our lives to the proposition that all men should have the right to vote," King said.

We assemble here to reaffirm our conviction that racial segregation is evil.

A car horn kept blaring somewhere nearby. King ignored it.

About 200 white spectators gathered on the steps of the federal building across the street from the courthouse.

The huge throng moved to the courthouse, held a brief service and returned after an earlier march by about 500 persons was blocked by county and state police.

Edward VIII suggested they drive to visit the Duke and Duchesses of York—the present Queen's parents, later King George VI and Queen Elizabeth (now the Queen Mother). They had tea, she wrote, and in a few moments the two little princesses joined us. The passage continued:

"Princess Elizabeth... was then 10, and Princess Margaret was nearly 6. They were both so blonde, so beautifully mannered, so brightly scrubbed that they might have stepped out of a picture book... David (now the Duke of Windsor) and his sister-in-law carried on the conversation, with his brother throwing in only an occasional word. It was a pleasant hour."

Plans for the hospital meeting first leaked out a week ago, but the duke was still not well enough for it. A palace spokesman said "it is the Queen's intention that she should meet the duchess when she visits the duke."

News of the visit was flashed on television screens and was the first item on the evening news broadcasts. There was inevitable speculation the meeting would bring an end to the exile of the 70-year-old duke and his 68-year-old duchess, but palace spokesmen said they knew of no plans for the duke to spend his final years in the land of his birth.

There was no formal mention of the Queen's visit in the daily court circular from Buckingham Palace. This usually records only her official engagements.

Later she left for Manchester for two days of visiting schools and factories and to launch a ship.
