MacDonald also figured heavily in the hitting as he banged out three in his four times at bats. One of these was a wick-

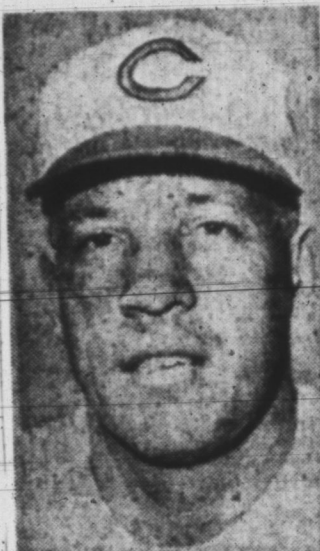

# Defending Champ Brazil Sees Hopes Shattered

LONDON (CP) — Portugal, Argentina and Uruguay joined Russia in Saturday's quarter-finals while Italy and Mexico were eliminated in the World Cup soccer championship Tuesday night.

Portugal virtually ended Brazil's eight-year reign as world champions with a 2-1 victory over the Brazilians at Liverpool. Argentina defeated Switzerland 2-0 at Sheffield; North Korea upset Italy 1-0 at Middlesbrough, and Uruguay and Mexico played a scoreless tie in London.

The Brazilians drastically shifted their lineup against the Portuguese but it didn't do much good. Pele, their star, was hurt after 20 minutes of play, and they were unable to function in the second half.

Portugal led 2-0 at halftime and there wasn't much hope for the Brazilians after that. The Portuguese have been the cream of this tournament so far, defeating Hungary 3-1 and Bulgaria 3-0 to win the group. Three sections with six points.

Eusebio Ferreira, 24, easily emerged as the hero of the Portuguese victory. He figured in all three Portugal goals and scored two of them himself.

TWO SURVIVED  
Brazil came into the match with only two men surviving from the team that lost 3-1 to Hungary Friday night.

In group three, Hungary and Brazil are tied for the second spot with two points each. But the Brazilians, who beat Bulgaria 2-0 but lost to Hungary 1-1 last week, had completed their round-robin.

# Bill Casper Confident

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — Billy Casper figures he has a good chance of adding the Professional Golfers Association title to his U.S. open golf championship, if the wind blows from the southeast and over eight miles an hour.

"If the wind dies down or shifts northwesterly, I'm in trouble," Casper said Tuesday. "Those rubber fumes would knock me out of commission."

Casper, who beat Arnold Palmer in a playoff for the U.S. open title last month at San Francisco, checked into the Firestone Country Club with a certificate from his doctor saying that his sensitive allergies may be safe if the wind cooperates.

Akron is the rubber capital of the world and fumes from the plants stop up Casper's nose, irritate his lungs, give him a terrific headache and generally foul up his disposition, not to mention his golf.

The new open champion ranks 50th among the favorites in the 50th anniversary PGA championship, starting Thursday over the long and back-breaking Firestone course.

Because of his allergies, Casper has refused to play in the rich American Classic here a regular stop on the pro golf tour. He has studiously avoided the city.  
"I went to my doctor and he told me it would be all right if the wind blew over eight miles an hour and away from the rubber factories," he said.
