Pleas Changed In Break, Entry Case

MONTAGUE — Malcolm Paul Martell of Georgetown was sentenced to two months in Kings County Jail when he appeared before Kings County stipendiary Magistrate James B. Johnson, Q.C., at Georgetown yesterday, when he changed a previous plea of not guilty to one of guilty to breaking and entering Allen's canteen at Georgetown with intent to commit an indictable offence therein.

Martell was represented by S. S. Hessian, Q.C. He also pleaded guilty to and was fined \$50.00 and costs or twenty days, for damage to a lantern to the value of less than \$50, the property of the Department of Transport. This was a range light situated on the Cardigan ferry wharf on the Cardigan river and was shot out with a .22 rifle.

The accused was also ordered to make restitution for the lantern in the amount of \$5.25 or serve an additional 5 days. In this case he was also represented by Mr. Hessian.

Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur MacGuigan represented the Crown in all cases before the court.

John Thomas Creed of Sturgeon pleaded guilty to assaulting Phyllis (Mrs. John) Creed by striking her in the head with his fist. He was fined \$25.00 and costs or 15 days. He was represented by Mr. Hessian. Creed was also before the court charged with impaired driving and had his case adjourned to Sept. 12 to fix the date for hearing.

Mr. Hessian represented the accused in this matter.

Elley Vernon Shaw of Brudenell, represented by Mr. Hessian, pleaded guilty to assaulting Horace James Rourke of Brudenell and was fined \$15.00 and costs.

Lloyd Frederick White of Murray Harbor represented by Mr. Hessian and charged with impaired driving, had his case adjourned to Sept. 12.

Borden Mann of Greek River also represented by Mr. Hessian and charged with impaired driving, had his case adjourned to Sept. 5 for trial.

Raymond Duke Rattry of St. Peters who previously pleaded not guilty to having possession of liquor in a place other than

a residence, had his case adjourned to Sept. 12.

Joseph Gladstone Vunzoo of Montague, who was charged with unlawfully and indecently assaulting Louise Mary Francis Ford, had his case adjourned to Sept. 5 to fix a date for hearing.

Francis Glen Docherty, Montague and Morley Gordon Coffin of Stanley, N.B., both charged with damaging 24 headstones to an amount exceeding \$50.00, the property of the Three Rivers Cemetery Company. Both parties elected trial by magistrate and both pleaded guilty and their cases were adjourned to Charlottetown at 1:30 p.m. advanced time on August 30th for sentencing. Both parties are represented by J. Elmer Blanchard.

John Melvin Balisold, Annandale was fined \$30.00 and costs for having liquor in a place other than a residence.

In the Highway Traffic Act section of the court, Samuel Leonard Smith of Sturgeon was fined \$10.00 and costs for having defective equipment on his motor vehicle and Norman Allan Gillis, Dundas was fined \$15.00 and costs for an offence under the same section.

Royal Blair White, Murray River was fined \$15.00 and costs for driving without due care and attention.

(Continued from page 1) process which includes interviews with the parents, contact with references, visits at the parents home, a six-month probation period when the parents receive the child, and legal procedure, requires eight months or more, Mr. Laws said.

Children handled by the agency are between four and eight months, and many applicants wanting foster children or older children must be turned down. Some of these the bureau refers to the division of child welfare, which in under the provincial government and deals with older children.

SPARKED BY ARTICLE
The practice of offering babies for adoption through newspapers began several years ago when a national magazine ran an article about a handicapped child for whom a Toronto adoption agency was unable to find a home.

The story sparked a tremendous response from prospective parents willing to adopt children handicapped by physical disabilities or race, and adoption agencies in that area came to recognize the value of placing advertisements in magazines and newspapers.

"These agencies succeeded in satisfying a great many suitable parents who had not previously been aware of it children's plight or availability, and the idea spread to other parts of Canada, including Maritime centres, Halifax, Sydney, Antigonish, and now Charlottetown, Mr. Laws said unlike large centres, the problem of placing handicapped children is practically nonexistent.

DEMAND DROPS
"However," he explained, "the demand for adoptive children seems to have dropped off. There are not so many potential parents applying as there used to be. More unmarried mothers are making use of services offered by adoption agencies, so that there are more children available than previously."

Mr. Laws said that while the bureau has so far been successful in finding homes for its children, he foresees a time when, perhaps because of economic difficulties, adoptive parents will be hard to find.

"A trend for fewer couples adopting children seems to be starting," he added. "A few years ago there were three couples wanting to adopt children for every available child. Now the ratio is about one to one."
