Ottawa's Cattle Policy Gets Strong Criticism

There have been some interesting comments from the "Across the Island" column of last Thursday which quoted R. Bob Parent, in some strong criticism of the cattle policy employed by the Experimental Farm people at Ottawa so far as this station is concerned. What Mr. Parent said had some interesting angles. One that is particularly interesting is the story about the something more than 3,600 records being required on each animal from the time it's a baby calf until it completes two lactations. These include something more than 60 body measurements on every calf, such as the heart girth, the muzzle, the rump length, the temperature and many others.

For two 60-day periods, the farm people have to record individual daily gains, and individual recording also of what the animals eat. I'm repeating here from what I wrote last week, but one other requirement is to do quarter-milking for 60-day periods. They are required to weigh milk from morning and night, butter each quarter separately, morning and night, butter fat records are made, production of solids-not-fat, etc. are kept.

RAS IDEAS
Rob Parent gave the idea the raspberry. He has ideas he feels would be much more in keeping with the cattle economy of this province. Yesterday, however, I talked to an agriculturist here who sees some possible benefit from this exhaustive series of tests and measurements. The idea behind it all, he suggests, is to devise some method of determining a young animal's worth in the early stages of its development.

As it is now, he suggested, a young sure, for example, is used for several years before his daughter producing. The bull has probably produced a large number of calves before there is any information available on whether he should have been used at all, whether he can transmit the desirable characteristics to his daughters. If this exhaustive series of tests can produce some method of sizing up a young animal and being able to judge the animal's potential early in life, it could have far-reaching effect, it was suggested. And that's another way of looking at this part of the sort of testing that is being carried on by the Experimental farm at the direction of the planners at headquarters in Ottawa.

Everglades Park Makes Comeback

EVERGLADES Fla. (AP)—The ancient Sea of Grass flows again and the vast primitive wilderness of Everglades National Park is witnessing a gradual rebirth of life. Just a year ago, cut off from the water that has been the park's life blood for ages, birds, animals and reptiles were backed to the wall in a desperate battle for existence. Marshes, dyed under the blazing sun, were scorched by fire. The hammocks, little "tree islands" sheltering the deer, the bear and the panther, were disappearing. Today, the lakes and ponds are filled and water stands again in the sawgrass. The park, which once teemed with wildlife, has begun the long climb back to normal.

Three years of below-normal rainfall, then three months of searing drought, set up the park's desperate situation. It reached its climax when water that once flowed into the park from Lake Okechobee was trapped in the reservoirs of the central and south Florida flood control district. The first relief came with heavy rainfall last fall and winter. More rain in the spring, part from hurricane Alma, helped still more.

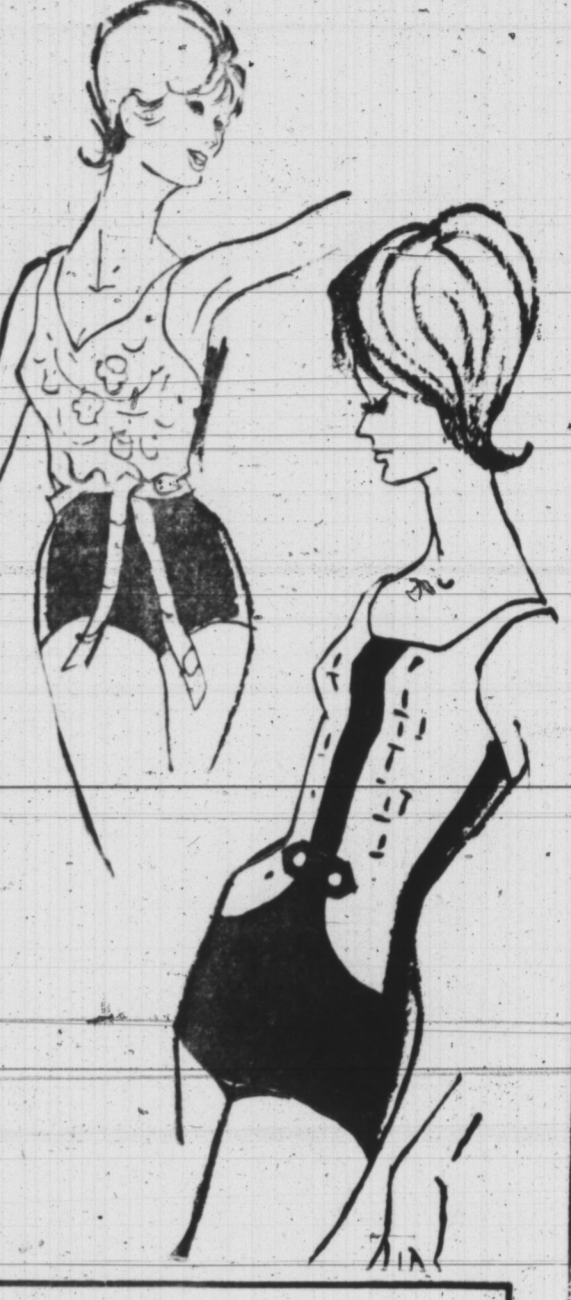
