doing as the most unpretentious of Her Majesty's subjects.

Mr. Joseph Royal, late lieutenant-governor of the Northwest territories, is out with a brand new scheme for separating the Dominion from the British Empire and establishing a Canadian Republic. The only change requisite in the administrative departments, he says, would be "that of the heading of the official notepaper." There seems to us to be more in the change than Mr. Royal grasps, and his notion that Canada would be in a stronger position for obtaining concessions from the United States by depriving herself of the power of the British Crown is exceedingly shortsighted. But it would be attaching undue importance to the scheme to give it the discussion in the press which Mr. Royal solicits. It is not exactly a dead issue; it has never come into life.
